

Precincts, Polling Places Announced By County Clerk

Polling places for Douglas County's 82 precincts to handle the primary election, May 21, have been announced by Charles Doerner, county clerk.

A. Taft, goes into a November race with Sen. Thomas A. Burke for the remaining two years of Taft's term. Burke, a Democrat, was appointed to succeed Taft until the November election.

Bender defeated Ohio House Speaker William Saxton Burke was unopposed in the Democratic primary.

In Florida, incomplete returns indicated neither Acting Gov. Charles E. Johns nor State Sen. Leroy Collins could gain a clear majority in a three-way race for the Democratic governor nomination. Failing that, they'll go into a primary runoff May 25.

Indiana's 11 incumbent congressmen—10 Republicans and one Democrat—took commanding leads. Most interest in the House primary centered on local issues.

However, the vote eventually will determine who wins a bitter Republican factional dispute between Gov. George N. Craig and Sens. William E. Jenner and Homer E. Capehart. They're battling for control of the state GOP organization.

McKay Is Resting Before Broadcast Of Policy Speech

SALEM (AP) — Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay arrived here Tuesday night for a week's rest before next Monday's radio-television broadcast, described by Republican Party officials as a major power policy statement.

On his brief stop in Portland Tuesday night, McKay said he would reply soon to criticism by Oregon Secretary of State Earl Newberry of the Eisenhower administration "partnership" policy of power development.

McKay said he planned to "give the hydroelectric facts of life" in his reply.

McKay declined to say whether he would support Newberry or his personal friend, Gov. Paul Patterson, for the Republican nomination for Oregon governor.

He also declined to state a preference between Rep. Homer Angell and Tom Lawson, McKay who are seeking the Republican nomination for representative from the Third Oregon congressional district.

McCall was administrative assistant to McKay when the latter was governor of Oregon.

McKay also said it was he who had urged Army Secretary Stevens to press for planning of Libby Dam in Montana on the Kootenai River.

Handbags Reveal About Everything Except For Guns

WASHINGTON — Women are paying a terrible price of admission to the Senate Caucus Room where the Army-McCarthy hearings are now in progress. They are required to turn over their handbags to be searched for dangerous weapons.

The guards are still a bit jumpy over the March 1 shooting in the House chamber by the Puerto Rican nationalists one of whom was a Luger-carrying woman, so they are taking no chances with the girls who line up every day to watch the hearings.

The standing rule is that guards hunt each purse to see if it weighs more than a revolver, in which case it is searched. And since there's hardly a female alive carrying a handbag that's lighter than a loaded six-shooter, they get frisked.

The constables don't like this kind of duty anymore than the women, for sometimes it proves doubly embarrassing.

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Laniel Hopeful Of Favorable Vote

PARIS (AP) — Parliamentary observers expect Premier Joseph Laniel's government to win a National Assembly vote of confidence tomorrow unless the besieged Indochina fortress of Dien Bien Phu falls to the Vietnamese rebels in the meantime.

Laniel told the Assembly last night it would have to look for a new government or postpone demands for a debate on Indochina beginning May 14. When deputies, including some of his own supporters, persisted in their call for the debate, the Premier made the issue one of confidence in the Cabinet.

This would require the government's resignation if the Assembly does not uphold its demand for a postponement of the discussion.

Laniel's chances of survival looked good today. Few of the deputies wanted to risk a government crisis at a time when the fate of Dien Bien Phu was in the balance, and when Geneva talks on peace in Indochina were about to start.

ELBA, Ala. — Election officials said Dewey Adams of the Newbia community took command of its polling place and burned all its 95 ballots last night.

Zell Williams, one of the officials, said Adams came up to the polling place as officers were counting Tuesday's Democratic primary ballots and demanded entrance.

When he kicked down two doors and entered, most of the officers scattered. Adams then told Williams: "Here are some votes the sheriff won't get," and set fire to them with a match. Williams reported.

Sheriff H. D. Tillman said Adams was being held for questioning.

from the 15-page memo. He said the document itself included the notation that certain security information had been omitted.

Joseph N. Welch, Army counsel, moved in with obvious enthusiasm to question Collier. It was in his queries that he termed the McCarthy document "a perfect phoney" and "a carbon copy of precisely nothing."

Stevens—now in his 10th day as a witness—was temporarily excused from the stand so that Collier could give his report on his visit with Hoover.

The committee lawyer still had the chair when the investigating committee recessed for lunch.

McCarthy, without saying so directly, suggested that possibly what he had offered was a copy of a summary of the FBI material prepared in Bolling's office.

McCarthy asked Collier: if he had checked Gen. Bolling's office to find out if it had "made a summary" of the 15-page FBI letter, Collier said he had not had an opportunity to do that.

McCarthy then suggested to chairman Mundt (RSD) that the subcommittee find out if Bolling's office did make such a summary made and, if so, what distribution was made of it.

Mundt said the subcommittee would consider that at a closed meeting in the afternoon.

Collier testified Hoover told him "in some respects the language was the same" in the McCarthy document as in the 15-page FBI document.

Collier, under questioning by Welch, said he had not read in detail either of the two documents.

He would not agree, as Welch asked him to, that he was "as sharply aware as I am that to carry these documents around" is against the security laws.

Welch then asked Collier to "hand me this hot document"—the three-page, single-spaced carbon copy produced by McCarthy Tuesday.

"This document," Welch asked, "is a carbon copy of precisely nothing, is it not?"

Collier's response was that Hoover had told him it was not a carbon copy of anything in the FBI files.

McCarthy broke in with a point of order. He asked Collier to look at page two of the copy he had sought to introduce. It would show there, McCarthy said, that certain security information was purposefully omitted, accounting for the shortening from 15 pages to 3.

Eisenhower then was asked whether he has full confidence in Stevens.

The President replied, speaking in measured tones, that Stevens was carefully selected for his job and he knows of nothing which would cause him to lose confidence in Stevens from the standpoint of administering the affairs of the Army.

ed of misconduct while in Red prison camps. The Air Force cleared 69 officers and airmen of all taint, but it held that 14 others must show cause why they should be allowed to remain in uniform.

Dickenson remained silent, his eyes cast down, when the court-martial verdict was returned. But Emery called the decision "a travesty." He said the young soldier had faced a "stacked deck."

Dickenson's trial was the first ever held under a section of the Military Code of Justice which makes it a crime for a U. S. serviceman to give an enemy in formation for use against a prison comrade.

The Army reportedly has been investigating other former American prisoners of the Reds, men dubbed "Progressives" by other POWs for allegedly cooperating with their Red captors. The Dickenson case was regarded as a test, which might determine the Army's course of action in like cases.

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Brownell To Establish Internal Security Branch

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Times said that Atty. Gen. Brownell will announce soon the establishment of a Division of Internal Security in the Department of Justice.

The new unit, the Times said, "will handle cases involving espionage, treason, sabotage, federal employment loyalty or security risks and subversive activities—in fact, all court proceedings dealing with matters affecting the internal security of the United States and its possessions."

It was understood that the new division would supplement the work of the FBI. Internal security investigations now constitute a substantial part of the workload of the FBI, which will continue to operate as in the past.

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
