Annual Project Of Homemaking Class Underway

An annual project by the home-making class of the Roseburg Senior High School is underway, under the direction of Mrs. Margaret Clark, instructor, under which preschool children ages three to five are cared for by members of the sophomore class.

The fifth year event started May 4 and will continue on alternate days until May 20. Classes run from 8:45 until 11:30 a.m. and from 12:45 until 3 p.m.

The purpose of the classes found root in the fact that as a follow-up to a class on child psychology, the actual study of young children by the girls pointed up the series of textual studies. There are about 20 tots in each group, under the supervision of about 10 girls and instructors.
