Willys Employees Take Voluntary Cut In Pay

TOLEDO, Ohio, (AP)—So that their employer can better compete with other auto makers, production employees of Willys Motors, Inc., have voted to take a pay cut of as much as 10 per cent.

The vote was taken after Richard T. Gossier, vice president of the CIO United Auto Workers, told the employees the cut is necessary to stabilize Willys' economic position. Part of the loss may be recovered if a new bonus pay plan can be worked out.

The new pay plan does not affect basic hourly wages, but has the effect of eliminating incentive pay, awarded workers who produce more than a fixed norm for their jobs.

Spring Timber Sales Announced By Forest Service

Two more in a series of big spring timber sales has been set by the Umpqua National Forest for June 7 in the supervisor's office in Roseburg.

The two tracts contain a total of 47,190,000 board feet with an appraised valuation of \$239,481.34.

Accepted bid prices on each will apply for all timber cut prior to May 1, 1934, and will be subject to readetermination on that date.

The biggest of the two parcels is located in the Limpy Mountain area near the head of Little River. It contains 28,490,000 board feet appraised at \$131,421.50. By species, stumpage is advertised at: 26,340,000 feet of Douglas fir \$4.10 a thousand; 450,000 feet of western white pine and sugar pine \$24.55; and 1,700,000 feet of hemlock and others \$1.40.

In addition, a deposit of 7 cents a thousand is required for slash disposal and 35 cents a thousand for planting.

The other tract is located in the Hiltner Bluff area on Steamboat Creek. It includes 18,700,000 board feet of timber appraised at \$132,060. By species, stumpage is advertised at: 17,500,000 feet of Douglas fir at \$5.70 a thousand; 800,000 feet of sugar pine, ponderosa pine and western white pine at \$27.40; and 400,000 feet of hemlock and others at \$1 a thousand.

Deposits of 10 cents a thousand for slash disposal and 40 cents a thousand for planting are required.
