Pre-meds Need More Cultural School Training

CHICAGO (AP)—Most college boys aiming to become doctors take such "stereotyped" non-cultural courses that they "even begin to look and speak alike," a nationally-known educator says.

Chancellor Lawrence A. Kimpton of the University of Chicago, saying that would-be physicians need knowledge of "humanizing" subjects if they want to prepare for the position of leadership expected of them, told annual meeting of the American College of Physicians Thursday night.

"The doctor as leader should know the true nature of the good, it could do no harm if he appreciated the beautiful."

"But I for one am shocked by the typical premedical curriculum. Youngsters presenting themselves for candidacy to our medical schools show a monotonous and unvarying store of training involving prescribed units of (scientific subjects)."

He said that because of the "difficulty" of entrance into medical schools, the youngster preparing for such a school "plays it safe and sticks to the money around with cultural courses that the medical school admission committees do not pay any attention to anyway."

But he added: "The typical premedical curriculum runs a serious risk of educating out of the student the creativity, the critical appreciation, the ability to think, which are so necessary a part of leadership. Pre-meds even begin to look and speak alike."

SANTA BARBARA (AP)—Suzan Ball and Dick Long, whose marriage climaxed Hollywood's nicest love story, today start their honeymoon with a leisurely drive up the California coast.

The striking brunette actress, who lost her right leg to cancer in January, made one of the year's most beautiful brides as she and the young actor were wed Sunday at El Montecito Presbyterian Church.

The wedding was intensely dramatic, because everyone expected the bride to come down the aisle on crutches. But Suzan had vowed she would walk down the aisle unaided, and that she did.

Although she had practiced only six days with her artificial leg, she laid aside her crutches a few minutes before the ceremony. Some 1,000 people crowded inside and outside the quaint little country church, and there was an audible gasp from the assemblage as Suzan entered the church without crutches. She walked firmly down the aisle, with but a slight limp—the arm of her father, H. Dale Ball.

Long, 26, first saw his bride in a movie while he was in the Army in Japan four years ago. He was very much impressed. Later, when out of uniform and back at Universal-International Studios to resume his acting career, he saw the dark beauty sitting in the commissary. He introduced himself. She was on crutches at the time. He told him that she had a cancer of the leg.

Army-McCarthy Hearing Slated For Next Week

WASHINGTON (AP)—Investigating senators said Friday they hope to agree next week on the overall scope of their probing into the bitter row between Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) and High Army officials.

The Senate investigations subcommittee, which McCarthy heads, has voted to launch on April 21 televised public hearings to seek the truth amid charges exchanged the dispute over alleged seeking of favors for a drafted consultant to the subcommittee, and alleged "blackmail" attempts to divert probes of Army matters.

Sen. Mundt (R-SD), who will preside at the hearings, told reporters a necessary early step will be to explore into controversies between McCarthy on the one hand and Secretary of the Army Stevens and John G. Adams, Army general counsel, on the other.

There had been earlier rows over McCarthy's treatment of a general on the witness stand and the Army's promoting and honoring discharging an officer who refused to answer security questions.

McCarthy, who has been in Tucson, Ariz., recovering from a virus infection, said Thursday he expects to return to Washington Saturday.

McCarthy said in an interview he does not know anything about Ray H. Jenkins, the Knoxville, Tenn., lawyer engaged Wednesday by the subcommittee as its special counsel for the pending investigation.

Research Aids VA Treat Heart, Lung Diseases

For the first time in medical history, Veterans Administration hospitals will measure heart and lung function through cooperative research to provide more accurate standards for diagnosing and treating heart and lung diseases.

Once satisfactory normal standards have been established, VA will go on to measure and interpret abnormal heart and lung function.

These two studies, VA said, will provide medical and scientific contributions of considerable importance to VA and to the medical world at large.

In VA, such standards are needed not only for diagnosing and treating such cases, but also to assist in rating heart and lung diseases for service-connected requirements.

VA is in a unique position to conduct this research because it has the nation's largest group of hospitalized patients with heart and lung diseases susceptible to follow-up.

Moreover, VA has a hard core of well trained investigators in this field, with modern laboratories equipped to carry out such studies.

Judge Dismisses Two Libel Suits

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—Two \$75,000 libel suits against two Idaho newspapers were thrown out of court Thursday by a federal judge who said care must be exercised lest such suits "stifle the press and speech."

Winners in the suit were the Daily Idahoan of Moscow and the Lewiston Morning Tribune which had quoted statements made at a mass meeting concerning the handling of an assault case by John K. Borg, former Moscow justice of the peace.

Borg, now a resident of Longview, Wash., brought the suit. Judge Chas. A. Clark commented in dismissing the case that the stories of the mass meeting were fair and honest and that the "interest of the public here outweighs the interest of the plaintiff (Borg) or any other individual."

House Mothers Ordered For OSC Fraternities

CORVALLIS (AP)—Oregon State College decided Thursday to tighten discipline in fraternities. The weapon will be house mothers. Every fraternity will have to have a full-time resident housemother by September, 1955, announced Dan W. Poling, dean of men. Only one fraternity has a housemother now.

Poling said the grades of fraternity members have slumped in recent years, misconduct has increased and other undesirable tendencies have been noted.

He said college officials felt that the presence of housemothers would make "young men more aware of the qualities of a gentleman."

Brownell Aims To Destroy Red Party In U.S.

Three-Point Program Readied For Congress Faces Uncertain Fate

WASHINGTON (AP)—Atty. Gen. Brownell, with an appeal to the nation behind him, today takes to Capitol Hill his program for new laws to destroy the Communist party in this country.

He arranged to meet with a House Judiciary subcommittee which is considering anti-Red legislation, in the wake of his nationwide radio-TV address undertaken Friday night at the request of President Eisenhower.

The attorney general then said the FBI, the Justice Department and the courts are doing a good job in dealing with the Red menace at home. But he declared new laws are needed "desire by legal, orderly processes the Communist party in this country."

Has 3-Point Remedy

He proposed statutes to:

1. Do away with Communist control "of any industrial organization or labor union" in vital sections of the nation's economy.

2. Impose the death penalty for peacetime spying as well as wartime, and erase the statute of limitations which now bars prosecution for espionage after a certain number of years.

3. Take away the citizenship of any person found guilty of advocating violent overthrow of the government.

While both Republicans and Democrats in Congress applauded the general objectives in Brownell's report, it remained far from clear whether his requests for legislation would win passage in the form he wants — or whether they would get any action at all.

WOMAN DIES IN FIRE

PORTLAND (AP)—A fire trapped Mrs. Kay Emmerson, 43, in her southwest Portland home early Sunday. She was suffocated.

Firemen rescued her husband, Lloyd Emmerson, 45, from the roof of the back porch. He was treated for shock.

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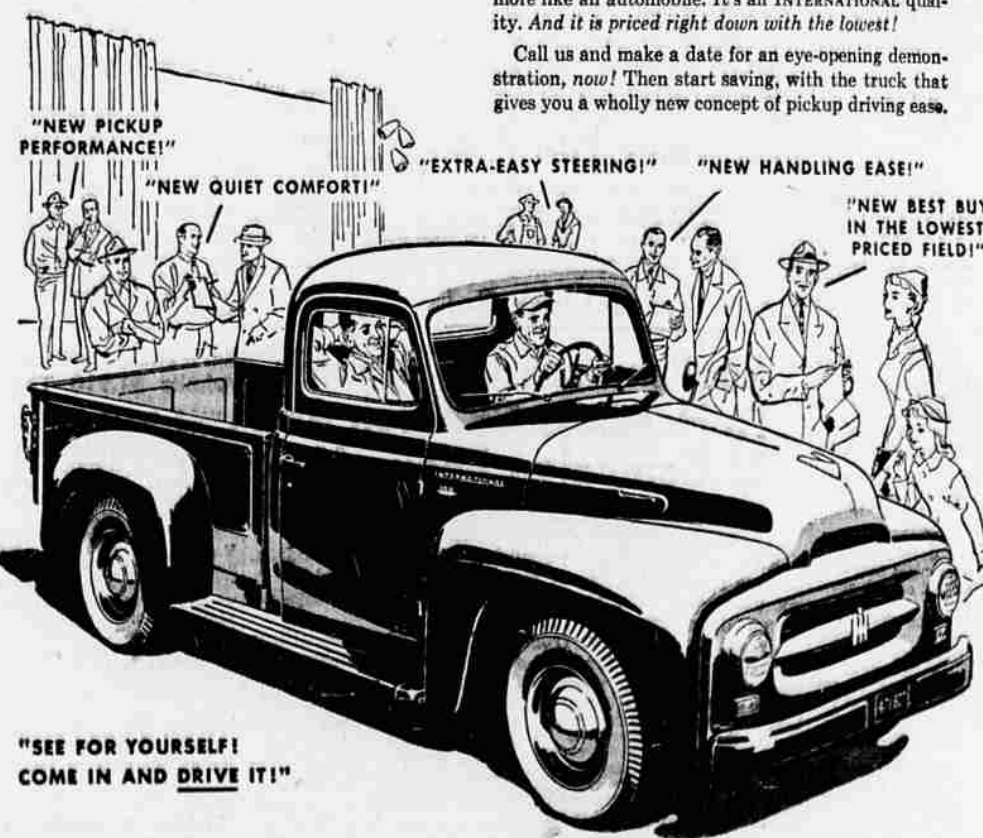
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
