

Romania Frees Son Of Man Who Balked At Spying

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP)—Communist Romania Monday freed the two young sons of Valeriu C. Georgescu, a Romanian-born American who had refused to be blackmailed into spying to win their release.

Misty-eyed, the father and sons were reunited in West Germany. It was the first time Georgescu had seen the boys since 1947—when he and his wife left Bucharest on a two-month visit to the United States.

"As a representative of American capital he was president of the Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey in Romania; they wouldn't let me come back," he said, "and refused to let our sons join us."

The boys are Constantin, now 19, and Peter 15, who smiled as they talked with their father. Mrs. Georgescu remained in New York. "I hardly recognized them," Georgescu said, "they have grown so much."

He said the boys were allowed to leave Romania because of the help of the U.S. State Department. He said he would rather not divulge details.

"All I want to say," he said, "is that we're most grateful to those who helped us."

Police Wound Burglar, Two Pals Make Getaway

MOSES LAKE, Wash. (AP)—Police said three burglars were caught in the act early Monday and that one of them was shot and seriously wounded in a chase that followed. The other two escaped.

Sheriff C. E. Anderson said a man identified as James Jackson of Louisiana was struck in the hip and captured in the Mae Valley near here.

He was taken to Spokane for surgery after X-ray pictures showed a bullet broke his pelvis.

Anderson said the three men fled after officers found them hauling away the safe of the Thompson Equipment Co. They had a jeep that had been stolen, he said.

Don't Be Concerned Over Teen-Agers' Dance Craze Advises Dancing Instructor

If you are worrying about the jitterbug jive of your teen-ager, don't.

It's all an expression of America's great new vitality in appreciation of the dance, says Kyra Nijinsky, daughter of the late great Yslav Nijinsky, high priest of the ballet and the modern dance.

A vibrant brunette with a volcanic manner, Miss Nijinsky has been in America for less than two months, teaching classic ballet at the Ballet Arts School in New York and training her own group for television and concert appearances. She says:

"Dancing in America is at the world's highest level. Here you are so vital, so alive, so conscious of every form of the dance. This country is on the verge of a great renaissance of the art of the dance. And I hope to be a part of it."

Trained as a dancer since the age of 6 by her famous father, she seems to find it difficult to sit

still, and has the air of a bird arrested in flight when she sits down. Even then her eyes are dancing, her hands illustrating her words in motion. She says:

"Any kind of dancing is good—even this jitterbug craze of which you speak. It's all a part of the whole urge of this young, great country to express emotion through movement—and that is good."

"There has been too much snobbery about the dance. The classic ballet has been too formalized, too revered by its exponents. I believe in a freer, more pliable technique. Of course, one must know the ballet first, but one need not be bound by its forms."

"In school I teach the traditional ballet, but with my own group I use my own methods. The classic ballet cannot fully express this modern, rushing age of ours. And that is what I am trying to interpret in motion."

Miss Nijinsky had her own dance school in Florence for eight years before coming to New York, and has lectured widely throughout Europe.

Parental Love Said Big Factor In Child Care

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Children can be deprived of nearly all the amenities of home life without going wrong as long as they know they have the love and respect of their parents, a pediatrician who specializes in behavior problems asserted Tuesday.

"Youngsters don't get into

trouble because their mother takes a job and is away from home a lot of the time," Dr. Harry Bakwin, of New York City, told a news conference at the American Academy of Pediatrics.

"Kids are sturdier than that," he said. "They can take a lot of things if they have parental affection."

Children lacking this affection,

however, can get into trouble no matter what parents do toward guiding them, Dr. Bakwin said.

The main cause of children having difficulty at school, the specialist added, is a handicap in reading that is not due to eye trouble. This, he said, is an inborn or inherited defect which exists in 10 to 15 per cent of the school population.

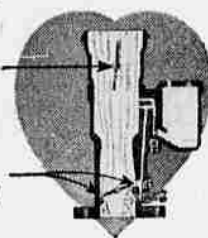

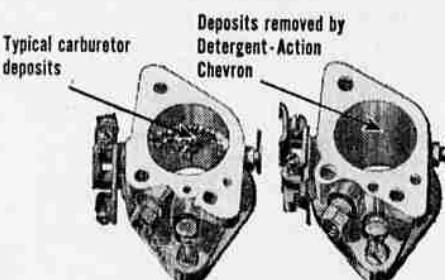
