Bao Dai Arrives Late For Dulles Appointment

PARIS (U.P.) — Bao Dai, one-time emperor and now chief of state of Viet Nam, arrived in Paris Thursday—12 hours too late to meet U. S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

What Bao Dai did between his departure from Cannes in a fast automobile at 4:30 a.m. Wednesday and Thursday morning no one seems to know. It's only 800 miles from Cannes to Paris, and Bao Dai left Cannes with a motorcycle escort.

Bao Dai arrived in Cannes Sunday in connection with current negotiations between his government and France on terms of Viet Nam's independence.

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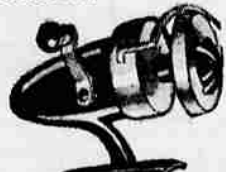
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
