Sharp Criticism Made At McKay By Opponents

Interior Secretary McKay's power speech brought prompt and sharp criticism from two sources this week.
Howard Morgan, state Democratic chairman, said McKay certainly did announce a "new start"—the start of a campaign to get the public to hold still while Portland General Electric installs its own generators in the government's John Day Dam.

Backers of Secretary of State Earl Newby, who is seeking the Republican nomination for governor, asked that McKay be recalled to Washington, as he is disrupting our party in this state.

Clarence Bollenback, Portland, and Percy Leocy, Corvallis, made the request to Leonard Hall, Republican national chairman. They protested what they said was "Secretary McKay using funds of the Republican National Committee to influence the Republican primary gubernatorial contest in this state." The telegram did not say how McKay had exercised his influence or in whose favor.

The telegram also accused McKay of "precipitating the water power issues advocated by Interior Secretary McKay into partisan politics in the ranks of our own party."

Chewing Bubble Gum May Bring Temperature Up

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—Easy Dad, don't rush for the doctor every time Junior's temperature zips above the standard 98.6. He may have nothing more than a case of "bubble gum fever."

Worse yet, it may be a case of "school fever," once a standard joke among small fry, and now a scientific fact.

The truth is, explains Dr. Fred M. Taylor, Houston, Tex., pediatrician, lots of things may bring junior's temperature to a boil—not just some pesky bug.

Taylor addressed some 500 Oklahoma doctors at the State Medical Assn. convention.

"Some child may be having trouble getting along with his teacher or playmates," Dr. Taylor explained. "This emotional upset may cause his temperature to rise. The psychiatrists refer to this as school fever."

Even chewing bubble gum causes temperature rise above the 98.6 mark. He said a perfectly normal child may have a temperature of 100 or 101 degrees "just from exercise itself."

The thing to do, Dr. Taylor advised, is not to rear a child by relying on the thermometer to tell when danger is at hand.

"Too often they feel the temperature should be stuck at that little red arrow. It is normal to vary. A child may go for weeks or months with an afternoon elevation of temperature. Sure it is up. But that's the way you keep warm—by exercise. Let the child

rest 30 to 45 minutes and then take his temperature.
