

Farm Surpluses Now Spreading To Livestock

WASHINGTON — The problem of surplus farm crops plaguing government officials is showing signs of spreading to livestock products. Stocks of wheat, corn, and most other grains and cotton have

reached record proportions, forcing the government to resort to rigid production controls in an effort to keep supplies from getting out of hand. Likewise, growers have been producing more potatoes and some other food crops than are being used.

But in the total agricultural picture, ground being made to bring crop production into line with demands may be lost in a pileup of excessive supplies of dairy products, meats, poultry and eggs.

Despite recent Agriculture Department action lowering dairy price supports from 90 to 75 percent of parity, department experts are predicting milk output this year will exceed last year's record. Parity is a legal standard for measuring farm prices declared by law to be fair to farmers in relation to prices they pay.

Milk production last year was 122 billion pounds. The government bought the equivalent of 12 billion pounds of milk in the form of butter, cheese and dried milk because there was no other market for it at the support prices.
