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CALAPOOIA WOMEN'S CLUB HAS HISTORY OF COMMUNITY SERVICE

In a lovely spot in a wide bend of the Calapooia River near Umpqua stands the Calapooia Women's Clubhouse. It was a school house originally. In 1927 some of the ladies of the community gave a shower for Myrtle Brownson at the home of Mrs. Marie Sonne and it was decided that a women's organization was needed for neighborliness and community service. A club was formed that day with Mrs. Sonne as first president and Mrs. Norah Stephens as secretary and treasurer. There were twelve women present and they called it the Calapooia Sewing Club.

The meetings were held every third Wednesday of each month at the homes of the members. Charter members are Mrs. Dora Leatherwood, Maude Cole, Lena Cole, Mrs. Turner, Bertha Stephens, Ida Stephens, Myrtle Brownson, Mrs. Layman, Maude Thompson, Norah Stephens, and Marie Sonne. Of this group, Maude Cole, who is the present president of the club, Mrs. Sonne, and Norah Stephens are still members. The idea grew so fast with this club that it soon outgrew homes and a larger place was needed for meetings.

Norah Stephens, Hazel Haines and Frankie Moore were instrumental in obtaining the school house and after much cleaning, scrubbing, moving and painting the first meeting in the new clubhouse, was held on the third Wednesday of July, 1929.

Through the years, this club has been one of service and friendship. Many members have come and gone, many have been members for years, and as we look back over the years of all the work they have done, we see Red Cross work, membership work and sewing. During the war they made hundreds of men's slippers, dozens of pieced wool quilted lap robes for the hospitals, and many baby layettes. They met every week in several groups during these times in order to do their part.

They helped with the Emergency Hospital which was established by the community and maintained in Oakland. Some of the members went into the Roseburg Hospital and took training so that they might be ready to help if needed. They have helped with and sponsored 4-H clubs and Girl Scouts. Several of the members went regularly to the Blood Donors Bank in Portland all during the war. They have made uncountable quilts, some being sold to keep the club treasurer happy; but most of them have gone to needy families and disaster needs. Every Christmas for years they have remembered from 2 to 5 families with all the makings for Christmas dinners. They sponsored the "Pioneers Picnic" for years. Last year they took over the food concession at the Douglas County Fair in the grandstand and served all during the fair. They have also financed the adoption of a Japanese boy for the year and their project this year is a \$10 Care package each month to a needy family in a foreign country.

The clubhouse has always been available for other meetings and some organizations meet there regularly. The Calapooia Farm Bureau, the Douglas County Home Extension and the Young Folk Home group are among some of them. A welfare committee keeps a supply of clothing and some food on hand at all times for emergencies. Anyone, regardless whether in this district or not, are helped. They have sent help to a lady in Germany and a missionary in the Philippines. The March of Dimes is a project. The Children's Farm Home at Corvallis, have cause to remember these ladies too.

In 1946 they made and accepted a set of by-laws and a constitution, and changed the name of the club to Calapooia Club.

Members are building a kitchen in the clubhouse and rest rooms will be included in this addition. A well and pump will be installed. It was the wish of the late Scott Henry (this building was on his
