The most recent addition to the camp is the counselors recreation cabin. A fresh water supply comes from a deep well on the property.

The camp is scheduled to open July 11. Registrations are being accepted at the Camp Fire office, Room 2, Masonic Building. The camp is open to girls who are not members as well as to Camp Fire girls, Mrs. Hult states.

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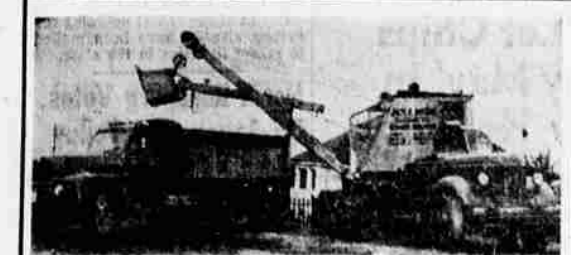
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Supreme Court Sets Argument On Segregation

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court is making plans to hear arguments on Oct. 12—the earliest possible date—on the form of final decrees to carry out its decision ending segregation of Negroes and whites in public schools.

Court Clerk Harold B. Willey said today he hopes the arguments can be completed in one day. The nine justices will then weigh the matter in closed conference before issuing the decrees, perhaps shortly after the arguments, possibly months later.

The court, after ruling Monday that segregation of public school pupils because of race violates the Constitution, permitted delay in the final decrees to give officials in the 17 Southern and Border states affected time to work out plans.

District of Columbia officials announced they planned to integrate schools by the opening of the new fall term. President Eisenhower was quoted as expressing an interest in asking to be kept informed on progress.

Nothing in the court's opinion prevents such steps to end segregation immediately.

Favorites Lead In Pennsylvania Primary Voting

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Organization-backed Republicans and Democrats scored comparatively easy primary victories in Pennsylvania yesterday with only slightly more than 29 percent of the state's five million eligible voters going to the polls.

It was one of the lightest statewide vote turnouts in Pennsylvania in recent years.

The nominees to succeed Gov. John S. Fine are Republican Lloyd H. Wood, 56, present lieutenant governor and "harmony" choice of the GOP leadership, and Democratic State Sen. George M. Leader, 36, nominee of the party's state policy committee.

Riding to victory with Wood on the GOP slate were candidates for lieutenant governor, secretary of internal affairs and three posts on the State Superior Court. There was no opposition to Democratic party-endorsed candidates for these offices.

Also nominated were candidates for 30 congressional seats, 213 State House of Representatives' chairs and half of the 50-member State Senate. Twenty-eight congressmen were renominated.

Kootenai River Continues To Rise, Posing Threat To Columbia Basin Areas

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho (AP)—The raging Kootenai River rose to 32 feet here Wednesday with no letup in sight as flood-conscious farmers watched anxiously behind dirt dikes protecting 40,000 acres of land.

"The river is rising at a rapid rate and we expect some trouble by evening," said Dayton Douglas, the flood coordinator in this north Idaho community of 1,800.

The Kootenai, fed by runoff from record mountain snowpacks, was rising everywhere upstream in the wake of July temperatures. A high of 34 feet was forecast for Bonners Thursday.

There was no serious flooding Wednesday even though the level of 32 was a foot above what is normally regarded here as "flood stage."

The town is protected by 37-foot dikes. The lowest in the rich Kootenai Valley farming areas are 34 feet. Some seepage was beginning to show Wednesday but most dikes looked strong.

Gov. Len Jordan proclaimed a state of emergency Tuesday and the Army Engineers swung into action with trucks, bulldozers and 100 men to build up weak spots in the barriers.

Douglas said a decision will be made later Wednesday on whether to ask for more Army help. About 400 soldiers at Fort Lewis, Wash., were standing by.

The Weather Bureau said the 80-plus temperatures in the area Tuesday were average for July and that the warm air extended up to 14,000 feet, bringing melting at all elevations.

A rapid rise at Libby and Rexford, Mont. Wednesday forecast more trouble later at Bonners Ferry.

Glide Kiwanians Lease Property

The lease is for 10 years, with option to purchase at any time during the term of the lease. Arrangements are being made to improve the site by leveling, planting shrubbery, fencing and erection of a flagpole. Development of a Glide Kiwanis Park and construction of the community clubhouse, which will be available to the residents of the area, will be undertaken at some future date.

Lenders Will Be Held Responsible For FHA Policing

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chairman Capehart (R-Ind.) said the Senate Banking Committee would vote to give banks and other private lenders "full responsibility" for policing FHA-insured home repair loans.

This, said Capehart, would be one way to seal up loopholes in the present law, loopholes that unscrupulous salesmen and contractors allegedly have used to cheat many unsuspecting home owners.

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Referring to the home repair situation, Capehart said: "We will continue this program but not without giving lending institutions full responsibility for seeing that their loans are used for legitimate home repairs."

At present, private lenders are assured of full government repayment without any obligation to try to collect on defaulted loans.

Capehart told newsmen he expects the committee to adopt a new provision which would make banks and other private lenders shoulder part of the risk of making home repair loans.

Douglas County Loggers Again Start Work Early

Douglas County loggers were out in the wee hours again today in an effort to get a day's work done before being forced out of the woods because of the dry weather.

Workers were forced out of the woods again Tuesday when lightning struck below the critical 30 per cent, Douglas Forest Protective Assn. officials said.

A possibility of relief for the situation is seen by the U. S. Weather Bureau station at Roseburg. Although the chance for rain in any quantity seems remote, some cloudy skies may hold the temperature down somewhat.

The forecast today was for more fair weather with high clouds. There has been no rain here since April 27.

Ora Mast Worthington Dead Estimated 2 Weeks
