Educator Praises Cut In Butter Price Prop

TACOMA — Cutting butter price supports to 75 per cent of parity was probably the second best thing Secretary of Agriculture Benson could have done, Dr. J. K. Galbraith, Harvard professor of economics, said here Monday.

Cutting out parity prices altogether, letting butter find its own price level, and then paying each dairy farmer a lump sum payment to make up the difference would have been the "first best" thing, he said.

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
