Yoshida Refuses To Pose With Secretary Wilson

TOKYO (AP)—Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida, who is planning to go to the United States next month to discuss military aid to Japan, has refused to pose with U. S. Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson for American photographers.

The crusty prime minister sent his refusal to pose through a secretary who said, "You can quote the prime minister, he hates photographers."

Most observers said the prime minister apparently was talking for home consumption. Yoshida's administration has been criticized at home for being pro-American. Refusing to pose for American photographers with an American cabinet member would be interpreted by some Japanese as a planned insult to Americans.

However, the prime minister has been fighting with photographers from Japan and other countries for the five years he has been in office.

He once slapped a photographer, threatened one group with his umbrella and threw a glass of water at another.
