

# Indian Netters Run Skein To 61st Win

The Oregon dual meet champs of tennis, Roseburg's Indians, extended their superiority to even greater bounds Wednesday when they throttled Medford 6-1 in matches on the Black Tornado courts.

Winning their 61st dual meet appearance, Coach Al Hoffman's woppers of the courts enhanced their reputations even further in Northwest and Northern California prop tennis circles by smashing a Medford tennis winning streak that had extended through 16 contests including wins over a top Northern California school this year.

Billed as their season's roughest, the Black Tornado, playing before a partisan home throng of 200 fans, supplied firm resistance through the early stages of the match.

The losers managed to split one of the two first singles matches, and then gradually succumbed to the ever-present pressure of the overwhelming Indian tide.

Wayne Henninger first disposed of top-ranked singles star Jerry Kalapus 6-1, 3-6, 6-3, before brother Stan Kalapus rained partial revenge by handing Roseburg's Don Carter his first defeat in regular season singles match play since the 5-4 senior began playing on Roseburg varsity teams three years ago. Scores were 6-3, 4-6, 6-4.

The tide turned unyieldingly in Roseburg's favor once Brian Booth struggled through matches of 7-9, 11-9, 6-4 to defeat Don Robinson. Booth fought from behind a match-point situation three times during the second set when Robinson was leading 5-3.

From then on, it was easy going for the aroused Indians with only one of the four remaining matches going over two sets. In fact, Carter and Henninger made rather quick 6-0, 6-3 work of the Kalapus boys in the feature doubles attraction.

Oakland outlasted Hollywood Wednesday night to snatch a 3-1 decision in a 21-inning pitchers' battle between Oakland's 36-year-old Al Gettel and Hollywood's strong armed Bob Hall. It was one of the best pitching battles in Pacific Coast League history.

Both teams scored a run in the first inning, and after that the crowd and the players thought the game had ended in 1-1 tie as the 20th inning was completed. The scoreboard clock showed the curfew hour of 12:50 a.m. had passed. After that hour, no Pacific Coast League inning may be started. But Umpire Al Mutart's watch showed there was a fraction of a minute to go, and it was his watch that sent the players back on the field.
