## Picket Line Is Formed At Iron Fireman Corp.

PORTLAND — AFL Electrical Workers established a picket line at the electronics division plant of the Iron Fireman Corp. here Tuesday afternoon after negotiations in a contract dispute ended in a deadlock.

The strike was authorized by a union local representing some 450 employees at the plant. Union Business Agent Chuck Hoffman said the issues included wages and union claims of inequities in job classifications.

Robert V. Jack, plant manager, said the matter is a dispute over wages. He said the company does not feel any greater increases than it has offered are justified. The Portland Central Labor Council put the firm on its unfair list Monday night.

The electronics division manufactures military airplane equipment for the government and control equipment for private firms.

## Flash Flooding Damage Million

ROSWELL, N. M. — Damage was estimated at more than a million dollars Tuesday in a flash flood which turned normally dry arroyos into raging streams and damaged 200 homes in this southeastern New Mexico city.

A Red Cross emergency committee, meeting with city and National Guard officials, said 400 persons were evacuated from their homes as rising waters forced some to refuge on the roofs.

Earlier, officials said from 750 to 1,000 had fled from their homes as flood waters rose.

Some houses were severely damaged and one was washed away burning as it floated. Two homes collapsed. No one was injured.

The flooded area covered a four-mile square section of the city with two to three feet of water, the committee reported.

City Manager C. M. Woodbury sent a plane aloft at mid-morning to scout the Hondo and Spring Rivers upstream. His reports were waters subsiding and no additional flow expected unless the weather changed.

## GAS TRUCK COLLIDES

PORTLAND — While a disaster truck loudspeaker warned bystanders not to smoke, crews pumped gasoline from a wrecked tank truck which was involved in a collision with a S P & S train Tuesday.

The gasoline was pumped into waiting tankers while the fire department stood by.

## Newbry Demands Dam Fish Ladder

SALEM — Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry demanded Tuesday that the State Game Commission force Mountain States Power Co. to build a fish ladder over its dam on the North Santiam River. The dam is one mile north of Stayton.

Newbry cited a law which says operators of dams must provide passages so the fish can get over the dams.

"Many fish are beating themselves into a state of exhaustion in their efforts to migrate above this dam."

"Since there is no ladder to enable these fish to proceed upstream, they finally spawn immediately below this artificial obstruction, in water that fluctuates from time to time, so that spawn is wasted."

"It is requested that you give this matter your immediate attention, and that you advise me why this condition has been allowed to go uncorrected," Newbry wrote to the game commission.

## Estacada Terrorizer Committed To Hospital

OREGON CITY — Ralph D. Thomas, who shot up the town of Estacada early Monday, was committed to the state mental hospital after a sanity hearing here.

Thomas, 38, was accused of setting up a road block on Squaw Mountain Road near Estacada and terrorizing passing motorists by threatening them with a rifle. Later he chased the customers out of an Estacada restaurant and fired several shots at a parked car.

He was taken into custody by Sheriff's Deputy Gil Rand after 35 police had searched for him for four hours.

Relatives signed the necessary papers to have Thomas committed to the state hospital for mental treatment.

## SMOKERS CAUSE FIRES

SALEM — Smokers caused two fires in Northeastern Oregon near La Grange in the past two days, burning 11 acres, the State Forestry Department said Tuesday.

The Forestry Department said the fire weather forecast is for cooler westerly winds with humidity of 22 to 32 in the interior.



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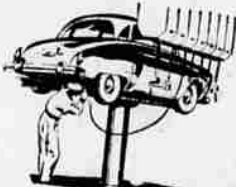
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
