Shingles is a very painful affliction of the skin which is limited usually to the course of one of the peripheral or external nerves. It appears as a red, angry-looking cluster of blisters which encircle the body on one side, usually, from the spine around to the midline of the body in front.

It is considered by some that this disease is caused by a virus which is thought to be similar to the virus of chicken pox. The blisters appear the same in both diseases, but in chicken pox the blisters occur in crops at irregular intervals and affect the entire body, more or less, on both sides, whereas shingles is usually confined to a single area on one side of the body.

The disease begins with pain in the region where the blisters will ultimately appear. The pain lasts for several days. Then the skin becomes red along the nerve which is affected. Clusters of blisters form on this reddened area which soon break and crusts form.

Sutherlin Hits At Water Waste

The Sutherlin City Council has approved an ordinance designed to keep water in supply this summer, but to prevent waste in sprinkling lawns, according to City Manager Hugh McKinley.

The rate schedule has been set up so that normal usage of water will be charged at a regular summer rate. But from there, the schedule increases for each 1,000 gallons of water used.

McKinley explained that the city can allow no waste of water as bonds used for water system improvements are to be redeemed on schedule. The higher rates, he said, are designed to act as a deterrent. The schedule remains in effect for the months of June through September, and is set up only for residential usage.

A \$2 minimum is charged for 1,000 gallons, and the next 9,000 used will cost consumers 50 cents. The next 10,000 gallons will cost 5 cents a thousand. From there, each 10,000-gallon additional consumption will cost a nickel a thousand and until maximum rate of 25 cents a thousand is reached for those using more than 30,000 gallons a month.

Yoncalla City Budget Announced At \$32,895

The Yoncalla City budget committee has completed a city budget which calls for \$11,449 to be raised by taxation. No date has yet been set for an election on an excess outside the 6 per cent limitation.

Total expenditures listed by the budget will be \$32,895. Estimated revenue will be \$21,576, according to the Drain Enterprise.

A total of \$11,900 plus \$2,500 to go into a sinking fund will go toward paying for the new water system. The street fund is set at \$10,000.

The budget is about \$9,000 over last year because of an amount due on the water bond issue.

Community Hospital Aides Adopt New Name

A Finnish phrase, "walko opu," meaning "aides in white," has been adopted as the official name for the Douglas Community Hospital nurses aides.

The women, who faithfully aid registered nurses in their duties in tending patients, have formed a new unit which will meet monthly for social and educational purposes. They have adopted a slogan, "NASKE," which stands for the words, "nurses aides seek knowledge and efficiency."

Mrs. Mable Stadsklav, president of the group, states that while nurses and training does not count toward becoming a registered nurse, many young women are entering the field today. The principal duty of a nurse aide is the minor care and feeding of patients, thus relieving the nurse for more important duties.

Indochina Peace Meet Is Underway At Geneva

(Continued from Page One)

Dakota transport planes could land there and expedite the evacuation of French wounded.

The French mission, headed by Dr. Pierre Huard, flew back into Dien Bien Phu from Laos carrying with it instructions from the French high command to seek agreement of the Communist-led rebels on speeding up the removal of wounded.

The French had mobilized all available helicopters and light planes in order to help speed the evacuation.

The first contingent of wounded arrived here Friday. They included French paratroopers, Algerians and Foreign Legionnaires.

The French rushed helicopters and monoplanes to Luang Prabang, royal Laotian capital, 115 miles southwest of the alien bastion, a province with the mercy lift. Here in Hanoi, the French forbade any interviews with the wounded until possibly next week because of their "critical condition."

Informed military and civilian sources in Saigon voiced fears today that the Vietnamese command, Gen. Vo Nguyen Giap, was trying to gain important military advantages from the evacuation operation. This interpretation stemmed from Giap's insistence that the French refrain from bombing 70 miles of strategic highway from Dien Bien Phu to Sonla, east of the fallen fortress. The Vietnamese said their own wounded are to be moved along that road.

Run-away Auto Crashes Into Retaining Wall

A car which broke its emergency brake while parked on a steeply graded street rolled 106 feet downhill before smashing into a retaining wall and overturning Friday evening, Roseburg police report.

The owner, Robert Hinds, Roseburg Hotel, was cited to municipal court for improper parking of the car.

Officers said the car was parked on Glen Street. It caused \$100 damage to shrubs and the retaining wall at the W. A. Shattuck home, 345 Glen St., before turning over on its side at the curb. The car was badly damaged.

Two other cars collided Friday afternoon at the intersection of Oak and Stephens streets. Neither was damaged badly, and no citations were written. The cars were driven by Harlow Friday, 17, 119 Housley St., and Eugene Ridenour, 44, 321 S. Mill St.

Plaintiffs Are Favored In Two Accident Suits

Circuit court juries returned verdicts in favor of the plaintiffs in two suits Friday. Both were personal accident cases filed against the State Industrial Accident Commission.

The jury found that Arthur B. Wilken and Joe Richard Couey had sustained personal injuries in accidents in the course of their employment. Wilken was injured Oct. 20, 1953, while working for Myrtle Creek Welding & Machine Works. Couey was hurt Oct. 9, 1953, while an employee of Commercial Contractors Inc.

The jury action forces the commission to reconsider disability compensation claims by the two men.
