

Canyonville Defeats Glide, Days Creek In Tri-Meet

Canyonville defeated Days Creek and Glide in a triangular meet held on Roseburg's Finlay Field Tuesday by scoring 83 points. Days Creek was second with 35 and Glide tallied 30.

Canyonville took eight clear-cut first places and tied for another. George Allen of the winners picked up first in the high jump, the discus, the 440-yard dash and ran a leg on the winning relay team to lead all scoring.

In addition to Allen's performance, Bob Babb of Days Creek came closest to turning in a top performance when he tossed the javelin 132-4 to win first place in that event.
