

Gambling Tax Dodge Admitted By Spokane Man

TACOMA (AP)—Harry Silverman of Spokane entered a plea of guilty Monday in U.S. district court here to failure to pay the federal gambling tax.

A two-count information was filed against Silverman in March, 1953, to which he had entered innocent pleas. It was his plea to the second count which the Spokane man changed Monday. Count one alleges he failed to file a tax return as required by law. He did not change his plea to this count.

U. S. District Judge George H. Boyd heard brief arguments as to which of two possible penalties should be imposed on Silverman. The government contends he is liable for sentencing under a law

which included a possible prison sentence and maximum \$10,000 fine. Silverman's attorney, Gerald Shucklin of Seattle, urged a lesser penalty of a fine with a \$1,000 minimum and a \$5,000 maximum.

New Benefits Are Offered Marines

Sgt. Marvin L. Cox, U.S. Marine Corps recruiter covering Douglas County and the surrounding area, reports that the Marine Corps is now offering new benefits for any man discharged from the corps while holding the rank of sergeant or below.

A man who was discharged as a private, private first class, corporal or sergeant can be guaranteed one of the three following options if he reenlists in the regular Marine Corps:

(1) Assignment to duty in the geographic area of his choice.
(2) Retraining in the military occupational field of his choice.
(3) Assignment to a school or course of instruction of his choice.

Cox also says that a man who was discharged while holding the rank of sergeant or below can come back on active duty in the Marine Corps Reserve at his former rank regardless of his date of discharge. Returning as a reserve, he can be integrated into the regular Marine Corps on request to his commanding officer.

Any ex-Marine who seeks further information on the above matters should contact Cox at Douglas County courthouse, in Roseburg.

The Marine recruiter also urges any other persons who are interested in the Marine Corps to get in touch with him in person or write to him in care of the Marine Recruiting Office, county courthouse.

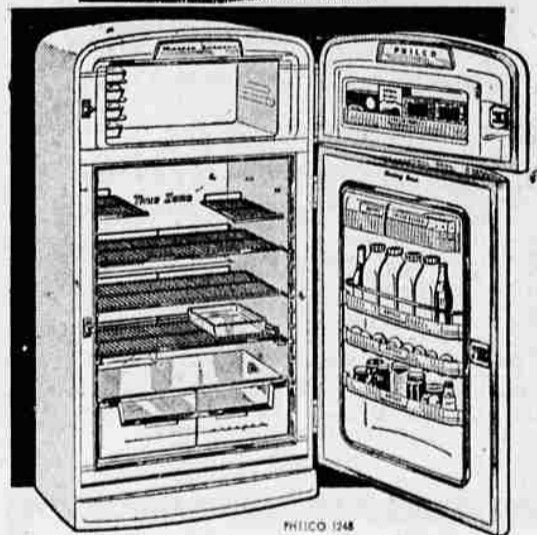
