

Supt. Deller Says Roseburg School Budget Comparable To Other District Budgets

Roseburg's School Supt. M. C. Deller was shuddering at the size of the items in the proposed 1954-55 budget, so he decided to make a comparison by items with the averages in the rest of the state. What he found was that other schools are apparently spending just about equal percentages of their budgets on the same items. What pleased him even more was the fact that the biggest item in the Roseburg budget, instruction, was almost 5 per cent below the state average.

This major item, for which the district is asking \$1,194,085.25, amounts to 67.5 per cent of the entire budget. On the state level, the average is 72.47. Other big items in the budget were also below the state norm. General control, which includes superintendent's office, clerks, elections and census, amounted to 2.95 per cent of the budget. For the state, it was 3.82. Maintenance costs will come to 4.93 per cent for Roseburg, but reach 6.01 on the state level. Fixed charges, which include insurance, retirement, etc., will make up 4.34 per cent in Roseburg, while for the state it is 5.77.

Three of the items were over the state norm. Operation of the plant, which includes light, heat, services and supplies, was 11.56

President Gets Massive Highway Building Measure

WASHINGTON (AP)—A bill calling for 966 million dollars a year in federal highway financing—the biggest sum ever voted by Congress for the purpose—is on President Eisenhower's desk.

The President is considered certain to sign the measure since he had recommended a big boost in federal road outlays, although not quite as much as Congress voted.

Of the 966-million total in the bill, 875 million would go to states in grants and be matched, much of it on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

However, the new expanded program would not take effect until fiscal 1956 beginning July 1, 1955. The 966-million spending rate is authorized for fiscal 1956 and 1957. Congress normally acts this far ahead on the road spending bill so that the states can carry forward their planning.

The total in the bill compares with 632 million authorized for the current year and for fiscal 1955, which begins this July 1.

Farm Bureau Meet Rouses Interest In Glendale Area

The Glendale-Azalea area Farm Bureau met recently for a meeting which centered on soil conservation. An out-of-town speaker discussed the purpose and method of forming a soil conservation district and showed a motion picture on the subject.

Bud Knowles from the Douglas Forest Protective Assn. discussed the survey of farm lands, recently completed, and how the farmer might make sure his farm timber or grazing land was properly classified and protected.

Petition Discussed
In the discussions it was brought out that a conservation district has already been formed in the coastal section of the county and in the northern section of the county. Twenty-five names as a petition would be sufficient to start a soil conservation district in southern Douglas County its purpose is to make a group eligible for a free government survey of all the farms whose owners are interested with advice and help to be given free of charge from the county agent's office.

Much interest was expressed in the project not only from the standpoint of improvement of farming methods but from the standpoint of a cooperative effort which might help to stop the washing away of farm lands by Cow Creek in its flood seasons. Other meetings are being arranged for a soil conservation group.

According to Elwood Cox, scout committee member in Glendale, the Multnomah Plywood Co., which has a branch plant in Glendale, has pledged to donate 65 sheets of plywood toward building materials for the scout center. The donation was promised after Ralph Hodges, resident manager, and A. Hink, office manager, Glendale, presented the community need to a stockholders' meeting at a recent date.

Part of the concrete work for the foundation of the new building has been completed, and it is hoped that a good crew of volunteers will be on hand Saturday to continue the job.

Ike Pledges Troops For European Defense

ican troops "as may be necessary and appropriate to contribute its fair share of the forces needed for the joint defense of the North Atlantic area while a threat to that area exists."

2. The United States will consult with fellow signatories to the North Atlantic Treaty and with the EDC nations "on questions of mutual concern," including the armed forces strength to be placed at the disposal of the supreme commander in Europe, Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther.

3. The United States will encourage the closest possible integration between EDC forces on the one hand, and U.S. and North Atlantic Treaty forces on the other.

4. The United States will continue "in conformity with my recommendations to Congress, to seek means of extending to the Atlantic community increased security by sharing in greater measure information with respect to the military utilization of new weapons and techniques for the improvement of the collective defense."

5. In line with its policy of "full and continuing support for maintenance and the integrity and unity of EDC, the United States will regard any action from whatever quarter which threatens that integrity or unity as a threat to the security of the United States." In such event, the President said, the United States would consult with the other North Atlantic Treaty nations.

6. The United States regards the North Atlantic Treaty—now as at the time of its ratification—as a part of "indefinite duration." On that point the President said, the United States would consult with the other North Atlantic Treaty nations.

"The United States calls attention to the fact that for it to cease to be a party to the North Atlantic Treaty would appear quite contrary to our security interests when there is established on the continent of Europe the solid core of unity which the European Defense Community will provide."

National Forest Timber For Sale

(Limpy Mountain Area)

Oral auction bids will be received by the regional forester or his authorized representative at the office of the forest supervisor, Postoffice Building, Roseburg, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 p.m., Pacific Standard Time, June 7, 1954, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 342 acres within sections 2, 3, 4, 9, 10, 11, 14, and 15, T. 27 S., R. 1 E., W.M., unsurveyed, Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 26,340,000 board feet, more or less, of Douglas-fir; 450,000 board feet, more or less, of Western white pine and sugar pine; 1,700,000 board feet, more or less, of Western hemlock and other species of saw-timber. No bid of less than \$4.10 per M board feet for Douglas-fir; \$2.55 per M board feet for Western white pine and sugar pine; and \$1.40 per M board feet for Western hemlock and other species will be considered. Accepted bid prices will apply for all timber cut prior to May 1, 1956. On that date rates will be subject to redetermination but in no event will they be established at less than the above stated minimum for stumpage and stand improvement, and in no event will rates be higher than those established for a particular species until the quantity of that species scaled and paid for equals or exceeds the following amounts: Douglas-fir, 13,000,000 board feet; White pine and sugar pine, 200,000 board feet; Western hemlock and other species, 800,000 board feet. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$0.07 per M board feet, to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal, and a cooperative deposit of \$0.35 per M board feet, to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. As a qualification for oral bidding, all bidders must submit a sealed bid accompanied by the required payment to the forest supervisor prior to 2:00 p.m., Pacific Standard Time, June 7, 1954. Sealed bids will be posted at the beginning of the auction for the information of all bidders. \$8,000.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale. If an oral bid is declared to be high at the closing of the auction, the bidder must immediately cash the bid by submitting a Forest Service bid form for use in submitting sealed bids and full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the district ranger, Glendale Ranger Station, the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, or the regional forester, Portland, Oregon, before bids are submitted.
