

Meek Winner Of Primaries In Illinois Vote

CHICAGO (U)—Joseph T. Meek, who calls himself a "no-label, un-hyphenated Republican," romped off with the Illinois GOP senatorial nomination early today in the nation's first primary of 1954.

The 50-year-old head of an organization of 60,000 Illinois merchants, Meek said he would support most but not necessarily all of President Eisenhower's policies. But he says, too, he is neither a Taft-Republican nor an Eisenhower-Republican.

Yesterday's balloting produced no surprises, no upsets, no real tests on national issues, and probably the lightest vote of any Illinois primary in at least 10 years.

All 25 Illinois House members were renominated, including four committee chairmen who overpowered varying degrees of competition.

In next November's Senate race, it will be Meek, a man who never has run for public office, before, against Paul H. Douglas, a first-term Democrat.

Douglas had no opponent in the Democratic primary.

Meek easily outdistanced Edward A. Hayes and left seven others in a nine-man field strung out back in the dust. Hayes is a former national commander of the American Legion.

Robert B. Chipfield, chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, finally beat back the challenge of Atty. Lawrence Stickell and took the Republican Congressional nomination in a district he has represented 16 years.

Harold H. Velde, chairman of the Un-American Affairs Committee, had an easier time of it with Robert Allison, a state representative for 20 years.

Chairman Leo Allen of the Rules Committee pushed past three opponents with no trouble, and Chairman Chas. Reed of the Judiciary Committee took a pair of contestants into camp.

Yesterday, Eisenhower named Norman P. Mason, a Massachusetts lumber dealer, to serve as acting F.H.A. commissioner while the executive branch—the parent Housing and Home Finance Agency and the FBI—pushes its probe.

Ag. Department Fund Increase Appears Certain

WASHINGTON (U)—The House Appropriations Committee appeared to be on the run today before a coalition drive to give the Agriculture Department a bigger budget than it sought.

Rep. H. Carl Anderson (R-Minn.), managing the bill for the committee, said he was doubtful if he could hold the line when the House resumes today consideration of actual money allotments.

Anderson told newsmen he would oppose all proposals to boost appropriations recommended by an Appropriations subcommittee, of which he is chairman. But, he added, "a lot of pressure apparently has been applied from somewhere to raise the figures."

Anderson's subcommittee, with full committee approval, held the Agriculture Department's request at \$698,741,813 in new cash it requested but boosted by \$45,000,000 the \$743,741,813 it sought in new lending authority for the fiscal year starting July 1.

In the first test of strength Monday, the committee was upset 10-7. The House voted to add \$2,198,635 for research activities.

Northwest Power Companies File For Incorporation

SALEM, Ore. (U)—Five Pacific Northwest power companies filed incorporation papers here Tuesday, creating a firm which plans to build at least two major dams for 500 million dollars.

The new corporation, named the Pacific Northwest Power Co., is headed by Kinsey M. Robinson, who also is president of the Washington Water Power Co.

He said the new firm plans to build dams at the Bruce Eddy and the Penny Cliffs sites on the Clearwater River in Idaho.

Pacific Northwest Power, with 50 million dollars of capital stock, is prepared to finance construction of the dams, Robinson said. The firm would consider adding any public power agency which might wish to join.

The dams—Bruce Eddy on the north fork of the river above Orofino and Penny Cliffs on the middle fork above Kootenai, would produce 536,000 kilowatts of power.

Construction of dams at these two locations is feasible according to reports from Army Engineers who surveyed them as possible government projects.

The five companies, before incorporating the new firm, received permission for engineering studies of the sites. The studies have not yet been completed.

Incorporators in the new firm besides Robinson are: J. E. Corlette, president of Montana Power Co.; Paul B. McKee, president of Pacific Power & Light; Thomas W. Deitel, board chairman of Portland General Electric; and A. W. Trimble, president of Mountain States Power Co.

District 4 Budget Set At \$2.4 Million Figure

tal outlay. Last year, the figure was only \$775,000 to cover options on three pieces of property. This year, the amount necessary to buy the land has been included in the budget. That figure is \$62,440.

The new sites are in East Roseburg, Hucrest in northwest Roseburg and on north Broadway in West Roseburg.

Following is a list of the major items:

GENERAL CONTROL (\$52,160)—Last year the figure was \$45,074.50, but this year the assistant superintendent's salary was included and \$1,000 more for supplies for a new bookkeeping system.

INSTRUCTION (\$1,194,065.25)—Last year's figure was \$1,048,404.28, but new teachers and increment raises boosted it.

OPERATION OF PLANT (\$264,382.50)—Last year's figure was \$160,937. More buildings have to be heated, lighted and serviced.

MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS (\$88,338.67)—Last year's figure was \$85,197.96. More buildings have to be maintained.

AUXILIARY AGENCIES (\$201,665.80)—Last year's figure was \$199,295, but it did not include bus service for Garden Valley students.

FIXED CHARGES (\$80,337.65)—Last year the figure was \$77,615. More insurance and retirement was necessary by expansion of system.

CAPITAL OUTLAY (\$183,595.71)—Last year's figure was \$111,561.34, but the budget board decided to pay cash for property rather than pay interest on a bond issue.

DEBT SERVICE (\$226,200)—Last year's figure was \$239,128. Bond retirement is the same as last year, and interest is down.

EMERGENCY FUND (\$25,000)—Same as last year's figure.

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Kiwanians Hear Brief Talks On Department Activities In Roseburg School System

Roseburg Kiwanians Tuesday noon heard brief explanations of five fields of activity in Roseburg Public Schools by school personnel. They were introduced by Kenneth Barneburg, county school superintendent.

Miss Naomi Dietz, art supervisor for the elementary schools, explained that art, as taught now, has emphasis on the development of children's thinking and character, instead of on the product. She said that children now are learning to live through their other studies with aid of art.

Mrs. Helen Allen, school lunch coordinator, pointed out the importance of providing pupils with midday nourishment, which, as she put it, is better than "running out for a bag of popcorn."

Bob George, athletic director for secondary classes, predicted an upswing in Roseburg athletic fortunes through the scheduling of many home games in football and basketball for next year. Of nine football games, five will be played here; 13 of 22 basketball contests will be in Roseburg.

George said that the loss of Dick Ballantyne to another job and probable loss of Wayne Anderson to the service will mean that other coaches will take up their duties. There probably won't be others hired to replace them. The coaches, he said, teach full time in addition to their coaching duties.

Athletes at the high school have to pay strict attention to training rules, said George. "We'll tolerate no hot shots," he commented. He added that all athletic costs are paid for out of gate receipts.

Guy Davis, buildings and maintenance supervisor, told the club that he hopes to instill a feeling of belonging to the district to the custodial staff through a series of schools held on Saturdays. He pointed out that each of the staff holds a valued position in the post, being responsible for upkeep of several thousands of dollars worth of school property each.

There are 35 full-time and five part-time employees to take care of 14 school sites with 32 buildings. Cliff Norris, vice principal of Central Junior High School, expects both junior highs to get full usage from the students next year. The enrollment of the two schools probably will be increased next fall from the present 715 students to about 835. Joseph Lane School, while not completely equipped, will offer the same academic program and activities as does the central school. Both schools will have seventh and eighth graders next year, he said.
