

## Ernest Hemingway, Gravely Injured, Is Now Recovering

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Ernest Hemingway was gravely injured in two plane crashes in Africa in January and badly burned later while fighting a brush fire. But he wants friends to know he's well on toward recovery now.

That the maestro of modern American letters has recovered at all is testimony to his amazing constitution and power of recovery. Italian doctors who attended him in Venice said that normally his injuries would have permitted him to live only a few months.

The 55-year-old author of "Death in the Afternoon" is in Madrid, of course, to see the bullfights as well as continue medical treatment in Madrid's warm, dry climate. Next week is the fiesta of Madrid's patron saint with bullfights every day.

Hemingway and his wife, "Miss Mary," crashed near Murchison Falls in central Africa in January while flying from Nairobi to the Congo — a "Christmas present" to Miss Mary. She broke two ribs and Hemingway dislocated a shoulder and elbow.

Two days later, Jan. 23, they crashed at the takeoff in a second plane and Hemingway said in an interview Friday that most of the damage was done then.

He began to feel progressively worse and when the Hemingways sailed for Italy, the ship's doctor found he had:

1. Suffered a "traumatic lesion" to the 12th vertebra and jammed two others together.
2. Ruptured his right kidney.
3. Ruptured his intestine.
4. Collapsed his intestine.
5. Suffered a concussion which resulted first in double vision and

## Marshall Islands Folk Ask To End Hydrogen Tests

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Representatives of the people of the Marshall Islands in the Pacific have appealed to the United Nations for an immediate end to experiments with hydrogen bombs in their area.

They reported the inhabitants of two atolls in the mid-Pacific island group—Rongelap and Uterik—are suffering from a lowering of the blood count, burns, nausea and are losing hair from their heads since the recent U.S. hydrogen explosion tests.

These are symptoms which have been noted among persons who have become victims of radioactivity from nuclear explosions.

The appeal was contained in a petition to the United Nations.

It was signed by members of a Marshall Islands congress "hold-over committee." Members of the committee said they were empowered by the Marshall Islands congress to act in its name when it is not in session.

The Marshall Islanders' committee said the petition was not a repudiation of the United States, the governing agency for the United Nations under the trusteeship agreement, but that they were worried because of the increasing danger from the H-bomb experiments.

The United States announced Thursday night the completion of a series of hydrogen explosion tests at the mid-Pacific proving grounds.

## Nehru Would Consider Role On Peace Panel

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru said India would consider a role to promote peace settlements in Indochina and Korea.

Nehru told Parliament his government was not "angling" for an invitation to the Geneva talks on the two issues. But he added, if India were asked to take part in a settlement "we cannot avoid going and act as we did in Korea."

He marked the first time Nehru had publicly indicated India would be willing to take a hand in the Korean and Indochina issues.

### Talbot Says Air Force Can Bomb Any Place

NEW YORK (AP)—Air Secretary Harold E. Talbot said Saturday the Air Force "is ready this instant to take off with its cargo of bombs for any part of the world," if need be.

Talbot told an Armed Forces Day meeting in Rockefeller Plaza that America's strength has been a deterrent to foreign attack.

Despite the security afforded by a powerful air force, he said, the nation must sustain its civilian defense effort. He said the work of the ground observer corps was particularly important.

Talbot unveiled an F86F supersonic Sabrejet—the "Miss New York"—while several hundred persons applauded.

## CBS Pays Bill For McCarthy

NEW YORK (AP) — The Columbia Broadcasting System Saturday paid Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) for the cost of filming his reply to a critical television report on him by news commentator Edward R. Murrow.

The network, saying it believed its "policy of fairness and balance" required that McCarthy be reimbursed for expenses of preparing his filmed reply, sent him a check for \$8,336.99.

However, CBS said it would not have paid the outside costs, except for the fact that the criticism was on a program produced and controlled by the network.

Murrow, a CBS staff member, made the original broadcast on his weekly "See It Now" program March 9, and at that time offered McCarthy the opportunity to reply on the same program in the future.

The senator employed an outside firm to film his answer, which was televised on "See It Now" April 6. McCarthy then sent a bill for his expenses to the show's sponsor, the Aluminum Co. of America.

Alcoa sent it back to him, saying its contract with CBS covered the show's costs.

McCarthy then forwarded the bill to CBS.

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## U. N. Command Asks For Nationals' Release

PANMUNJOM (AP) — The U. N. Command Thursday asked the Communists to release or account for 55 foreign nationals last reported in Red hands and renewed a demand for 3,405 Allied soldiers they insist were war prisoners at one time.

The 55 foreign nationals—31 of them missionaries—were named in a list submitted to the Communists at a meeting of the Joint Military Armistice Commission.

The Allies have demanded an accounting of the service personnel several times since the exchange of war prisoners last year. The Communists ignored the request regarding the foreign nationals and repeated their frequently voiced statement that all Allied prisoners who wanted to go home had been repatriated.

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
