Local Sorority Starts Plan To Eliminate Death Traps

No one would willingly murder a child.

No one would thinkingly leave a hazardous trap for a child to blunder into. Yet, in this city as in many others across the nation, potential deathtraps litter backyards and vacant lots, while the owners sit complacently by, little realizing that such conditions are within their power to control.

Members of the Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority, many of them mothers, decided to do something about it, and so have started a city-wide campaign to see that hazardous conditions are taken care of.

To point up their drive, they have on display in front of the J.C. Penney store, an old icebox, harmless-looking in itself, but a real hazard when left abandoned and within easy reach of a child. Chairman Gerry Moore, spearheading the drive, points out that merely removing the latch on the box renders the icebox harmless.

Abandoned iceboxes, she adds, are only one hazard. Some others are water-filled ditches, open well shafts, abandoned cars, lumber piles and poison garden sprays. Stories from other areas, relating fatal accidents involving such conditions, underline the present campaign.

Newby States Planform For Governor Candidacy

in the Motor Vehicle Division in his tenure as an example.

Soon after Newby took office, he started a program of retooling or leasing new building on State Highway Dept. property for use by the division, he related.

The plan at first met with stiff opposition, but Newby contended in his talk that the people now expect local servicing of drivers and motor vehicles licenses.

He said he believes that other services should be put on a local level maintaining that it can be done. The governor, he claimed, would be able to have authority in putting them there.

He explained that he hadn't time to discuss fully all the plans he has, if elected, but picked out five topics to talk on briefly. They were: tourist trade, industry and power, traffic safety, homestead exemptions and establishment of a department of commerce.

Here, in condensed form, are Candidate Newby's ideas:

1. Tourism: Oregon has more things to see and do than any other state. The present income of the industry can be doubled from \$125 million. It should be made easy for people to come back to the state in the future.

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Ceramics Plant Sited For Camas Valley Area

production upon completion of the plant will be common and face brick, roman and norman bricks and drain and building tile. Later, floor and roof tile may be added to the firm's line.

Brick and tile, Richmond said, have been proven to last longer in damp climates.

Previously, most of the tile and brick supply in this area had been supplied from plants at Klamath Falls and Monroe, north of Eugene.

Richmond said the owner of the land had suspected value of the deposit, and was assured when he sent four samples to Dr. Joseph Pask, professor of ceramics at the University of California at Berkeley.

Pask's report revealed two of the samples would make satisfactory structural clay products, and mixed with the other two, still would produce good building materials.

An inspection of the site by a representative of the clay products industry on the Pacific Coast substantiated Pask's findings.

With the report, Pask included several samples of manufacture. The nature of the clay is such that, by varying temperatures in the kilns, brick of various colors can be produced. Quality, said Richmond, equals or betters any other clay in Oregon.

The incorporators now are studying the types of kilns, fuel and equipment which will be suitable to the local situation. There is no scheduled date for start of production.

Richmond pointed out an advantage in the site. He said all transport of the products will be downhill into Douglas and Coos counties. The group also is surveying possibility of sales in Lane, Curry, Jackson and Josephine counties.

First steps in construction of the factory will be stripping of a top layer of soil, development of the pits and road building.

The bonds will be advertised for sale in \$1,000 denominations and bids will be accepted at the next school board meeting May 12. The bonds will be retired over a 10-year period.

The issue will finance construction of 12 classrooms, multipurpose, health and library rooms and a heating plant.

With approval of the bond issue, voters received a bonus in the form of a \$100,000 gift for building of a swimming pool at the school site. Donors were Howard Hindsdale, the Umpqua Navigation Co. and the Umpqua National Bank.

The district school board already had hired a swimming coordinator, Ed Porwoll, who will conduct classes for both Reedsport elementary schools, Gardiner Elementary School and Reedsport Union High School.

A new junior high school also will use the pool. The school board had set up the district to tentatively operate on a junior high basis, and now seventh and eighth grade students from Scottsburg to Winchester Bay will attend junior high in the old union high school building.

State Rests Case In Bouse Murder Trial; Recording Of Confession Is Played

Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults rested the state's case against Thomas Sylvanus Bouse about 4:30 p.m. Wednesday after calling 10 witnesses to the stand in three hours.

The case progressed rapidly after 2 1/2 days of selecting a jury. Highlight of Wednesday afternoon's session was the playing of a dramatic wire recording taken the night of the day Ethel Bouse died. The 11-minute recording was made at Community Hospital where Bouse was being treated for self-inflicted wrist and neck lacerations.

In it, Bouse told of drowning his wife in the bathtub at the family residence, 726 S. Pine St. "It wasn't hard for me to hold her in the bathtub," he said, explaining that he used only one hand.

"I tried to kill myself," he continued, "I thought it would be easy, but I laid there all day." He said he tried to hold his own head under the water, but couldn't do it. Testimony revealed he then slashed his wrist and neck, but the wounds were not too deep.

In the statement, Bouse said the drowning of his wife took place at 10:10 a.m. "It only took me 10 minutes," he said. He said his wife had been tired and worn out and mentioned several times that she wished she were dead. He said he decided to do it that morning.

It was about 5 p.m. before officers were called to the scene.

Before the recording was heard by the jury, there was an objection to it entered by Ray B.

Compton, defense attorney. A conference of prosecution and defense attorneys and Judge James E. Bain then followed. After terminating the statement, an extra-judicial confession, the recording was played. With no further objections by Compton, it was replayed for the jury, which had been excused for a few minutes.

Virginia Bouse, now Virginia Queen, entered the courtroom long enough to relate her knowledge of the case. She said the first inkling of the tragedy, Oct. 8, 1952, was when she called home after school. She said her father answered the phone and told her something terrible had happened. She called a neighbor and asked him to investigate. It was the neighbor who summoned police.

Stults asked her if her mother ever indicated she didn't want to live. Mrs. Queen answered, "definitely not." She said she and her mother had talked over future plans, including Christmas affairs. Mrs. Queen now lives in Corvallis.

Other witnesses called by the state were state police officer Joseph A. C. Haystead, who investigated the crime and took the recorded statement; city police Sgt. William R. Burke, who was called to the scene and who summoned an ambulance for Bouse; city police Sgt. Vernon Murdoch, who helped guard Bouse at the hospital; former city officer Dean Davis, who also was a guard; Vernon L. Perry, hospital attendant; Charles Kash, who took photographs of the scene; Dr. George N. Lenci Jr., who performed an autopsy on the body of the victim; Roy Hebard, a neighbor of the Bouses at the time of the incident; and Shirley Brennan, an acquaintance of Mrs. Queen.

Burke and Hebard both quoted the defendant as saying, "I finally did it." Burke also told of a note allegedly written by Bouse to the Bouse children. It allegedly was written after Mrs. Bouse was dead and Bouse was going to commit suicide.

Dr. Lenci's testimony established that Ethel Bouse died of drowning. He said examination revealed some pinpoint hemorrhages which could have resulted from strangulation or struggling to breathe. He said abrasions on the body were probably a few days old.

Officer Haystead, while on the stand, told of the conditions under which the body of Mrs. Bouse was found lying beside the bathtub in the home. He said the back of her hair was somewhat disarranged, but that the front was neatly put up in pin curls. One pin was lying in the water in the tub. Sgt. Burke had testified the water was 8 1/2 inches deep and wasn't discolored.

Former policeman Davis said the defendant was very talkative at the hospital while under police guard. He said Bouse told him he was not angry at the time the drowning occurred.

One witness, Dr. D. C. Burks, a Portland psychiatrist, was called as a defense witness, although originally summoned as a state's witness. He said he believed Bouse to be legally sane, that the defendant might be considered an emotionally unstable person with a quick temper, but that he would not term him an inadequate personality. He examined Bouse twice this year, once in Portland and once at the county jail here.

The jury for the trial was finally selected shortly after 11 a.m. Wednesday, but only after 64 prospective jurors had been examined.

Local Man, 85, Called By Death

Henry A. Germiquet, 85, resident of S. Main street, died early this morning.

He was born Dec. 8, 1868, in Neosho County, Mo. He was a former resident of Beaverton. He moved here 11 years ago to make his home. He was a member of the First Christian Church.

Surviving are three daughters, Mrs. Maurice (Alta) Griesel and Mrs. Robert (Mina) Harris, both of Roseburg; Mrs. Thomas (Ruth) James, Edgemont, SD; a son, Ben Germiquet, Forest Grove, and three grandchildren.

The body has been moved to The Chapel of The Good Shepherd Funeral Home, and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Gordon Elzie Clayton Held On Charge Of Rape

Gordon Elzie Clayton, 18, Dillard, has asked for preliminary hearing after he pleaded innocent Wednesday to a charge of statutory rape, according to District Judge Elmer Baldwin.

Clayton, arrested by state police Tuesday, was freed on \$1,000 bond. Date of the hearing was not set. The act allegedly involved a minor girl.

Rites Postponed For Mrs. Henry

Funeral services for Mrs. Evelyn Rosalie Henry, who was drowned last weekend when her car skidded into the South Umpqua River near Myrtle Creek, have been postponed until Friday.

The postponement was called because a son, Patrick, who is in the armed services in Korea, has not yet arrived for the rites. He was expected to arrive Tuesday, but no word has yet been heard from him.

The funeral was originally scheduled Thursday. It has been re-scheduled at 2 p.m. Friday in Gant Mortuary, Myrtle Creek.
