Little Decline In Business Noted Around Cleveland, O.

CLEVELAND (AP) — It's been called a hard-goods recession. And this area of high focus on the making of long-lasting products and basic materials is disinclined to quarrel with the term. Many communities in the highly industrialized region have felt the slump.

But the tumble wasn't as bad as some feared when the durable goods industries started sliding last late year.

The economy by now has all but stopped skidding. Some report signs of recovery. And even the cautious predict that for some months to come there should be only a gentle settling back, with a fair chance of a pickup next year.

Cleveland industrialists are clear-eyed about the dip in production. But you'd have to dig deep to find one who'd admit he's gloomy about the future.

The iron and steel makers, the suppliers to the auto industry, the fashioners of home appliances have seen the biggest production dip, the most layoffs.

But even among the hard goods the recession has been selective—one of the most unorthodox on record.

Steel companies, for example, that make structural shapes—used by the still-prospering building industry—show up much better on the production, sales and earnings charts than do some of the companies around Cleveland, turning out the kind of steel that winds up in an auto or a gadget for the home.

Or take the way the consumer is behaving. Cleveland's jobless roll call is much longer than this time a year ago, and the total was creeping higher in April. Most of those at

work have lost any overtime they might have had. Some are working short weeks and taking home slim pay envelopes.

And yet the sale of used cars in Cleveland this year is about the same as a year ago. Cleveland's Federal Reserve Bank reports. And the sale of new cars (while trailing in the early months of the year) in recent weeks has climbed a trifle ahead of the figures for the same time last year.

Car dealers, moreover, report that their customers choose the higher priced models in the line.

Retail sales for the year to date are off about 6 percent in the 14th District, which the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland serves. The district covers Ohio, western Pennsylvania, eastern Kentucky and parts of West Virginia. For the nation as a whole the drop is 3 percent.

Larger declines appear in the industrial centers like Cleveland, Toledo and Akron than in the 4th District as a whole.

But the soft goods, with the exception of some apparel lines, are selling well. And spending on most of the services stays high.

Thermometer Is Being Produced By Army Colonel

WASHINGTON (AP) — Development of a new clinical thermometer described as more accurate and much faster than the present mercury type was announced Thursday by the Army.

The surgeon general's office said the new electronic device, called "Swift," represents "the first change in clinical thermometers since the mercury column type was introduced... in 1887."

The developer was Col. George T. Perkins, a native of San Antonio, Tex., who is director of the dental division of the Army Medical Service Graduate School at Walter Reed Hospital.

Col. Perkins said in an interview the instrument could record temperatures by remote control, and that he envisions "having all the beds in a ward wired so that patients could place a thermometer under their tongues or arms and a nurse at a distant part of the ward could read their temperatures off a meter."

Thermometers now in common use depend upon the expansion of mercury when heated to get a temperature reading.

The new device uses metals whose ability to conduct an electric current varies according to temperature—that is, the higher the temperature, the lower their electrical resistance.

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U. S. Asks Russia For Report On Prisoners

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has asked Russia to report on and release any American soldiers from the Korean War who are now held by the Soviets, but the Soviet government has flatly denied there are "any such persons in the Soviet Union."

An exchange of notes was made public Thursday by the State Department. The department did not amplify its reasons for making the request to Russia in the first place.

Mother To See Daughter After 35 Years Apart

LEAVENWORTH, Kan. (AP) — A mother and daughter who for the last 35 years had believed the other dead will be reunited at Grants Pass, Ore.

They are Mrs. Walter J. Bowden, who operates a cafe at Grants Pass, and Mrs. Helen Noll, 39, Leavenworth, wife of a sheet metal worker.

They became separated 36 years ago at Wichita when the mother put her three small children—Walter, Helen and Charles Bird—aboard a train bound for an orphanage at Atchison in World War I.

Mrs. Noll talked to Mrs. Bowden by telephone and learned that the mother had gone through the years believing her children had died.

When Mrs. Noll told Mrs. Bowden she was her daughter, the Oregon woman exclaimed: "Oh, my God, it can't be."

"It must be," Mrs. Noll replied. "I am your daughter."

The mother was overcome by emotion and someone else took over the telephone.

Arrangements were made for Mrs. Noll and her husband, Maurice, to fly to Grants Pass Thursday.

The reunion is the result of an invitation Mrs. Noll received from a cousin, James O. Ford of Garden City, Kan., to attend a Ford family reunion at Kingman, Kan., May 23.

In replying, Mrs. Noll recalled that her mother's maiden name was Ford and gave as many facts as possible about her background.

The cousin had also been in contact with Mrs. Bowden and from information he had gathered he believed they were mother and daughter.

Mrs. Noll said her youngest brother, Walter, died about a year ago. Charles, an older brother, lives in Wichita.

Mrs. Noll's husband is employed by Trans World Airlines in Kansas City. Mrs. Noll works in the cafeteria at the Sunshine Biscuit Co., in Kansas City.

**812 Veterans
Receive Home
Loans Since '45**

A total of 812 World War II and Korean veterans in Douglas County have received Oregon 4 percent home and farm loans since 1945.

H. C. Saalfeld, director of the state Department of Veterans' Affairs, reported this week. Dollar volume of these loans amounted to \$4,000,050.

In the eight and a half years since the state veterans' loan program has been in effect, through April 30, 1954, loans statewide amounted to \$37,539,189 to 12,345 ex-servicemen.

Of the 812 loans in Douglas County, 756 were for the purchase, refinancing or construction of homes in the amount of \$3,786,209 while 56 were farm loans totaling \$303,850.

Eligible veterans may borrow up to 25 percent of the appraised value of the property, to the maximum of \$9,000 to acquire homes or \$15,000 for farms. The money is loaned to the veteran direct from the State of Oregon at 4 percent interest for a period of 20 years or less.

Saalfeld pointed out that the state's loan program is entirely self supporting, with veterans' interest costs paying administrative expenses and redeeming the bonds issued to finance the program.

To qualify, a veteran must have served 90 days or more during either World War II or the current emergency and be honorably discharged. He must have been an Oregon resident when he enlisted, or have lived in Oregon for two years or more following discharge. The two years' postwar residence of a World War II veteran must have been prior to Dec. 31, 1950.

Veterans may apply through county veterans' service officers, or direct to the State Veterans' Department in Portland or Salem. Mail applications to the department should be addressed to the Salem office in the State Library Building.

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Special Fleet For Arctic Use Will Be Built

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense chiefs plan to build a special fleet of vessels able to operate in the frozen Arctic, it was disclosed Wednesday. This was new evidence that the Arctic may be a vital strategic area if World War III should break out.

Vice Adm. Francis E. Denebrink, commander of the Military Sea Transportation Service, urged senators to approve a special 50 million dollar fund to build a number of ships. Six of them would be capable of breaking ice or withstanding great ice pressure.

The admiral heads MSTs, which carries gasoline, weapons and other cargo as well as troops to many U. S. bases.

"These ships will be available immediately in the event of a sudden outbreak of hostilities," the admiral said in a statement for the Senate appropriations subcommittee considering the 29 billion dollar annual defense bill.

Defense officials have stressed in recent years that the shortest air distance between Soviet Russia and the United States is across the northern polar areas.

That is the reason for multi-million dollar outlays for air bases, radar networks and other facilities in Alaska, Greenland, etc.
