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Vaughn Outlines Umpqua River Salmon History

Jim Vaughn of Roseburg, regional director of the Oregon State Game Commission, outlined the history of the commission's salmon propagation in the Umpqua River system at a meeting Friday night of Council 8, Oregon Wildlife Federation.

Vaughn was one of several speakers at the meeting, held at the Yoncalla Trap & Rifle Club house.

Bill Poseau of the Lower Umpqua Rod & Gun Club outlined the conservation problems of the Umpqua River area of Douglas County. He told of the progressive siltation and "dirtiness" of coastal streams and of the resultant destruction of spawning beds.

Poseau emphasized the need for a boat launching ramp at Reedsport to open up river recreational opportunities. Frank Taylor of Reedsport also expressed the need for closer cooperation with the land owner by the recreation seeker and outlined a simple plan for that purpose.

Ray Vinco of Cottage Grove reported on the game commission-sponsored "Show Me" trip to the Summer Lake area April 10 and 11.

John Amacher, a state representative, reported on legislation affecting wildlife on the state and local levels.

All clubs represented at the meeting gave reports of progress on current conservation programs and sporting events within the clubs. Clubs represented were Cottage Grove Rod & Gun Club, North Douglas Sportsman's Club, Yoncalla Trap & Rifle Club, Roseburg Rod & Gun Club and the Lower Umpqua Rod & Gun Club.

The grant-in-aid program of scholarships to grade school teachers to the Southern Oregon College conservation workshop was explained.

32 Persons To Graduate From Red Cross Class

Thirty-two persons will graduate from the Red Cross first aid class at Glendale April 25.

The group will present a demonstration of first aid at Richard Baker County Park, three miles above Rock Creek, the North Umpqua, with Bob Harvie and George Churchill directing them. There will be 10 demonstrations, all simulating common accidents.

Voter Registrations Will Close On Tuesday

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1 and Edenbower West No. 2 now form Edenbower West No. 3. West No. 1 remains the same otherwise, but West No. 2 now doesn't include Hucrest.

The East Umpqua and Toketee precincts have become three, designated East Umpqua, Glide and Toketee.

Green precinct now is Green, that part west of the Pacific Highway, and Parrott, that part of the old Parrott precinct plus the part of Green east of the highway.

The remainder of old Parrott becomes Park, which in turn includes the remainder of Brown left out in the annexation.

Civil Bend and Dillard are changed into three new precincts. They are East Civil Bend, east of Highway 99 and south of Highway 42 to Lookingglass Creek; Dillard, and West Civil Bend, west of Highway 99 and north of Highway 42.

In the northern part of the county, Drain is divided by Highway 38 into North Drain and South Drain. Yoncalla becomes East Yoncalla and West Yoncalla.

Oakland now is Oakland No. 1, north of the Medley-Elkhead Road and Oakland No. 2 south of the road.

Myrtle Creek, formerly with three precincts, has been divided into five, two of them rural. The former precincts were North Myrtle, South Myrtle No. 1 and South Myrtle No. 2. The precincts now are West Myrtle, all the area with entrance to Myrtle Creek over the bridge; Myrtle Creek No. 1; Myrtle Creek No. 2; Myrtle Creek No. 3; and East Myrtle Creek, all the old area east of the city.

Tri-City has been extended to the city limits of Myrtle Creek from the south.

Riddle now is East Riddle, south of the railroad and east of Riddle-Canyonville Road, and West Riddle, north of the railroad and west of the road.

Canyonville has been split into East Canyonville, east of the old highway and Main Street plus the canyon south, and West Canyonville, west of that area.

Glendale now is East Glendale, east of Mill Creek and on a line north from the mouth of the creek to the north boundary of the old precinct. West Glendale is that part of the old precinct west of the above area.

North Douglas Soil District Prospects Good

Prospects were still good today for organization of a North Douglas County Soil Conservation District after two public hearings Thursday and Friday.

The two hearings, called by the state Soil Conservation Committee, drew 51 people. They were conducted by Robert Baum, member of the state committee. Reactions at both meetings were favorable.

A unanimous voice of support was raised at the Sunnydale Grange meeting in Drain where 17 people turned out. The big meeting, however, was staged last night at the Oakland Legion Hall where 44 persons turned out. Again reaction was favorable.

Baum said he will report to the state committee at the meeting in mid May. At that time, he said, a decision will be made on whether to authorize a referendum or not. He said the referendum will probably be held in June if the state committee gives its stamp of approval.

At the two hearings, six people were suggested for nomination to a board of supervisors. Their names would appear on the ballot on which the vote will be made for or against the district. The six nominated were: L. C. Buck and Marvin Deeds of Drain, C. P. Huntington and Raphael Wise of Umpqua, and L. C. Perrin and Cal Hunter of Oakland. Mrs. Audrey Flury of Yoncalla was suggested as polling superintendent.

Also decided at the hearings were two tentative polling places. They are Drain and Oakland. All these moves are predicated, however, on authorization of the referendum by the state committee.

2 Postoffice Substations To Be Established Here

Bids have been called for establishment of two postoffice substations here, according to Postmaster Clyde Carstens. They will be opened on April 28.

One of the stations will be re-established in the Fairhaven District, where there was a station until June of last year. The second will be opened in the Riverside District of North Roseburg.

Carstens said that substations usually are located in a business establishment. The bidder must supply space, equipment and clerical help. Forms for bids are available at the postoffice.

Demand for the local services has been heavy in both sections, the postmaster said. Both contain substantial residential and business areas.

Former Days Creek Woman Dies At 83

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Nixon Hints U. S. May Send Indochina Troops

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the issue would have repercussions within the administration remained to be seen. Nixon has acted as spokesman for President Eisenhower on several recent occasions.

In outlining his views, Nixon repeated Eisenhower's words that "we cannot afford any retreat in Asia."

His statement, made yesterday to newsmen who were cautioned not to make public his name, included a prediction the French government is "going to be putting on the pressure" to negotiate an Indochina truce with the Communists at the April 26 Geneva Conference.

It was his opinion, the official said in a clear indication of American opposition to such a move, that such a truce would deliver Indochina to the Communists.

Although the official's declaration was regarded in some quarters as reflecting a National Security Council decision, the purported policy was challenged immediately by Republicans as well as Democrats.

Sen. Hickenlooper (R-Iowa), a Senate Foreign Relations Committee member, said in an interview he doesn't believe any decision has been made to use American troops in Indochina under any circumstances.

"If we have such a policy, I'd like to know about it," Hickenlooper said, "but I don't think we have."

tenced to die in the chamber on Jan. 16, 1953. An appeal filed by his attorneys on Jan. 13 stayed execution until the Oregon Supreme Court had a chance to review the case.

Finding certain errors in the first trial here, the Supreme Court last December remanded the case back and ordered a new trial for Bouse. Starting from scratch again, it was not easy to find 12 "fair and impartial" jurors in Douglas County. A total of 64 persons were examined before the jury was picked. The trial started Monday, with selection of the jury lasting until Wednesday noon.

Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults and his deputy, Warren A. Woodruff, prosecuted the case for the state. "B. Compton and Randolph Bloem, one of Bouse's original attorneys, were defense attorneys. The defense attorneys were appointed by Judge Carl E. Wimberly, who presided at the first trial, when Bouse signified he had no money to hire counsel.

Nervous diseases are apparently becoming more and more prevalent as time progresses. Among the most common perhaps should be mentioned the neuritis, neuritis and neurasthenia, which are so common today among the thousands who consult their physicians daily.

Neuritis, of which the chief symptom is pain, which comes on suddenly in paroxysms, followed by intervals of freedom from pain. Exposure to cold, dampness, or drafts of air is the commonest cause of the attack; but what the underlying cause may be in usually difficult or impossible to determine, though pressure and local inflammation are in most cases quite clearly responsible. The nerve trunks become tender to pressure. In severe cases there is twitching of the muscles of the affected area, with burning and tingling sensations in the skin. The pains are severe, and seem to shoot along the course of the affected nerves. The neuritic attacks are rarely of both sides at a time and usually continue from a few minutes to a few days, but may come frequently over a period of many months. As time goes on, they tend to become more severe.

Neuritis is an inflammation of a nerve or nerves. The most commonly affected are those in the back of the neck, in the shoulders and upper arm, the intercostal nerves and the sciatic nerves. Local neuritis is usually toxic in origin, being caused by bacterial toxins, metallic poisons, drugs, alcohol, deficiency states, etc. Multiple neuritis, which involves many nerves is usually due to some general debilitating disease or toxic condition.

Neurasthenia is characterized by irritable weakness and nervous exhaustion. There may be several attacks in a life-time. The usual cause of an attack is excessive nerve strain. Its manifestations vary greatly, but the most common are fatigue or great weariness after slight exertion and inability to perform the usual amount of mental and physical labor. There is a lack of ability to concentrate, mental depression, morbid fears, and attacks of palpitation and distress about the heart. The symptoms are so many and so varied that it is common for a person suffering from neurasthenia to imagine they are suffering from every disease they may have heard of or read of. The symptoms of neurasthenia do as a rule, and restoration to normal health is possible through, it may take some time. (Ed. adv.)
