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Valentine Goes On Trial For Kidnaping Attempt

PORTLAND — Jimmie Valentine, 41, went on trial Wednesday, charged with attempting to kidnap George P. Brice III from Hillside School last March 19.

Valentine, a narcotics addict who has served several county jail sentences, told reporters, "This is the first time I ever was in jail when I could say I was innocent."

He was indicted after the Brice boy's mother and their maid, Lizzie Mae Brown, identified him as the man who forced them to drive to the school after the boy.

Valentine also is under indictment for kidnaping the two women but the opening trial is on the attempt against the boy—an attempt which fizzled when Mrs. Brice was allowed to go alone into the school where she gave the alarm.

As the trial opened in Judge Bain's court, 30 prospective jurors were on spectators' benches and a score of would-be spectators were unable to get into the room.

Government Is Not Going Out Of Power Business, Sec. McKay Says At Seattle

SEATTLE — Secretary of the Interior McKay declared here Wednesday that the Republican administration, while promoting the "partnership" program for new projects, "is not going out of the power business."

He said in a speech prepared for a noon Seattle Rotary meeting: "There have been a great many misconceptions of the electric situation in this area. An unusual amount of misinformation has been disseminated by those who actually know little about the real situation."

"This fact, however, has not prevented them from making predictions as dire as they are false."

He said full power development must be pushed in the Pacific Northwest and said of the projects of private firms: "Let me make one thing clear. Development of dams by private capital does not carry with it complete title to the site forever."

"Under the licensing authority of the Federal Power Commission, the government can step in at any time and take them over by paying full compensation."

The secretary gave this explanation of the "partnership" plan, "for those who still want to know."

"First, the federal government will continue to build those projects that local interests cannot be expected to undertake. Libby Dam is one example. The Upper Colorado storage project is another."

"Second, we will encourage and join with local public and private bodies wherever there is a project that lends itself to cooperative effort. I refer to those large multiple purpose projects which include specific federal interests such as flood control, navigation, fish and wildlife, recreation and reclamation."

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tion development for which the federal government can properly provide the funds . . .

"Third, we will not interfere and oppose legitimate developments in an area by public and private bodies so long as these developments fit in with the regional development of resources."

"Fourth, insofar as the Northwest is concerned, we will support, and in fact fight for, the integrity of the Northwest power pool and the coordinated operations of the several interconnected utilities, both public and private, and including our own federal plant."

Turning to the Northwest's No. 1 power project development dispute, McKay asserted: "Now let us get Hells Canyon straight."

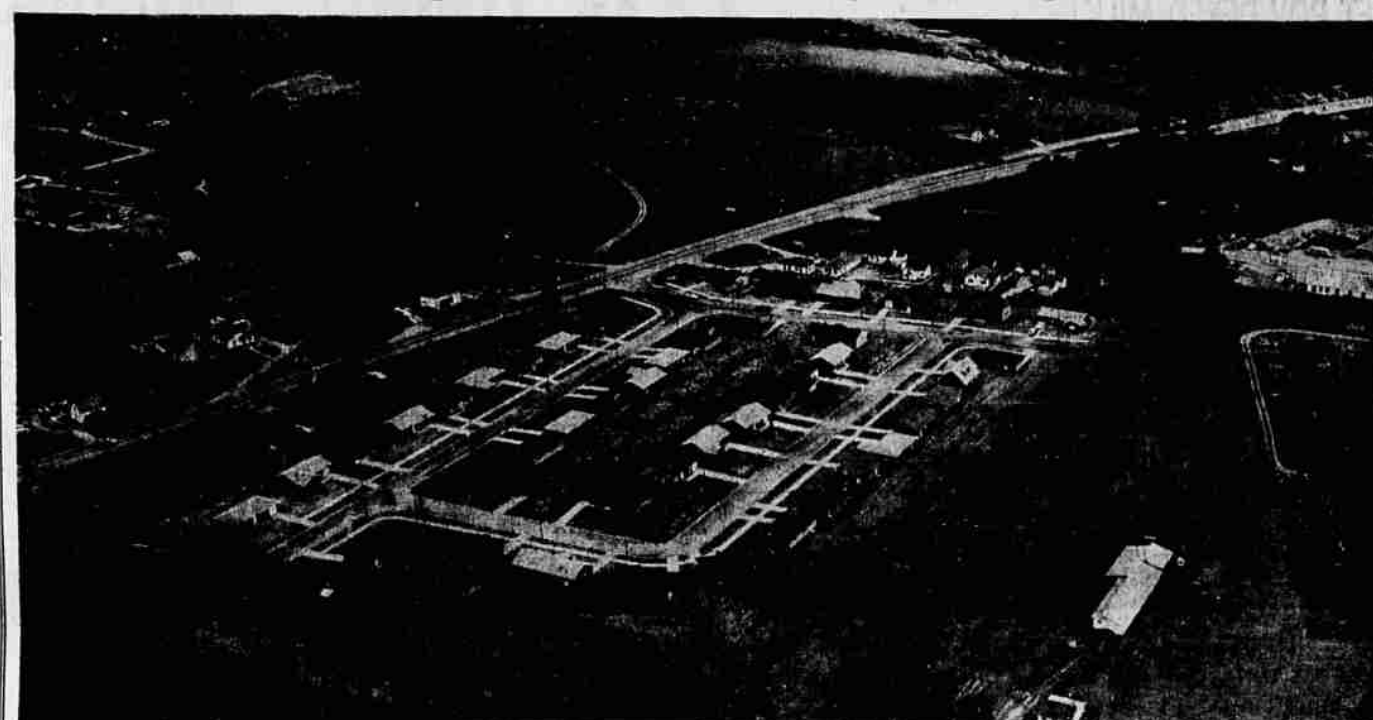
"The federal government has never had any authorization to build Hells Canyon. Such a project was before Congress twice in the previous administration. Both times it failed."

The secretary said his administration withdrew his predecessor's opposition to any private firm's construction in Hells Canyon because there is no authority for federal construction and a 1933 Supreme Court decision in the *Rossmore Rapids* case held that the Federal Power Commission holds full authority over such power sites.
