

Eisenhower Asks Gen. Van Fleet To Survey War

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower has asked Gen. James Van Fleet, former 8th Army commander in Korea and now retired, to survey the military assistance

programs in the Far East, especially in Korea and Formosa. This announcement was made Wednesday by Secretary of Defense Wilson at his weekly news

conference. Wilson said Van Fleet, Asst. Secretary of Defense W. J. McNell and a small staff of civilians and military personnel will leave Washington about May 1.

Wilson said Van Fleet will confer first with Gen. John E. Hull, Far East commander, in Tokyo and then go to Korea to consult with President Syngman Rhee and Gen. Maxwell Taylor, U. S. 8th Army commander.

The aim, he said, will be to "develop recommendations in concert with Gen. Hull both as to the future size and position of the active armed forces of the Republic of Korea and the practicability of joint U. S.-ROK program for Korean reserve forces."

Van Fleet then will proceed to Formosa, the headquarters and stronghold of the Chinese Nationalist force of Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek.

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Senate Committee Studies Extra Funds For Basin Dam

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate public works subcommittee took under advisement Wednesday a request that it add another million dollars to a House-passed bill increasing monetary authorizations for Columbia Basin projects by 16 million dollars.

The House bill is designed to permit Congress to appropriate enough money for the year beginning July 1 to keep construction of The Dalles Dam on the Columbia River on schedule.

Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore), who originally proposed increasing the House figure by nine million dollars, subsequently scaled his request to one million. He accepted the latter figure after being told by Col. W. Whipple of Army Engineers that it would be sufficient to permit additional planning on John Day Dam and other lesser projects sought by the senator.

Morse, who said he acted on behalf of himself and Democratic Sen. Jackson and Magnuson of Washington and Murray and Mansfield of Montana, said his original request had been designed to include additional authorization for Ice Harbor and Chief Joseph Dams.

He dropped this phase of the proposal, however, when it was determined that the two projects were authorized by Congress without a monetary ceiling on their appropriations. Morse said there had been confusion on this point in the Northwest and he desired to "nail it down once and for all."

Sen. Cordon (R-Ore), who has introduced legislation similar to that approved by the House, endorsed the 16 million dollar increase which he said was necessary to keep The Dalles on schedule to help meet the needs of a "power-starved area."

He said the 16 million dollars was intended for use on The Dalles because it was the "only structure in absolute need at this time." He said he anticipated that additional authorization for Columbia Basin projects would be included in the forthcoming omnibus rivers and harbors bill now being prepared by the House Public Works Committee.

Idaho Mill Employers Reject CIO Pay Demand

SPOKANE (AP) — A management spokesman said Wednesday employers in the Coeur d'Alene, Idaho area will not grant demands of a 12 1/2-cent hourly wage increase by CIO woodworkers.

George J. Tichy, general counsel of the Timber Products Manufacturers Assn., termed the demands "preposterous" in view of conditions in the area.

He said prices of timber products are below the three-year average and that wage costs went up a total of 25 cents an hour in 1951 and 1952.

"Some operators feel a strike may be desirable from the standpoint of cutting production and firming up the lumber market," he told a reporter.

The CIO union has set a strike deadline of May 3.

Coeur d'Alene operators who would be affected are Ohio Match, Atlas Tie, R. D. Lumber, North West Timber, Pollack Forests Inc. and the Lafferty Transportation Co.

All are members of the Timber Products Manufacturers Assn. Federal mediator Louis Ziman has been called into the negotiations with the union.
