Eisenhower Says Reds Must Halt In Indochina

ply can't afford greater losses, especially when they threaten to knock down other countries like falling dominoes.

Almost simultaneously with the President's news conference, Secretary of State Dulles was discussing Indochina at the Republican women's centennial conference here.

The secretary of state said the United States is seeking to develop a united will among friendly nations interested in the Southeast Asian area which would doom Red China's ambition there to defeat.

Dulles said that if present negotiations produce such a will and make the stand of the free nations sufficiently clear then there would be less need for "united action" to save Indochina from communism.

But he declared grimly that the potential danger to free world interests in the area is very great and there exists the risk of a "great disaster" there.

At the capitol, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas threw Democratic weight behind a stand by Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) that the free nations should "stop up and be counted" on measures to resist Communist aggression in Indochina.

diers with guns. Then two others drove up in a jeep. They did not level their guns at us but they got out of our jeep and come with them. They were speaking Russian and we did not know what they were saying. They searched us and took our weapons, then they drove us across the 10-meter (six-mile) border strip into East Germany to a building on the edge of a village seven or eight miles away.

"They did not mistreat us, but we were warned that if we did not answer their questions we would be dealt with as spies."

The two soldiers said they were questioned until midnight, then were taken to a room where they spent the night in small, hospital-type beds with sheets and blankets. Next morning the interrogations were resumed and after lunch the English-speaking officer told them they would be returned to the border at 7 p.m.

Sack, Valentine Trials Postponed

PORTLAND # — Trials of men accused of Portland's two most spectacular recent crimes were delayed by court action Tuesday.

George F. Sack, accused of first degree murder in the death of his wife, Goldie Sack, was granted until April 20 to enter a plea.

The state contends that Sack, 37, killed his wife by placing her in an automobile trunk where she was asphyxiated. Sack has denied it. Valentine also says he is innocent. He is accused of attempting to kidnap 10-year-old George Brice III from Carlton-Hillside school and of forcing the boy's mother, Mrs. George Brice Jr., and her maid, Lizzie Brown, to drive him from the Brice home to the school.

3 Killed, 5 Severely Burned In Plane Crash

VICTORVILLE, Calif. # — Three men are dead and five others severely burned as the result of a jet fighter crash and fire involving another plane and a rescue truck at George Air Force Base.

An Air Force spokesman said the F86 jet had no more than left the ground Tuesday when it swerved and crashed into the truck, burst into flame and rammed a T33 trainer parked on the runway. The T33 was destroyed.

The dead: 2nd Lt. Joseph D. Young, 22, the jet pilot of Oklahoma City, Okla.; Tech. Sgt. James C. Flower, Victorville; and Carl C. Case, Big Bear, Calif. Flower and Case were manning the rescue truck. The burned airmen were working on the flight line when the crash occurred.

decision to go ahead with the hydrogen bomb."

"But that does not mean there was anything sinister necessarily," he added.

The Atomic Energy Commission declined to comment.

The H-bomb statement was a by-product of McCarthy's reply to charges by Murrow that he has abused his authority as a Senate investigator.

Murrow attacked McCarthy on March 9. He offered to turn his 30-minute See It Now show over to the senator for his reply. The answer was filmed over the weekend and telecast with McCarthy in Arizona.

Although the film was kept secret until shortly before air time, Murrow, through sources he declined to divulge, obtained knowledge of the charges and drew up a reply which was released at the time of the telecast.

CBS said first listener reaction, via telephone calls and telegrams, was "overwhelmingly" in favor of Murrow.

Julian Hellck Talks On Juvenile Problems At PTA

Julian Hellck, assistant juvenile officer of Douglas County, discussed reasons for the increase in delinquency in recent years. He listed (1) unsettled conditions after the war, (2) 50 per cent more children in the 10 to 17-year-old group (in which most delinquency occurs) than ever before, (3) lack of stability in the homes, (4) disappearance of "backyards," "hobbies and chores" and (5) immature parents.

Hellck pointed out that children's habits are molded during their first six years by their parents. He said it doesn't take much to fulfill the needs of the child. He said the child needs to have a feeling of being wanted and loved. It demands understanding parents who give small displays of affection.

He ended his discussion by citing a case history of four youngsters who had been in trouble.

Reports at the meeting, directed by President Mrs. Ted Williams, included a statement by Principal Eli Hall that a request for sidewalks on Walte Street would be included in the school budget.

Hall also reported on the new plan for orienting families in the district. The members at the meeting also were given further information on the revision of the tuition scholarship plan of the Oregon Congress of PTAs. The scholarship plan has been extended for elementary teacher training at Oregon State College, Portland State and University of Oregon.

use of atomic weapons, on which our very existence may exist, cannot be justified." Knowland declared.

Sen. Byrd (D-Va.), a member of the Eisenhower Administration's military policy "there will be no massive retaliation unless the Russians attack us."

"If we have time to consult with our allies, well and good," he said. "But if we are attacked, we will strike back and there will be no time for any consultation."
