Beavers Split Home Openers With Sacs; Suds, Pads Divide

The Seattle Rainiers and Portland Beavers played their first 1954 games at home Tuesday and both clubs split day-night double-headers with their Pacific Coast League baseball opponents.

Portland pleased a crowd of 12,256 fans who turned out for the afternoon opener by subduing Sac-

ramento 5-4, then dropped a 6-4 decision before 9,095 at night.

The Rainiers drew 17,366 fans including PCL president Clarence Rowland to their home park. There were 9,940 customers on hand in the afternoon to watch the Suds blow a two-run lead and fell 4-2 before Lefty O'Doul's San Diego dress.

The night game was won by Seattle 2-1 in 11 innings, drew 7,420 fans.

San Diego won the day affair at Seattle by taking advantage of Gene Bearden's wildness after he had pitched seven scoreless innings.

The address pushed over their four-run lead by Artie Wilson was strong enough to push over the clincher, Tommy Byrne, former American Leaguer, was the winning pitcher.

Shortstop Frankie Austin won the opener at Portland with a two-run single in the ninth inning.

Sacramento was in a hitting mood in the night game, getting 14 safeties while the Beavs were held to six. At that, Sacramento used four pitchers to scatter those hits.

The Solons did it in the eighth when trailing 1-4. Three singles in a row off Dick Waibel opened the eighth and in came Davey Adkins to pitch. Joe Brovia drove a single just to the right of second, and that soon was followed by two more singles, the lot of them accounting for four runs.

The day brought three homers, two in the opening game by Dino Pestelli and Don Kolloway of the Beavers and one in the night game by Hank Schenz of Sacramento.

Restelli's, as the home season's first, brought a flock of awards including a ride around the bases between next Sunday's games on Porsy, the elephant.

There is no game here Wednesday night. The next is Thursday at 8 p.m.
