

Sen. Humphrey Calls For Goal Of \$500 Billion

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) told a CIO "full employment" conference here today the nation should set its sights on a 500-billion dollar economy by 1960.

The economy now is running at about 360 billion dollars a year, but Humphrey said vastly increased national production is needed to prevent a decline in living standards.

He was a featured speaker at a meeting of CIO delegates called to discuss the unemployment problem. The latest government report showed 3,465,000 jobless in April, many in factories organized by the CIO.

The Minnesota senator, a frequent critic of Eisenhower administration economic policies, was invited to express one point of view. Secretary of the Treasury George M. Humphrey was invited to speak for the administration.

Sen. Humphrey said in his prepared remarks that yesterday's goals are no longer adequate for "the needs and aspirations of today and the tomorrows to come." He said a constantly expanding

economy is needed for a growing population in an era of great scientific advancement.

"We cannot stand still, without really slipping backwards," he said. "Our total national production ought to grow by at least 4 percent every year, in order to just keep up with our existing needs. . . . And all of us want to do more than that."

Government Not Sitting Around, States Mitchell

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (AP)—Secretary of Labor Mitchell said Tuesday the Eisenhower administration is "not sitting around waiting for something to go wrong" with the nation's economy.

"We are trying to do everything possible by government action to stimulate, encourage and support economic growth and stability," the secretary said.

Mitchell's speech was prepared for delivery of the biennial convention of the CIO Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America. But the secretary had to enter Walter Reid Hospital in Washington Monday for a medical checkup and could not be present here. His talk was read for him, however, by Asst. Secretary of Labor Rocco C. Siciliano.

Mitchell did not describe in detail what "government action" was being taken to stimulate the economy. But he asked the con-
