radar laboratories "Comms have free access."

"I say Comms do not have free access to those laboratories," Stevens flared.

Three days before the Nov. 16 meeting in his office with Cohn and Carr, Stevens recalled, he had said at a news conference that he knew of no current espionage at Ft. Monmouth despite the headlines growing out of McCarthy's probe there.

Stevens said Carr and Cohn told him McCarthy "felt I had pulled the rug from under him."

At the meeting with the senator's two aides, he said, "there was plenty of what was going to happen now."

McCarthy: "You say they told you I was unhappy?"

Stevens: "That's correct."

McCarthy: "And they told you the investigations would continue?"

Stevens: "They certainly did."

When McCarthy asked how that was an attempt to win preferential treatment for Schine, Stevens retorted it was "all part of a pattern, in my opinion."

His voice dripping with sarcasm, McCarthy questioned Stevens about what he called the "promotion" of Schine to private. He asked whether there was any rating board to private.

Stevens turned around and had a whispered exchange with Army officers sitting near him before replying.

"No," Stevens said. "He started as a recruit and is now a private."

A roar of laughter almost drowned out Stevens' additional statement:

"I don't consider that a promotion."

17 Million Feet Timber Is Sold At Auction Here

Seven parcels of Bureau of Land Management (O&C) timber were sold at auction here this week, and four of them brought more than the appraised prices.

The tracts, four salvage and three green timber, sold at an average of 61 per cent above the appraised price. Volume was 17,026,000 board feet. Total bid price was \$221,093.25, compared to total appraised price of \$141,312.45.

C and D Lumber Co., Riddle, was high bidder at \$83,910.40 on 5,991,000 board feet of green timber in the Russell Creek drainage near Riddle. The tract was appraised at \$49,626.60.

A fire-killed salvage tract, containing 4,607,000 feet in Dodge Canyon, was purchased by Sabala Logging Co., Wilbur, for \$75,921. Appraisal on the block was \$35,671.

Groshong and Newman, Oakland, offered \$5,946 for 797,000 feet of salvage timber in the Yellow Creek area. It was appraised at \$4,326.50.

Keystone Lumber Co., Riddle, was the only other company to buy at above appraised price. It paid \$19,739.85 for 1,920,000 feet of green timber on Coffee Creek near Tiller. The tract was appraised at \$16,150.35.

The following firms bid appraised prices on these tracts: Martin Bros. Box Co., Oakland, \$20,936.65 for 1,094,000 feet of green timber in the Oldham Creek area northeast of Oakland.

Stanwood Lumber Co., Drain, \$2,644.35 for 164,000 feet of salvage timber in the Smith River drainage.

Kelsey and Hult, Dillard, \$11,977, for 2,453,000 feet of salvage timber in the west edge of the Hubbard Creek burn.

Bid prices of Douglas fir on the seven parcels varied from \$3 to \$16.50 a thousand. Unsuccessful bidders were Canyon Logging Co., Canyonville; L and H Lumber Co., Sutherlin; R. A. Duncan, Drain; and Sun Studs, Inc., Roseburg.

Two Americans Killed Over Battlefield Area

SAIGON, Indochina (AP) — A Flying Boxcar blew up Thursday on a supply drop mission to besieged Dien Bien Phu, killing two American civilian pilots and the French crew chief.

One of the Americans, James B. "Earthquake McGoon" McGovern 32, of Elizabeth, N.J., was one of the most famous and intrepid airline pilots in the Far East. The Chinese Communists had held him captive for five months in 1950 after he crash-landed in Red territory.

The other American killed was Wallace Abbott Buford, 28, of Ogden, Utah, who narrowly escaped death 10 days ago when his plane was riddled by AA-fire, which wounded the American pilot with him.

An official French Command announcement said the cause of the explosion was not known but unofficial observers thought possibly it had been hit by Vietminh anti-aircraft.

Bill Grensky Manager Of Oakland Theater

Bill Grensky, formerly of Riddle, is the new manager of the Jewell Theater in Oakland, reports Edith Dunn, News-Review correspondent.

He replaced Bart Copeland, who has been transferred to Myrtle Creek to manage the Rio Theater. He had been managing the Jewell for about six years and had been recently working at the Cloverleaf Drive-In in Sutherlin and the Sutherlin Theater.

The chain of theaters is owned by Lloyd Wood.

Oakland's Jewell will be open only Friday, Saturday and Sunday this summer.

CIO Wage Hearings Are At Temporary Halt

PORTLAND (AP) — The negotiations between the CIO Woodworkers and fir employers of Western Oregon and Washington are at a temporary halt.

Both sides recessed Thursday, but agreed to meet again when federal conciliators call a meeting.

They held meetings here Wednesday and Thursday. Spokesmen for both sides said there was no yielding of main points.

Oldtime Umpqua Resident Dies

Maud Clayton Powell, 72, died Thursday at the home of her son, Warren, in Roseburg.

She was born March 21, 1882, daughter of Jas and Lydia (Elizabeth) Clayton. Her father was a pioneer, coming here in 1847, and a veteran of the Indian Wars. Mrs. Powell's parents came to Umpqua from Illinois. They settled at Coles Valley and later moved to Tyce to what is now known as the Clayton ranch.

Mrs. Powell was born there in a log cabin, where she was still living when she was engaged to be married to Green Clay Powell.

Powell had come to Roseburg March 27, 1892, with his parents. The couple was married Feb. 19, 1902, in Oakland. They lived on a ranch near Umpqua up to the time of Mrs. Powell's death.

She is survived by her husband, three sons, Warren C., Harold and Jesse, all of Roseburg; three daughters, Mrs. Elma Cobb Beavers, Mrs. Gertrude DeGnath, Reedsport, and Mrs. Rose Sveem, Roseburg; and 10 grandchildren.

Graveside services will be held Sunday, May 8, at 2 p.m. at the Oddfellows Cemetery at Oakland. The Rev. Vernon Klein will officiate. Stearns & Little Mortuary, Oakland, is in charge of arrangements.

Demos Throw 'Mess' Charge Back At GOP

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrats have put up a cry for the administration to be done with "circus luxuries" and "TV spectacles" and come up with action to prevent a cold war from blowing hot.

The Republican campaign slogan of 1952 "Clean Up the Mess in Washington," was thrown back at the party in power last night at a Jefferson-Jackson Democratic dinner that brought out an estimated 1,500 diners at \$100 a head—or \$150,000 for the drive to elect a Democratic Congress this fall.

Speakers told the cheering throng that Republicans have created "messes of their own" in the McCarthy-Pentagon row and have suffered serious "reversals" on the Indochina question.

Unlike many previous \$100-a-head dinners by the Democrats in Washington, last night's glittering affair was generously attended by Southern Democrats. They sat alongside old "New Dealers" and "Fair Dealers" in at least an outward show of unity.

Former President Truman, who with his family, was a featured guest, told the diners in a brief informal talk: "As leaders of the free world we must have the friendship of our allies and we can't have that if we insult them."

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, Senate Democratic floor leader, declared the Eisenhower administration has been "caught bluffing by our enemies in danger of being left naked and alone in a hostile world."

have 14,000 men, including wounded, at his command. These were Frenchmen, Foreign Legionnaires, Vietnamese and No. 10 Africans.

There were about 1,000 wounded in underground bunkers of the fort. All efforts for a truce to evacuate them had failed.

The fortress, situated in a broad flat rice plain about six miles long and half that wide, was pounded by artillery and mortars during the long days of the siege.

Each new wave of infantrymen bit off a bit of the original fortress until when the attack started during the past night, a 500-lb. diamond bigger than a baseball diamond remained in which the defenders were concentrated.
