

Anonymous Telephone Calls Force Family Out

PORTLAND (U) — Anonymous telephone calls forced a Negro family to move out of a house in the northeast section of Portland, the Urban League reported Friday.

Edwin C. Berry, executive director of the league, said that Mrs. Ivelia Kimmons, and her four children, ages 15 months to 11 years, became frightened after receiving the calls and moved out. The callers questioned Mrs. Kimmons' right to be in the house.

The house, owned by Mrs. Ma Linda Bradwell who also is a Negro, is located in a neighborhood where Negroes and whites live side by side.

Mrs. Bradwell said she too had trouble while living in the house.

Traffic Deaths In Oregon Reach 21 During March

Twenty-one persons died in Oregon traffic collisions during March, a figure substantially below that recorded in February when deaths skyrocketed to 42, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reports.

State traffic safety officials cautioned, however, that the March toll still could go higher if delayed death reports are received or if persons injured later die.

Worst accident of the month occurred in Deschutes county when two cars collided, killing four people. It was the only multiple death accident reported.

Safety men said the March record this year was eight below that of last year and, in view of the February count, "a surprisingly low toll."

So far this year, 85 persons have died in traffic, two less than the count at the same time last year, but safety men said months carrying the heaviest traffic volume are still ahead. No accurate traffic death picture will begin to take shape until spring and summer records are known.

Continued emphasis on accident prevention efforts throughout the state, and especially those aimed at improving individual driver attitudes, were urged by officials.

Reuther Backs Bishop's Stand On McCarthy

CHICAGO (U) — The CIO and UAW, says President Walter P. Reuther, agree with Bishop Bernard J. Sheil's criticism of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) as a "noisy anti-Communist headline hunter."

The bishop, in a speech before a UAW-CIO Education Conference Friday, said it is time "to cry out against the phony anti-Communism that mocks our way of life, flouts our traditions and Democratic procedures and our sense of fair play."

Replying to the bishop's address, which was cheered by some 2,500 members, Reuther said:

"We are happy to join with you in this fight against political immorality in America. Communists

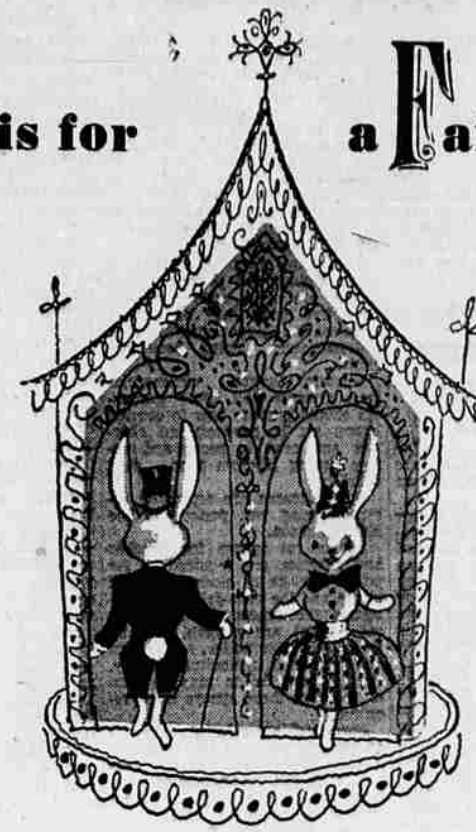
Coast Fork, the licensee for radio station KSGA, Cottage Grove, was paid \$27,200 for the station by Bagley.
