Jobless Taxes For Employers In Oregon Drop

About 10,675 Oregon employers will share reductions of around \$15 million on unemployment taxes again in 1954 although the average rate is rising slightly and covered payrolls are lower than last year, according to just completed tabulations of the State Unemployment Compensation Commission.

Since the experience rating system went into effect 13 years ago, savings have amounted to over \$100 million. In the same period about \$125 million have been paid to unemployed workers, while \$62 million remains in reserve.

Average tax rate hit a low of 1.18 percent last year but is expected to reach 1.17 on 1954 payrolls. The rate has been declining almost steadily from the normal 2.7 percent since 1941.

New tabulations based on 1953 assessments and charges against some 17,000 individual accounts show 11,900 firms with four years' employment experience required to qualify for rate reductions. Of these, 1,227 did not have sufficient reserves to lower their taxes.

Of 111 employers reporting a million-dollar payroll or higher last year, 74 secured rates under 1 percent. For 1,351 firms reporting wages between \$100,000 and \$1,000,000 almost the same proportion were in the lower rate groups.

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Rhee Accepts Parley Bid, Wants-Red Ouster

SEOUL (AP) — President Syngman Rhee announced today that South Korea will attend the Geneva conference opening next week. But he warned it is "a final time-consuming attempt" to unite Korea by peaceful means.

He didn't say what his government would do if the conference fails. But there was a thinly veiled threat in his statement that "we obviously cannot continue to sit idly by while the Communists exterminate or exile our people to the North and make a Red Chinese province out of half our country."

The peppy 77-year-old President said "clear and encouraging" assurances from the United States "enable us to go to Geneva with confidence and considerable hope."

Foreign Minister Pyun Yung Tai, head of the ROK delegation to Geneva, said South Korea would not tolerate a buffer zone that would cut Korea in half. "Any buffer zone," he said, "must be north of the Yalu River." The Yalu is the boundary between Korea and Manchuria.

5,000 Pennies Pay Fee For Childbirth Service

ALAMOSA, Colo. (AP) — The family doctor was handed more than 5,000 pennies after Mrs. Arthur Cox gave birth to her fifth child, a daughter. It had been 12 years since Ronald, their first child, was paid for with 3,500 pennies saved by the couple.

The other three children, all girls, were paid for in saved nickels, dimes and quarters "because of the higher cost of living at the time," they explained.

direction in advance of the Geneva conference opening April 28. Dulles and the foreign ministers of Britain, France, and Russia will attend the conference. Red China will be represented but not in the role of a participant on equal footing.

The President's headquarters announced over the weekend that he will call on American Newspapers to help "transform an age of atomic hysteria and horror into an age of international understanding and cooperative peace."

The speech will be broadcast nationwide. Newsweek was told that the President will say that misconceptions of the aims and aspirations of the United States, as well as those of other free nations, reported and circulated here and abroad, often cause needless misunderstanding and friction between the governments and the free peoples of the world.

Eisenhower reportedly is deeply concerned about adverse reaction in some friendly foreign capitals to the United States' development and testing of the hydrogen bomb. He also is said to be concerned about such matters as India's criticism of this country for granting military aid to Pakistan.

Aid To Foreign Nations Hits 6 1/2 Billion Peak

WASHINGTON (AP) — United States aid to foreign nations hit a peak of nearly 6 1/2 billion dollars last year, but was tapering off at year end.

Military aid shot up rapidly during the year, the Department of Commerce said in a study of U. S. foreign aid, while economic aid tailed off. There was an increase in offshore procurement—U. S. purchases of military supplies for itself or allies from foreign countries.

Ex-POW Being Tried On Red-Aiding Charge

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cpl. Edward S. Dickenson goes on trial before an Army court-martial today on charges of collaborating with the Communist enemy while he was a prisoner of war in Korea.

The 23-year-old soldier from Crickler's Neck, Va., faces a maximum sentence of life imprisonment in this precedent-making trial. He is fighting the charges.

Dickenson was one of the 23 American POWs who first refused repatriation under the Korean armistice terms, but later he and one other POW changed their minds and came home.

Dickenson has maintained that whatever he may have done as a POW was under Communist pressure. He said he was forced to attend Red lectures but repeatedly objected. "I tried to escape," he said, "but I was captured and they forced me to do hard labor and beat me."

The prosecution will argue that Dickenson did not suffer at the hands of the Communists but that he informed on his buddies in an effort to curry favor for himself.

PRISONER HAS MUMPS

A prisoner in the county jail has broken out—with the mumps, that is.

Sheriff Cal Baird said, though, that the jail will remain open for guests. An attending doctor said that no one else had been exposed, and the prisoner was put under quarantine in an individual cell.
