Commissioner Rules Out Part Of Union Exhibit

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal Power Commission Examiner William J. Costello Wednesday sustained objections of Idaho Power Co. attorneys and rejected exhibits submitted at the Hells Canyon hearing by two public power witnesses.

When attorney R. P. Parry protested that proper foundation had not been laid for introduction of the exhibits, Costello ruled out portions of testimony by Ed Weston, president of the Washington State Federation of Labor, and Samuel Momen, Bonneville Power Administration market expert.

Weston and Momen were called by public power attorneys to testify against the Idaho Power Co.'s application to build three small dams on the Snake River near where a federal dam has been proposed.

The rejected exhibits included information on population and unemployment trends.

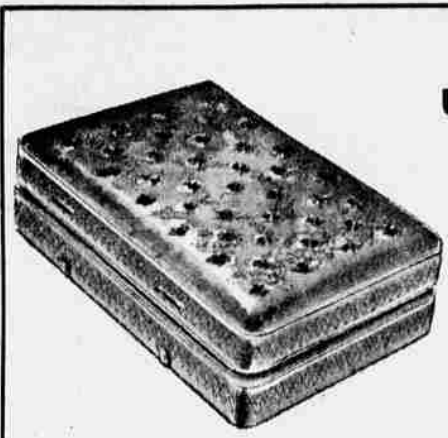
Weston testified low-cost power from a federal dam would bring Northwest to offset seasonal unemployment in the lumber industry. He said his dates were prepared by a consulting firm and not by him.

Momen's testimony giving the background on battles between the federal Interior Department and private power companies over construction of federal power transmission lines in Montana and Washington also was stricken.

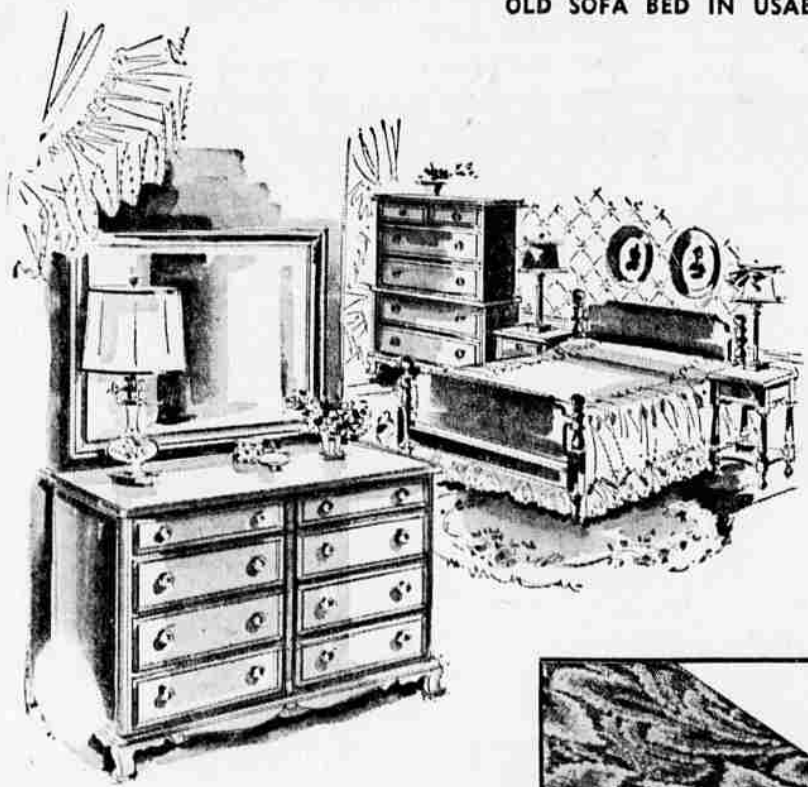

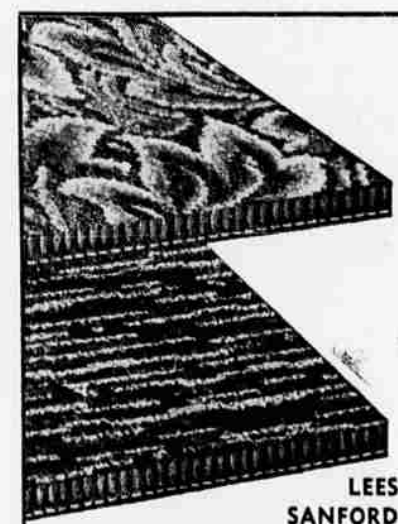
