

PITTSBURGH — Pittsburgh commuters made long-range plans Tuesday for make-shift transportation as the strike of 2,700 employees against the city's transit system entered its third day with no end in sight.

An estimated 200,000 persons, left without trolley and bus service, thumbed rides, used taxis or

walked to reach their jobs Monday-first work day since the strike began Sunday.

Traffic officers said thousands of additional autos rolled into the golden triangle business district of the nation's 12th largest city. Traffic jams, however, were not as bad as expected.

Youngsters Find Gold Coin Cache

CLEVELAND — A group of youngsters, hunting their ball in a Cleveland sewer, Tuesday stumbled upon a treasure trove of gold coins.

John Schott, 11, Billy Dembie, 8, and John Cooper, 12, weren't dismayed when their ball rolled through a grate and into a catch basin. They crawled right down after it.

On top of a layer of mud in the bottom of the basin they found 13 gold coins. Under six inches of mud were many more.

The youngsters started digging excitedly but before they could get away with their find, bigger boys heard their shouts, pushed them away and grabbed the coins—all but the four John Schott clutched in his hands.

Tuesday night, John's mother

showed the coins—all \$20 pieces—to Dr. John Gluck, a collector. They were dated 1860, 1880 and 1889. Gluck paid Johnny \$36 each for them.

Reports along the west side grapevine have it that the bigger boys didn't fare as well as Johnny. Some reportedly sold their coins, but most gave them away as curios or presented them to their girl friends.

One lad, thinking they were phony, amused himself by tossing his coins off a bridge.

Scandinavian Countries Report Mystery Planes

OSLO, Norway — Scandinavian countries have reported more mystery flights over their territory by foreign aircraft. One such plane was identified as American, the Norwegian air force command said.

Lt. Gen. Finn Lambrechts said Norway would ask Allied nations to be sure their planes respect Norwegian territory. Violations, he said, could weaken the nations' defense.

Lambrechts said two unidentified planes were observed during the last few days in northern and central Norway. Commenting on similar flights over Finland and Sweden, he said that in at least one case the identity of the plane was established as American.

Mrs. Applegate Receives Reply From Communists

MEDFORD, Ore. — Mrs. Frank Applegate, who appealed to the Chinese Reds to free her newsman son, said Tuesday the Reds had replied with an offer to forward mail to her son, now held captive in China.

He is Richard Applegate, National Broadcasting Company correspondent, who was captured by Donald Dixon, INS correspondent, and Ben Krasner, U. S. merchant marine captain, on Applegate's yacht between Hong Kong and Portuguese Macao in March, 1953.

She said Huang Hua, counselor for the Chinese Reds now at Geneva, had sent her this cablegram: "Your radiogram received. If you have letters, etc., for Richard Applegate, I would be glad to forward them for you."

This was in response to her appeal to Huang last week for release of Applegate, a veteran newsman in the Far East.

Mrs. Applegate said she planned to forward any mail that friends send her for her son.

Robert Baughman, Yoncalla, Seeks Sponsor To Assist Him In Canoe Trip Across Ocean

Robert E. Baughman of Yoncalla is looking for a sponsor for a fantastic adventure in a canoe. The 39-year-old sawmill worker would like to outfit both Capt. Barney and the crew of the Kon-Tiki. He wants to take a 16-foot folding canoe equipped with a sail and navigate it across the 2,300 stretch of water from Honolulu to the West Coast. Baughman describes it as the longest stretch of water unbroken by land in the world.

The adventure becomes even more fantastic when Baughman reports he will make the canoe cruise without navigational aids or

drinking water. He says he will live the approximate two months he thinks such a cruise would take on concentrated Army rations and water distilled in a hollow plastic ball. The ball has been perfected as an aid to airmen whose planes have been downed in the ocean or men who have been shipwrecked.

Baughman would like to make the hazardous cruise during July and August. But there's just one drawback. He doesn't have the money. He says his love for adventure would drive him to make the trip with his own money—if he had it. But he says there may be some sponsor as "crazy as I am" who would donate between \$1,200 and \$1,500. This amount, he said, would pay his passage from California to Hawaii, care for his wife and three children while he was gone and cover the cost of the 16-foot folding canoe, his provisions and a sail.

Baughman is apparently not going into the adventure blindly. He has been a longtime commercial fisherman and was a merchant seaman during World War II. He says he knows the vast stretch of water.

He has made no hedging promises about the cruise. He says won't need a compass, but will guide his canoe by the sun. Besides that, he said, he will not step on any other vessel before reaching the West Coast.

He has picked July and August, because it is the time of the best prevailing winds, although the sea conditions are not the best.

What Baughman didn't say is how his wife will react to his intended adventure.

Oregon's Emergency Board Defends Hospital Position

SALEM — Oregon's Board of Control denied Tuesday that it exceeded a legislative appropriation for a new state hospital wing, and said it only is trying to take care of the hospital patients.

The answer was in reply to a State Emergency Board charge that the Board of Control exceeded the \$1,500,000 appropriation for the new wing.

The Emergency Board withheld action last Friday on the Board of Control's request for approval of the new wing.

The Emergency Board asked that the Board of Control meet with it during the week of May 24 to discuss the new building. The Board of Control, noting that is the week after the primary election, doesn't like the idea of meeting then, so it didn't set a date Tuesday.

Gov. Paul L. Patterson, chairman of the Board of Control, said that he and Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry plan to rest up that week from the rigors of the campaign.

"Earl and I are in complete agreement that we want to go away and hole up," the governor said.

Patterson and Newberry are opponents in the race for governor. The meeting must be held before May 30, because the contractors' bids on construction of the new building expire on that date.

the \$1,500,000 appropriation was to include the cost of equipment, and that the next Legislature would have to appropriate \$300,000 to get the building ready for occupancy.

The Emergency Board also said that the Legislature intended the building to have 445 beds, instead of the 670 beds in the Board of Control plans.

The people of Oregon want their wards taken care of," State Treasurer Sig Unander, the third member of the Board of Control, said. "There's nothing in the law that says we are limited to 445 beds."

"When we get this 670-bed building finished, the hospital still will be crowded. What does the Emergency Board expect us to do with the patients?"
