Young Hopeful Of Price Support

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Young (R-ND) said Wednesday he believes the Agriculture Department will respond to his efforts and increase price support loans on hard or other better grades of wheat. The senator said he is reliably informed a new policy will be announced soon by the department. He said he expects this to raise support prices on hard spring wheat four or more cents a bushel, with an additional two or three cents raise for protein content. The support level on durum wheat, depending on quality, can be expected to increase prices on that commodity up to 20 cents a bushel, he added. Although wheat and the other five basic commodities are supported at 90 per cent of parity, the national average of 90 per cent is made up of averaging the sup-

The guardian of a girl injured when her horse was struck by a pickup truck May 18, 1952, filed suit last week in circuit court against the owner and the driver of the truck.

Named in the complaint are Richard L. Nyberg, who allegedly was driving the truck, and its owner, Leroy F. Johnson.

Dale Zeller asks \$27,500 general damages and \$496.05 special damages in the name of Joy Zeller, who was injured. Zeller claims Nyberg was negligent in driving the pickup into the horse and rider on the Brockway-Lookingglass Road. The girl suffered a skull fracture and other injuries.
