

Nothing Basically Wrong With Housing, Says Cole

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Albert M. Cole, federal housing chief, says an investigation of recent scandals in the Federal Housing Administration shows nothing basically unsound in the housing law.

Cole said the administration's housing bill was "too important, too needed, to be sidetracked" by the scandals.

He addressed the National Savings and Loan League here Wednesday.

Cole said the FHA investigation was necessary to eliminate weak spots and serious shortcomings, but "nothing in the disclosures we have made affects the basic soundness of the bill."

Though a relatively small number have suffered from their use of FHA loans and a group of developers have unduly gained in rental housing, millions of families today have good homes and sound mortgages under the FHA system.

Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Bell took their 10-month-old baby to a specialist in Eugene Tuesday morning for medical treatment.

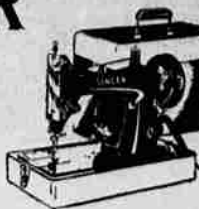

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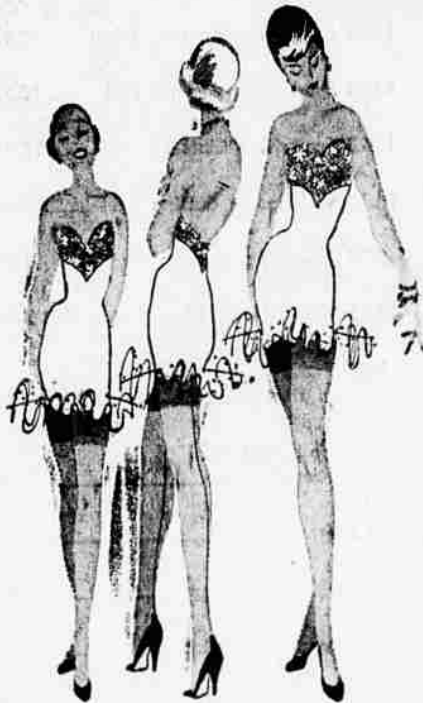
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
