Bidault said he wanted to set forth two principles which the French delegation considers fundamental:

"1. No project on Korea's unification is conceivable if it does not include a real, effective guarantee that all representation of the Korean people within the common organs which might be instituted will be proportional to the numbers of citizens consulted in each part of the country.

"2. It will be extremely necessary, if these elections can be considered as valid, that the conditions of the freedom of ballot be verified and attested by neutral observers endowed with sufficient powers of control."

### Roseburg School Dist. Budget Is Discussed

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though all questions had to do with money spending.

The budget board promised a group of Benson PTA members that out-and-out selection of a school site in East Roseburg will be withheld until a public hearing is held to gather opinion on the Kerr site. Members were worried that access to the property, which would be paid for out of the budget if selected, would be costly over a bridge that might have to be built. There is a possibility that access from Ramp Road may be obtained free of charge.

Option on the site will expire on July 15, Supt. Deller said, so the hearing will be made prior to that time. Selection of the East Roseburg site is to be recommended by the building and sites subcommittee of the Citizens Lay Advisory Committee. Location of a school in East Roseburg has not been established definitely, though money in the budget would be laid aside to pay for one.

Glen Wellman brought up two points. He asked why school tax rates have gone up while county tax rates have gone down in the past eight years, and also wondered why large sites now are needed by schools.

Answers were: (1) That the county unlike the schools, receives large revenues from timber sales; and (2) that large sites are required by the state before basic school support funds may be authorized.

Another question from the questioners was: "Aren't buildings being built too elaborately? Wouldn't square-foot costs go down if they were built on more than one level?"

Deller said that cost of Joseph Lane School was \$9.60 a square foot. School Atty. George Neuner added that multi-storied buildings must be constructed of reinforced concrete, a more expensive method.

Robert Young wanted to know what steps are being taken to find other means of taxation. He received no ready answer, but was told that the state is conducting a poll among school men and other civic leaders to bring out opinion on that question.

Patterson asked why allocations for instruction had increased. Deller and Hoyt replied that the district must give teachers incentive to stay in the system.

Patterson also urged the budget board to explore all methods of slashing spending in the future.

Of the approximately 25 persons who attended the hearing, several were teachers and principals in the district.

Deller commented that it was the biggest turnout to a public hearing on a budget that he had seen in his years as a school administrator.

### Garden Valley Road Crossing Study Is Planned

A move is afoot by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce and the Regional Safety Council for improvement of the Garden Valley Road railroad crossing, according to Wayne Crooch, chamber president.

He revealed Wednesday afternoon that an engineer from the office of the public utilities commissioner in Salem will be in Roseburg soon to discuss the problem.

Crooch said that conditions at the road-level crossing are expected to worsen when the new Pacific Highway goes into use sometime next year. He pointed out that seven serious accidents, two fatal, have occurred at the crossing since 1946. One happened in 1946, two in 1950, one in 1951, two in 1952 and one in March of this year.

He said that 7,583 vehicles used the road in three days recently. Charles H. Heltzel, public utilities commissioner, promised that an engineer will be in the city soon to talk over the problem.

It is the second traffic condition attacked jointly by the chamber and the Safety Council. Both are planning to petition the Bureau of Public Roads to construct passing lanes on two steep grades on the Kory Umpqua road between Dixonville and Glide. One lane would be 4 miles in length, and the other .6 miles.

### Cory Asks To Be Returned Here Pending Appeal

William Frank Cory, now awaiting State Supreme Court decision on a consolidated appeal, has filed a motion in circuit court here to be returned to the Douglas County jail until the appeal has been acted on by the high court.

The motion has been forwarded to Circuit Judge William G. East, Eugene, who has been on the bench during Cory's legal maneuverings to win freedom from two charges on which he has been convicted. They are: (1) illegal possession of a firearm by an convict; and (2) being an habitual criminal.

Motion was written by Cory's court-appointed attorney, Charles O. Porter of Eugene.

Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults said Cory has a legal right to return to the county jail pending Supreme Court action. However, time spent in the jail here would not count on his penitentiary sentence. He received 15 years on the habitual criminal charge and four years on the gun possession count.

Cory appealed both jury verdicts, and Stults said both appeals have been consolidated to expedite legal proceedings.

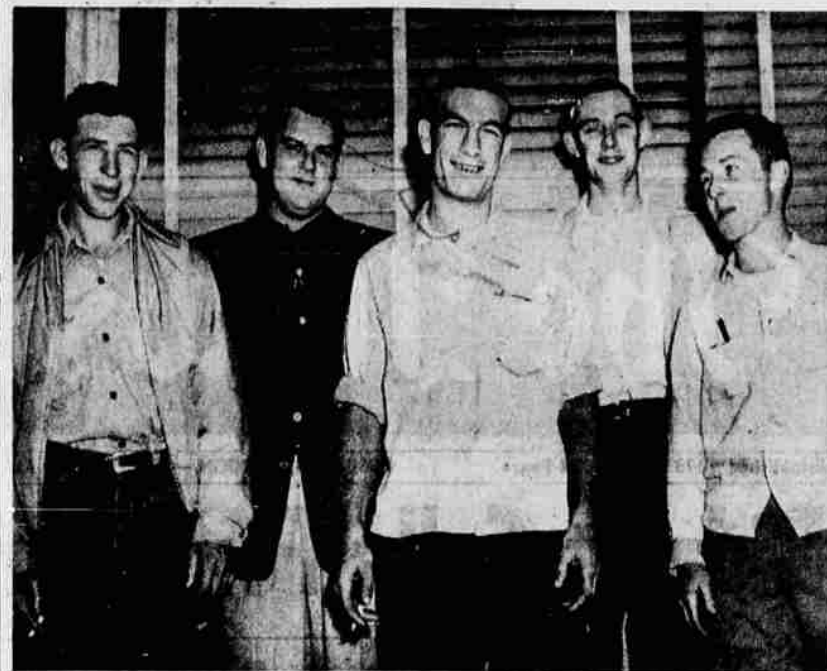
### Roseburg Booster Assn. Elects Nevue President

### Adams Says Army Didn't Ask Investigation End

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sion, Ray H. Jenkins, special counsel to the Senate investigations subcommittee, pressed questions which turned largely about these contentions.

Jenkins climaxed this phase of his cross-examination by asking whether Adams was saying the Army had "no desire, however slight" to stop the McCarthy investigation. Jenkins asked for a yes or no answer.

Adams hesitated. He asked that the question be read back to him by the stenographer. When it was read, he said "The answer is in the negative" and went on to make an explanatory statement as to the desire for an end to the "type of hearings."

Leading up to this point, Jenkins: 1. Recalled that Adams had testified Wednesday he was disturbed when Roy Cohn, general counsel to the McCarthy subcommittee, became enraged at being barred from a secret radar laboratory at Monmouth last fall. He noted Adams had said his concern was because he felt Cohn had the power to prolong the investigation.

Jenkins asked if that wasn't "an admission of confession" that Adams wanted the investigation terminated.

Adams declared it was not. He said McCarthy had volunteered previously that the subcommittee investigation was about complete; that it was preparing to turn it over to the Army.

### Supt. Kenneth Barneburg Back From Conference

County School Supt. Kenneth Barneburg is back on the job this week after attending a conference of the American Assn. of School Administrators in St. Louis, Mo., last week. Barneburg is incoming president of the Oregon Assn. of County School Superintendents.

Purpose of the meeting, he said, was to exchange solutions of problems met in other states and improvements of education by strengthening local organizations.

Also at the meeting was Herbert Armstrong, Newberg, incoming president of the Oregon Assn. of District Superintendents.

### Reedsport Bonds Sold For School

A low bid of 2.926 per cent for sale of \$325,000 in bonds for construction of a new Reedsport elementary school was accepted at a meeting of the school board Wednesday night, according to Principal Fred Pilling.

The winning bid was entered jointly by the Umpqua National Bank, Reedsport, and the First National Bank, Portland.

Blythe & Co. and Foster & Marshall, both of Portland, made a joint bid of 3.25 percent.

Architect Charles Wilmsen of Wilmsen & Endicott, Eugene, was at the meeting. He said specifications for contractors will be ready about June 1, and the bid can possibly be let by June 15. He showed preliminary sketches of various rooms of the new building.

It is figured the interest outlay will be \$54,690 for the project. Besides the new school, a \$100,000 swimming pool will be built on the site. The pool was donated by the Umpqua National Bank, the Umpqua Navigation Co. and Howard Hinsdale.

### Self-Evaluation Criteria Talked

Self-evaluation criteria to be used by teachers in judging standards of their schools was discussed here this week with two elementary school faculties by an official of the State Dept. of Education.

He is Walter Shold, elementary superintendent from the department in Salem. He and Kenneth Barneburg, county school superintendent, entered into the discussions.

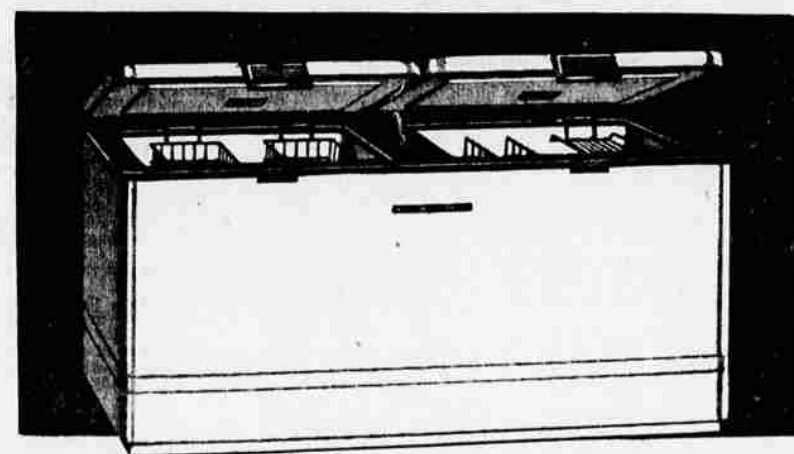
Barneburg said that the proposed program would not replace the state's standardization program. It would be more extensive in scope, but would have parallel purposes.

The plan, he said, would have to be wholly voluntary and would not be used in judging one school against another.

Both Green and Fullerton Schools will consider the program next year. Barneburg and Shold conferred with City Supt. M. C. Deller on the plan, the county superintendent said.

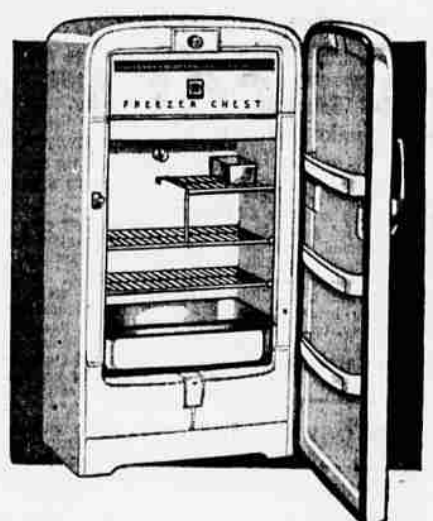
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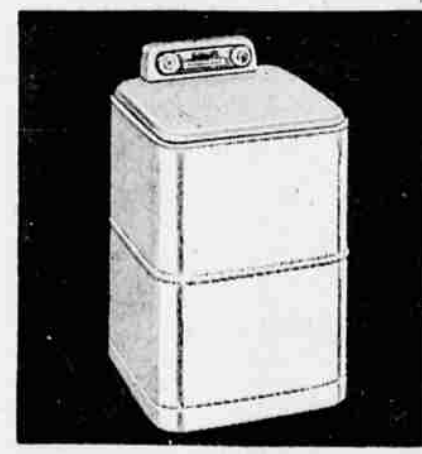
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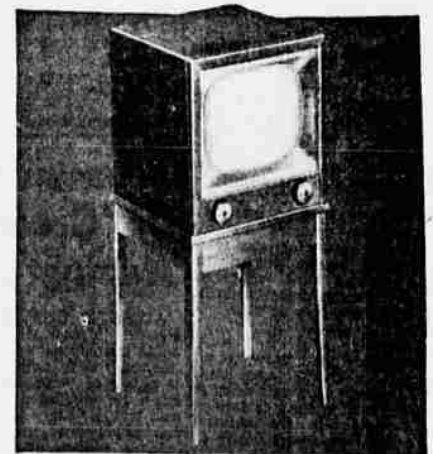
