Lodge Delivers Scorching Attack On Chinese Reds

NEW YORK (AP) Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, said Monday Red China is giving substantial aid to aggression in Indochina and that it is "unfit" to join the United Nations.

He gave 10 reasons why the United States would resist any efforts of the Chinese Communists to "bribe" their way into the U.N. with promises of future good behavior. The other nine points Lodge made against Red China were that:

It opposed the purposes and principles of the United Nations. It was an aggressor in Korea. It occupied "defenseless Tibet." It sponsors guerrilla and subversive movements in Malaya and throughout Southeast Asia. It committed atrocities against Americans and others fighting in Korea.

It still holds 32 American civilians "under barbarous conditions without published charges."

It "willfully fabricated and publicized false evidence of spurious germ warfare charges" in a hate campaign to blacken the United States.

It executed "millions of its captive subjects, and forced other millions into slave labor."

It even stoops to an international extortion racket in squeezing millions of dollars from overseas Chinese who try to buy safety and protection for their relatives at home.

Daylight Savings Due Next Sunday; Oregon Excluded

Daylight saving time rolls around again next Sunday for millions of Americans. Other millions will ignore it.

As in the past, about 45 per cent of the population will set clocks ahead one hour; 55 per cent will not.

Among those who will not be residents of Oregon and Washington, where daylight time is banned by state law.

Opposition traditionally has centered in rural areas. Many farmers say that cows and pigs don't know how to tell time, but do know when the sun comes up. Animals get upset if you monkey with the clock, the argument goes. Others say their hired hands would have to stand around waiting for the dew to dry before harvesting certain crops if they went on daylight time.

In the bigger cities, however, industrial and office workers like daylight saving, particularly the extra hour in the evening when they can weed the flower bed or play catch with junior.

Most states provide local option for daylight saving. Thus cities 30 ahead and rural areas don't. Benjamin Franklin is supposed to have thought up daylight saving as early as 1780.

It didn't get going in this country, however, until 1918, when Congress by law put it into effect nationwide.

There was so much opposition that the law was repealed the next year. The theory in wartime is that daylight saving utilizes more natural light, and saves electric power.

Shift Restores Egypt's Former Soldier Boss

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Lt. Col. Gamal Abdel Nasser once more was Egypt's boss Monday, in title as well as in fact, and Maj. Gen. Mohamed Naguib was relegated to a figurehead presidency.

In the latest Egyptian political picture, the young army officers of the ruling revolutionary council early Sunday switched the premiership and military governorship from Naguib to Nasser.

Car With Non-Licensed Driver Pierces Home

COLUMBUS (AP) — A car swerved from the road Sunday morning, shot across 45 feet of lawn, knocked over a young tree and crashed into the living room of the Clabe Howard family. It ended up beside the television set.

Mrs. Howard estimated damage at more than \$1,500. Two youths were in the car. The 20-year-old driver was charged with reckless operation and driving without a license. No one was injured.

Ousted Navy Employee Will Have Rehearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Abraham Chasanow, who says he was fired by the Navy as a security risk even though he had been cleared by a hearing board will get a chance to say why he should be reinstated.

The Navy offered Sunday to rehear the case and Chasanow's lawyer promptly accepted. The new hearing may come this week.

A Navy employee for 23 years, Chasanow was fired from an \$8,300-a-year job at the Navy hydrographic office April 9 after the Navy security appeal board overruled a lower board's finding that he was innocent of eight charges of Communist associations. Chasanow said he was discharged without explanation.

Loan Fund Hike To Aid Small Business Asked

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — President Eisenhower Monday authorized requests to Congress for supplemental appropriations totaling \$34,708,000, nearly all of it for additional loans by Small Business Administration.

The requests will be formally submitted to Congress Tuesday, the President's vacation headquarters said.

Eisenhower will ask for nearly 50 million dollars for loans by the small Business Administration for the fiscal year starting July 1. He also will ask for an additional \$1,200,000 for agency salary and office expense.
