Rubella or German Measles is rarely seen except when there is an epidemic. It is characterized by a short invasion with mild, indefinite symptoms, sometimes simulating measles and often scarlet fever in regard to the rash, though rarely being as severe as either of these diseases.

Previous attacks of measles and scarlet fever do not protect from it, nor will an attack of rubella protect from measles or scarlet fever.

Rubella begins from seven to twenty-one days after exposure, with mild catarrhal symptoms and feelings of general depression, slight fever, headache, a runny nose, and a sore throat. The disease occurs in children chiefly between five and fifteen years of age. Infants are less susceptible.

## Son Of Headhunter Scheduled To Relate Conversion At Rally



A converted South Sea Islander whose father was a head hunter will be featured at a special missionary rally at the Central Junior High School auditorium on April 27 at 7:45 p.m.

Kata Ragaso was converted from a life of heathenism to a life of Christianity and he will relate his conversion experience at the rally. During the war, he and a group of his natives were responsible for saving the lives of scores of American airmen shot down by the enemy. At present Ragaso is president of the Western Solomon Islands Mission.

Leading out in the missionary rally will be Elder F. A. Mote, president of the Australasian Union Division who was president of the Upper Columbia Conference including parts of the states of Oregon, Washington, and Idaho before accepting his overseas appointment by the Seventh-day Adventist denomination. Mote will give a description of progress in his giant division where membership in many places has doubled during the last few years.

He will also outline future plans for expansion of the Gospel program. The Australasian division includes Australia and its Territories; New Zealand and its territories; and the islands of the South Pacific. He will also describe the great need which exists in the mission fields today.

With Elder Mote and Ragaso will be Mrs. Mote, Pastor Herbert White, the president of the Coral Sea Union Mission and his wife; and Pastor Eric Boehm, the president of the Bismark Solomon Union Mission.

The missionary group is engaged in touring Oregon and other conferences in the North Pacific Union prior to attending the world wide General Conference of the Seventh-day Adventists session at San Francisco beginning May 25.

## County To Study Cow Creek Road Building Problem

The Douglas County Court Friday promised to examine a proposed new route of the Cow Creek Road east of Highway 99 near Astoria after a delegation protested construction of the road.

Douglas Chambers, one of the delegates, said the county court set no time or date of the meeting. It made no commitments, however.

The group was in Roseburg to protest straightening the old route through the narrow valley. Members of the delegation complained that the new road would cut through farm land in the valley floor.

They said that right-of-way had been offered along the old road, which passed through less valuable land. The construction would shorten mileage about three-fourths of a mile.

Judge Carl C. Hill commented that it was the first time he ever heard of a delegation wanting to stop construction of a new road, adding that such groups usually want a new one.

Right-of-way along the new route would be about 60 feet, according to Chambers.

Chambers commented the group would "fight the new road to the last ditch."

Judge Hill said later that the court will meet in the near future to consider aspects of the proposed road realignment.

Hill commented there are no plans for building a new road through Cow Creek Valley. Plans for widening the existing road and some realignment work have been held up by various things, including the weather.

The judge said the matter would be studied fully so that the best plan for the most people can be worked out.

turned the bowl-shaped Dien Bien Phu battlefield into a swamp of red mud, hampering French warplanes and bogging down field armament.

The French defenses still intact covered an area less than a mile across last night. This was a tiny target for planes that must parachute in all food and war supplies. The plight of the weary defenders was considered especially acute because all escape routes from the remote mountain position have been blocked by the encircling Vietnamese masses.

The Dien Bien Phu battle had wide repercussions.

The first of a new contingent of paratrooper reinforcements from France arrived at a secret Viet Nam air base yesterday. U. S. Air Force Globemasters ferried the troops on a three-day, 8,500-mile flight which skirted India.

## Monitored Phone Calls Cause Probers Puzzle

Cohn, sought special treatment for a drafted former committee aide, G. David Schine. McCarthy has replied that Stevens and his aides tried to pressure the subcommittee into dropping its investigation of alleged Communists in the Army.

Both sides have denied the others' charges, and the subcommittee probe is aimed at getting to the bottom of the maze of accusations and denials.

McCarthy defended yesterday that all records or telephone conversations be obtained by the committee. Joseph N. Welch, counsel for Stevens and other Army officials, announced his clients would consent, saying "nothing would delight the Army more."

McCarthy said he would agree only if every transcript were made public, adding that he wasn't going to allow anybody who might not be a principal in the hearing to refuse consent and thus keep a conversation secret.

In Milwaukee, where McCarthy flew after the hearing to make a pair of speeches today, the senator said further that he wants the Army telephone transcripts in the record because, he said, they would show efforts to get his investigators to lay off the Army.

Ray H. Jenkins special counsel told the subcommittee it might be violating the Federal Communications Act if it spread on the record any conversation where one of the two persons involved didn't consent to that action. He said committee members were taking "the chance of getting in jail."

This squared with the opinion of government attorneys familiar with the communications law, who said that while monitoring a phone call itself was not illegal the conversation cannot be lawfully made public without consent of the party at the other end of the line.

Mundt said he was sure the subcommittee would have to have an executive session next week "to rephrase, refine or at least interpret" the seizure motion, authorized by Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.).

## Douglas County Trailerites Thrash Problem At Meeting; Sen. Geddes Recommends

assessor to invoke liens against trailers on Jan. 1 for assessments due the next July 1 and trailerites have been fearful of losing their properties if they are unable to pay within a few days.

Geddes told the group, which met at Nebo Trailer Park, that he believes it's fair to provide for personal property taxes against trailers. The intent of the new law, he said, is to put trailers used for residential or business purposes in the same category as buildings.

The trouble comes, he relates, in high license fees when trailers are moved.

He cautioned the trailer owners, formed here as the Organized Trailer Owners of Douglas County, that they would find all taxes inequitable. The happy medium is found between a situation where there are no taxes and one where multiple government services demanded by the people bring about heavy taxation.

The trailer owners are to forward their recommendation to a state association of trailerites. There, solutions brought by other groups from over the state will be studied for the most likely measure to be recommended to the Legislature.

The trailerites here complained that the present state law had made the method of tax collection in the hands of the individual county assessor, with each assessing differently. They said they had received much help from the Douglas County assessor, Ned Dixon.

Geddes told the group that the State Tax Commission is developing some regulations to control local assessments.
