### 1954 Rose Show Dates Announced By Garden Club

The 1954 annual rose show has been scheduled by the Roseburg Woman's Club Friday and Saturday, May 28 and 29, according to Spokesman Mrs. Kenneth Ford.

To make sure the show skinned off the best roses in the area, Mrs. Ford had several pointers for the growers.

She pointed out that the secret of winning prizes lies in planning ahead. She said the first requisite is selection of good plants. The roses should be labeled.

Next, growers should disbud as soon as the side buds of secondary flowers are visible. Small side shoots which develop in the axils of the leaves should also be removed. Removal at the earliest stage will cause wounds to heal.

Another secret, she said, is the manner in which roses are cared for at the time they are cut. Cut the roses the evening before the show, she said. Take a pail of water into the garden and as soon as the stem is cut, plunge it into the water. Don't crowd too many flowers into one container. To prevent flowers from being bruised by hitting the sides of the pail, place a roll of newspaper around the side in the water.

She went on to say rose stems should be cut at least 12 inches long. The wooden labels should be put on stems when the roses are cut.

The rose should be cut as the bud begins to unfurl. She urged that the cut roses be taken inside as soon as possible and placed in a cool, damp place away from drafts. The floor can be sprinkled to increase humidity in the air.

Soda pop bottles in their case form the best method of transportation to the show. The label with name of rose should be wired at the top of the bottle.
