

Is That So!

Is there anything to this "bear hug" idea? writes Eugene Burnes of the Ottawa Journal. At what hour do plants make their best growth? inquires Mrs. T.R.O. via the Pasadena Independent. Which animal is the best swimmer? asks F.R.T., of the Bethlehem Globe-Times.



One of the most abiding of superstitions is that a bear will stand on his hind feet and embrace the life out of his victim, slowly but inexorably cracking the ribs and crushing him to death. A popular legend about an American Indian girl, of course a princess, tells how she quick-wittedly held a dagger in front of her and as the bear lunged forward and began hugging her, the point of the dagger pierced the bear's heart and she was spared a horrible death.

Despite the vast amount of alleged testimony to the contrary, authorities agree that there is no factual evidence to prove that any bear species — including the tree-climbing brown — have ever inflicted death by the "bear hug."

BECAUSE OF ITS anatomical structure, a bear is often given to rearing up and striking his victim with a "roundhouse" swing from one of his great arms. This may have given the illusion of hugging to an imaginative person — but it is far from that. Actually, the swipe from his powerful paw usually breaks the victim's ribs and the blow may even drive his claws deep into the body. If a grizzly bear were to kill a man, the chances are he would do so with a wallop from one of these sledgehammer paws which are armed with three-inch claws. Or he might tear him apart with teeth and claws. But with a bear hug? I doubt it.

Plants. At first thought one might suppose that plants grow best in bright light, since light is essential to the making of their food which supplies both the material and the energy for their growth. But in truth, the growth is usually more rapid in darkness when the temperature doesn't fall too low.

Corn and cucumbers for example grow most rapidly at night. But there is no particular period in the 24 hours of the day when all plants grow most rapidly. Even among those that reach their maximum growth in the night, the most rapid growth seems to begin in the early part of the night but in others it does not begin until after midnight. On those nights when the air is muggy and warm, growth seems most rapid.

THE BEST SWIMMER? That is a toughy. I know of not one mammal including the monkey, which cannot swim and most are expert swimmers. Particularly the salt-water mammals such as seals porpoises, and whales, since salt water being heavier is more buoyant. Of these I'd bet on the seal. As for fresh water, even the pig can swim well — but a fat hog may slice its own throat and bleed to death as it strikes out with its sharp-pointed cloven front feet. Ordinarily, rabbits and hares avoid water. With most of them,

their fur is not impervious to water, they gradually drown over a long course.

But of the lot, my fresh-water contender is the otter. If not the best swimmer, he is assuredly the best diver. Even from fairly long distances, he seems to enjoy diving into the water. Yet, as he enters, his motion is so smooth that the water is scarcely ruffled, and he seems to glide. I have never seen him make a splash as all other land-mammals tend to.

Despite their remarkable swimming ability others must train their young to swim. Sometimes this is done by trickery. The mother will lure them on to her back for a ride and then slip into the water and when well out, go under and the little ones have to make it to shore under their own power.
