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Pentagon Outlaws Sonic Boom Show

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — The Air Force put into effect here Friday a new policy "outlawing" the sonic boom.

A scheduled demonstration by three North American F86F jet fighters of the sound barrier was cancelled at the last minute because of the newly issued Pentagon order.

An Air Force spokesman said all commands have been instructed that there will be no more sonic blasts in populated areas.

Pilots who plan to exceed the speed of sound—about 760 miles an hour at high altitudes—must do so hereafter in localities where the sharp explosive reports that result will not annoy or frighten anyone, or break any windows.

The spokesman said the Air Force order was the result of complaints and threats of damage suits by angry citizens.

He said some people have mistaken the ear-shaking blasts for bombings.

Yoncalla Mulls Landscaping Of School Grounds

Several groups and organizations have been mulling the possibility of landscaping the new grade school grounds at Yoncalla.

Mrs. George Edes, News-Review Correspondent, states that a proposal has been made to put this project on the school budget. This, however, would necessitate hiring an architect and other labor which would cost the district between \$3,000 and \$5,000.

In order to avert this cost, members of different interested groups have discussed the possibility of making the landscaping a community project. Under the proposal, each club or organization could do a certain part of the work. With donated labor, the cost would be small. The tentative plan calls for doing only a part of the work each year.

Stanley Spurling, sixth grade teacher, is making a plat of the grounds. With the plat completed, each organization will discuss the plan to determine the possibilities.

Groups so far showing interest are: Yoncalla Grade School board, teachers and representatives of the Yoncalla Lions Club, Business and Professional Women, the Trap and Rifle Club, Hayhurst Community Club, American Legion, Parent-Teachers Assn. and Band Parents.

In relation to the Yoncalla schools, Mrs. Edes reported also that Mrs. Ruby Thomas has resigned her position as eighth-grade teacher. This means six more teachers must be hired for next year.

Capps Convicted Of Girl's Slaying

DOYLESTOWN, Pa. (AP)—George Capps, Army veteran, was convicted of first-degree murder—

with a death penalty recommendation—Thursday night in the slaying of a 16-year-old neighbor girl.

A jury of nine men and three women deliberated less than two hours before returning the verdict. Capps had admitted shooting 15-year-old Marta Gibbons through the head but maintained he was intoxicated and temporarily insane.

The girl's frozen and partially clad body was found by the edge of a lake several miles from her home in the new community of Levittown last Jan. 25.

Capps testified he and the girl had been intimate in the rear of his automobile, with her consent. He said they later argued and he shot her. The state contended he acted in fear she would tell his wife, who was expecting a baby at the time.
