

Portland Topped Out Of First Place By Twin Padre Victories

After two weeks of play the Pacific Coast League entries are hunched closer than the crowd for a spring clearance sale.

Double victories Sunday sent Los Angeles and San Diego into a first place tie with 9-6 records. Four other clubs including Portland and Seattle are just one-half game behind the leaders having played one less game.

Only the Hollywood Stars and the San Francisco Seals are off the pace. The Stars, champions the past two seasons and favored by many to repeat, finally showed signs of life Sunday in drubbing Oakland 14-3 and 8-4. That pulled them out of the cellar, one game ahead of San Francisco, but 4 1/2 behind the leaders.

Los Angeles beat the Seals Sunday 4-2 and 1-0; San Diego took two from Portland 6-0 and 7-5; and Seattle whipped Sacramento 10-2 and 11-6 in a set highlighted by an impromptu wrestling match. Hassles were frequent during Sunday's battles.

Seattle ended a six-game losing streak with the victories at Sacramento. Pitcher Al Widmar, who held an 8-2 lead at the time, was put out of the first game for wrestling with Sacramento's Hank Sohm after a play at first base.

Hollywood shortstop Jack Phillips belted two home runs, one with the bases loaded, in his club's sweep, The Stars' manager, Bob Bragan, and starting pitcher, Lino Donoso, were ejected in the third inning of the nightcap after an angry verbal exchange with umpire Jerry Van Keuren. And Donoso traded punches with an unidentified Oakland fan.

Police had to force milling, booing spectators back into the stands during the melee which delayed proceedings 15 minutes. Van Keuren had called a balk on Donoso, a Puerto Rican who speaks no English. The pitcher misunderstood the ruling and hurled the ball to the ground.

San Diego's Eddie Erault pitched a shutout, his second for the sea-

son and he didn't walk a batter. The Beavers collected six hits. The Padres scored four runs in the first inning to give Eddie a good lead.

Reliever Tommy Herrera held the Beavers hitless the final three innings of the second game as his mates came from behind with a five-run outburst in the seventh.

Adult Chinook Salmon Continue At Record Pace Past Winchester

Adult chinook salmon continue to pass through the Game Commission's counting station at Winchester in record numbers for this time of year.

William E. Pitney, field agent in charge of river studies, reports 171 fish tallied during the first two weeks of April, making a total of 207 for the season as of April 15, compared with a high record of 62 by the same date in

1951, the prior record for the same date.

The winter steelhead migration, nearing a close, also experienced considerable movement, with 1,149 fish counted during the first half of the month, making the season's total to date 8,418. While below some previous years, the migration is above average.
