

Senate Approves Cordon O&C Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Guy Cordon's bill to put 472,000 acres of disputed Oregon timber land under Forest Service administration won approval of the Senate Thursday.

The bill now goes to the House. The Senate passed the measure on a voice vote after rejecting, 52-18, a move by Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore) to put the lands under the Department of Interior's Bureau of Land Management.

The BLM, which now manages some two million acres of timberland in Oregon, claimed jurisdiction of the 472,000 acres. Morse said it would be "more sensible and efficient" to have the entire acreage under one agency.

Cordon (R-Ore) said the 472,000 acres, which are part of the Oregon and California railroad land grant reclaimed by Congress in 1916, now are under Forest Service administration, and should remain there. He said the Forest Service

McCarthy Says He'll Be On Hand

Subcommittee Staff
Readies Plans For
Resumption Monday

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrats on the Senate investigations subcommittee took a stand Friday the public is entitled to hear anything "relevant" to the McCarthy-Army dispute in transcripts of monitored telephone calls.

They put themselves on record with a stipulation sent to acting Chairman Mundt (R-SD) authorizing use on that basis of any transcripts there may be of their own telephone talks.

Their action came as the subcommittee staff prepared for reopening of the hearings next Monday and Sen. McCarthy blasted at the Eisenhower administration's secrecy order as "taking the fifth amendment."

Quelling speculation he might never go back to the hearings, McCarthy said, "I'll be there Monday."

But, just before leaving for Wisconsin on a speech-making trip, McCarthy told a reporter he plans in the next few hours to give a lot of thought to "what we may do Monday if they (the White House) keep this secrecy order in effect."

McCarthy is to speak at a Chamber of Commerce function in Ft. Atkinson, Wis., Saturday night. He said he will "speak about the hearings" and possibly announce "what we'll do on Monday."

Administration Power Policy At Stake In Hearings Held On Cooperative Proposals

WASHINGTON (AP) — A review of administration power policy may be in the works as an outgrowth of legislation authorizing construction of two proposed Pacific Northwest hydroelectric dams on a federal-local level "partnership" basis.

Sens. Magnuson and Jackson (D-Wash.), sponsors of a bill to authorize construction by local interests of the Priest Rapids power dam on the Columbia River in Washington State, Thursday indicated such may be the result at hearings before a Senate public works subcommittee.

The committee considered the Priest Rapids bill and one by Sen. Cordon (R-Ore), to authorize joint construction of Cougar Dam on Oregon's McKenzie River by the federal government and Eugene, Ore., Water and Electric Board but recessed without taking action.

A joint statement by Magnuson and Jackson suggested they were lukewarm toward their own bill.

The senators said the primary reason for the bill was that "There have been no new starts in the Pacific Northwest for two years and this year there are no funds in the budget to initiate construction on new dams."

Magnuson said while he "thoroughly disagrees" with the administration's power policy he felt the "local people should have a chance to help themselves" because of the Northwest's needs for power.

Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore) also expressed doubt as to the merits of the proposal and urged the subcommittee to "be very careful" in approving legislation which might modify the national power policy.

Cordon urged the subcommittee to approve his measure. He said it would enable the city to "provide for its own power needs and at the same time reduce the cost of flood control to the federal government."

Both bills were passed by the House Wednesday.

Light Vote Is Indicated In Primary

Check Shows Few Voters Early Today

A cursory check of six polling precincts in Roseburg Friday morning showed the voter turnout was running as light as usual for a primary election.

Most election board chairman contacted said the voters were filing in very slowly, but that such a condition was normal during the morning of election day.

Roseburg precinct at St. George's Episcopal Parish Hall had had 34 voters by 10 a. m., the heaviest of the precincts checked. Only 16 had voted at the courthouse (Deer Creek precinct) by the same time. Other precincts were running under that number.

But the light vote early in the morning was regarded normal by most officials. Many offices are not contested, which adds to the complacency of many voters.

The county commissioner's race has created the most interest locally.

Polls will close at 8 p. m. Voters are reminded that a list of polling places was published in The News-Review Wednesday and Thursday.

Shoulders Gets Three, Dolan 2 Years In Pen

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Two St. Louis policemen who captured little Bobby Greenleaf's kidnappers were sentenced to prison Friday for lying to a federal grand jury about what happened to a record \$600,000 ransom.

Former Lieut. Louis Shoulders, a veteran of 27 years on the police force was sentenced to three years, Rookie Patrolman Elmer Dolan was given two years.

District Judge Albert A. Rigde, who sentenced the pair on charges of perjury, said he made the distinction because Shoulders was the dominating man, who had the direction and supervision over Dolan in the case.

The two arrested little Bobby's kidnappers, Carl Austin Hall, in a St. Louis hotel last Oct. 6, shortly after Hall and his accomplice, Mrs. Bonnie Brown Heady, had collected the record \$600,000 ransom from the child's multimillionaire father, Robert C. Greenleaf of Kansas City.

The boy had been abducted from an exclusive private school in Kansas City and shot to death on Sept. 28.

When less than half the ransom money was recovered authorities challenged the stories told by the two policemen about how they handled the case. Shoulders and Dolan maintained throughout the proceedings that they had no knowledge of the missing \$303,720 in \$10 and \$20 bills.

Hall and Mrs. Heady were convicted of the kidnap-slaying and were executed in the gas chamber of the Missouri state penitentiary at Jefferson City last Dec. 18.

County Court Signs Contract For Oil Rights

Members of the Douglas County Court signed an agreement Thursday for lease of sub-surface rights on 62,000 acres of land. The agreement is with Oil Developers Inc. of Roseburg, which previously leased many acres of privately owned land in the Melrose-Lookingglass area.

The county lands involved are scattered throughout the county except for that part south of the Riddle and Live Oak Lookout areas. Size of the parcels varies from about 20 to 1,000 acres, with the largest segment being west of Riddle in the Nickel Mountain area.

The county will receive 10 cent per acre rental, it was announced by Robert E. Kischel, lands department supervisor. The lease is for five years.

Kischel explained that the \$6,200 annual rental will be in effect until such time as the company strikes oil on any of the 62,000 acres or on any other land the company has leased in the county.

If and when oil is struck, the rental fee will jump to 50 cents per acre. If an oil or gas well is brought in by the company, the county will receive the standard one-eighth share of any production. If sulphur is found, the county will receive \$2 per ton on it.

The lease covers only mineral rights which the county retained when timber on much of the land was sold. Surface rights to the land involved have already been sold to private timber companies. On only about 3,000 of the 62,000 acres has the county, up to this time, retained both surface and sub-surface rights.

Certain controls are embodied in the lease, Kischel said. Rental payments must be made twice a year, with the initial payment of about \$2,100, falling due in November. The county has stipulated that the lease is not to be used for promotional purposes only. If and when oil is discovered on any of the land, Oil Developers will have to make monthly reports to the county on the company's activities.

Highclimber Falls To Death Near Other Fatality

A former Cottage Grove resident, William Joseph Berg, 26, became Douglas County's sixth logging fatality of the year Thursday, just a day after Donald Benson of Winston was fatally crushed by logs.

The two men were killed in the same area, and both were employed by E. G. Nelson Logging Co.

Berg, a highclimber, fell to his death from atop a 185-foot spar tree where he was putting up new rigging. Fellow workers said he was killed almost instantly, Coroner L. L. Powers stated.

It was reported Berg was chopping a knot off with his axe when the axe slipped and sliced his safety rope. The mishap occurred near Upper Olla Road about 20 miles southwest of Roseburg.

Berg came to Douglas County a short time ago from the London community near Cottage Grove. He was born in Portland on Feb. 9, 1928.

He was a member of the Catholic Church and of the London Grange.

Survivors include his wife, Gladys of Cottage Grove; two sons, Larry William and Kelly Scott, both of Cottage Grove; a stepdaughter, Sherry of Cottage Grove; a step-son, James of Rochester, Wash.; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Berg of Portland, and a half-brother, Harry McDonald of Eugene.

The body was removed to the Chapel of The Roses, Roseburg Funeral Home. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Stromberg Bid Low On Housing

Paul Aebel, acting chairman of the Housing Authority of Douglas County Thursday, announced that Albert Stromberg was apparent low bidder on construction of a 14-unit low housing project at Reedport.

The Portlander's bid of \$104,648 was the lowest of four submitted. Other bids were submitted by Bickford Construction Co., Portland; Todd Building Co., Roseburg; and Lillebo Construction Co., Reedport.

Aebel reported the authority is currently reviewing the bids and an announcement of award would be made within about "four or five days."

The project will be bounded in Reedport by Highways 101 and 38 and Kingwood and Juniper Streets. It is located four blocks from the grade school and five blocks from the city center.

It will consist of eight two-bedroom units and six three-bedroom units. The city of Reedport requested the aid of the Housing Authority in building the project because of lack of low cost housing for low-income families in the area.

Grain Growers Winners Of Lower Freight Rate

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — A 10-cent per 100 pounds cut in grain freight rates from the Northwest to the Minneapolis milling area was announced Thursday.

The first word on the reduction came from Charles H. Heltzel, Oregon public utilities commissioner. It was confirmed by a Great Northern Railway rate official in Seattle, who said the agreement had been reached Thursday.

The Great Northern spokesman said the reduction was agreed to by all the transcontinental lines serving the Northwest.

He said the cut is from 86½ cents a 100 pounds to 76½. Grain growers had petitioned for a cut of 12 cents to 74½.

"This is a great boon to the grain growers of the Northwest," Heltzel said, "because they have been shut out of eastern markets by blanket percentage freight rate increases."

"Now, with this reduction, they again will be placed on an equal footing with growers in other areas."
