

School Board Takes Actions On Teachers

In other action, the board: Invented the architectural firm of Freeman, Hayslip, Tuft and Hewlett and a sub-contracting company, F. R. Barnes and Son, to the May 12 board meeting. Their appeal regarding the repair of a plaster job at the Senior High School gym will be heard.

Directed Supt. M. C. Deller to draw up a license permitting the Umpqua Television Corp. access for their cable through the high school grounds.

Made provisions for election of board members at the school election scheduled June 21. This included setting up a new Rose precinct. This will give the district seven voting precincts for all school elections. It also appointed new judges for elections.

Voted to raise the two guest huts on the Central Junior High property and keep them for recreation as storerooms at the various school sites.

Voted unanimously against a proposal separating basketball teams in the state into A-1 and A-2 categories in state championship playoffs. It also turned down a proposal to hold one state tournament at which two champions would be chosen, i.e., A-1 and A-2. Supt. Deller and High School Principal Harry Jacoby must still vote.

Approved a lease by the district with Oil Developers Inc. involving a 6.11 acre parcel in the Melrose School area. The lease holds certain restrictions to guard the safety and environment of the children.

Approved a plan for a revolving fund in the Senior High to purchase student shop supplies.

Rejected two requests for use of school district property during the summer. They were opposed to school policy.

One other item was the reading of an opinion by Asst. Atty. Gen. Cecil H. Quesseth on whether it was necessary for the board to call for bids in connection with letting a contract for fire insurance if the premiums will exceed \$2,000 as prescribed by law. The opinion said it was not necessary, so the board will not have to ask for bids. It will probably follow the present policy of giving insurance needs to a Roseburg agent for distribution to other local firms.

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next fiscal year, said Todd. They are the physical education plant at the senior high school and the newly finished Joseph Lane Junior High School.

Cost of supplies and utilities are up. Supplies because there are more students and the two new buildings; utilities because of rate increases granted this past year.

Todd said school sites never again will be as cheap as they are now, so the budget board provided for the purchase of three expected to serve needs of the district in the next few years. The cash purchase of the sites took a \$58,000 bite out of the budget. The purchases will cost taxpayers 2½ mills if the budget is approved May 18, but Todd pointed out that there will not be interest on bonds in the future.

Todd emphasized that the budget is not "minimum," but added that the budget board agreed that it covers the cost of what most people want for their youngsters. Supt. M. C. Deller had said earlier in the chamber that cost of hiring teachers amounts to about 70 per cent of the total budget.

Lutheran Laymen President Will Be In Roseburg

Louis A. Menking, of River Forest, Ill., and president of the Lutheran Laymen's League, will be in Roseburg on May 1 and 2 attending the convention of the Oregon District of the Lutheran Laymen's League.

He is to address the convention at its Sunday afternoon session, to be held in the Civic Room of the Umpqua Hotel. The League has over 50,000 members belonging to it, organized into local clubs, which are affiliated with the respective congregations of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. Approximately 1500 members are enrolled in the various groups in Oregon.

The convention delegates, besides hearing reports of a number of standing and special committees, will elect a new board of directors, one of the candidates being Walter Nehring of Roseburg. The convention delegates will also pass upon a number of resolutions offered for consideration.

One of the resolutions to be discussed petitions the Board of Higher Education of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod to make Concordia Junior College at Portland, a co-educational institution, in order to prepare girls and young women to serve the church as parish workers, deaconesses and parochial school teachers.

At the present time enrollment in the school is restricted largely to young men and boys preparing to serve the Lutheran Church as pastors and parochial school teachers. A limited number of boys and young men desiring a general education under Christian influence are also enrolled every year.

Mrs. Grace Teater, Roseburg, local registration chairman, reports that to date well over 150 delegates and visitors have registered for the two-day convention. Additional registrations are being received every day. The Lutheran Laymen's League Club of St. Paul's Lutheran Church expects close to 200 delegates and visitors to be present.

Pemberton Gets School Contract At Myrtle Creek

The Myrtle Creek Board of Education Wednesday night accepted a \$125,506.76 bid from William Pemberton, Roseburg, for construction of 10 classrooms at Myrtle Creek and Tri City.

The action came at a special board meeting reported by News-Review Correspondent Ruth M. Evans.

Supt. Al Neet pointed out that, besides the 10 rooms, the bid includes two storage rooms, two teachers rooms, an automatic bell and clock system to be installed in the completed Tri City units and for insulation of the Tri City structure. The bid amounted to about \$8 per square foot, Neet figured.

Other bidders were Todd Building Co., Roseburg, \$131,517; H. Barnhart, Medford, \$135,514; Drake & Son, Coquille, \$140,720; W. E. Meade & Co., Grants Pass, \$141,900, and William Wiley Co., Ashland, \$137,822. A bid from Williamette Building Contractors, Eugene, on the two-room addition at Myrtle Creek only, was disregarded.

Architect's estimates of the total work had been about \$135,000. The board also accepted the school calendar for the coming year and hired two new teachers: Mrs. Lorraine Ireland of Myrtle Creek, eighth grade, and John Basie of Portland, high school English and speech.

Stevens Admits Some Suspensions Withheld

the senator's investigation of alleged subversive activities at Al-mouth.

The special counsel conducted such hammering cross-examination of Stevens that Joseph N. Welch, special counsel to the secretary, protested Jenkins was going as it is if it were a "murder trial."

Stevens swore that he had no recollection of the purported telephone conversation between Adams and Lawton.

But Stevens said it could be "entirely possible"—that it was "conceivable"—he had told Adams he had better call Gen. Lawton.

Stevens said he did recall last Oct. 31 he had talked to Gen. George I. Back, chief signal officer, and told him he wanted the Army's commanding generals to exercise "careful and good judgment" in carrying out the government's program to weed out security risks.

The secretary said he told Back he was "apprehensive that Gen. Welch did not want the removal of employs at Ft. Monmouth to be done so rapidly that people would be suspended without sufficient evidence to support the action."

If there were any doubt about employes, Stevens said, he wanted them out, but he said he emphasized that he wanted the security program conducted in a fair way and not just on the basis of "meager or almost non-existent information."

Stevens testified that between January 1953 and March of this year, the Army had "weeded out" 170 individuals as security risks where there has been a "loyalty connotation."

The secretary gave this as "tangible evidence" of the Army's activity against Communist influence or infiltration. It was in reply to an inquiry by Sen. Dirksen (R-Ill.).

Stevens, obviously weary after five and a half days of questioning, declined a suggestion by Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.) to rest from the "strain of this ordeal."

Welch said the secretary would proceed but he also asked "some assurance" from Sen. McCarthy that there would be no "prolonged examination" when McCarthy's turn came.

McCarthy replied it was "impossible to say," and "frankly I don't know."
