Unusually Rapid Reports From 80 Precincts Credited To Cooperation

A newspaper's job of gathering a minute-by-minute unofficial count of a countywide election is a tremendously big one. This year's primary election machinery was unusually successful.

The success, as reflected in the almost full returns reported and tabulated in today's News-Review, is based on a cooperative effort of scores of people. And all deserve a special vote of thanks.

The first of the 82 precincts was reported just 14 minutes after the polls closed. Benson had finished its tabulation. A minute later, West Glendale was in. Then, the News-Review's four lines were kept busy almost constantly. By 9 p.m. (an hour after the polls closed) 23 precincts were reported. An hour later, 65 were in.

These immediate results came from weeks of planning and a host of helping hands.

County Clerk Charles Doerner smoothed the way for the splendid returns by requesting the counting board chairman to help the News-Review. He and his staff were also primarily responsible for making possible immediate reports on filings of candidates.

Other plaudits go to Sheriff Cal Baird and his deputies who aided the newspaper by delivering the News-Review's counting forms and information when they delivered the ballots and boxes.

The mechanics of the big election gathering machine depended heavily on the Pacific Telephone Co. and its switchboard operators. They did a magnificent job of funneling return calls immediately to the News-Review's staff.

But in the final analysis, success came from the grassroots, the counting boards.

For the night, members and chairmen became reporters. They caught the fever of the newsroom and rapidly called results in from all corners of the county.

To them goes the News-Review's fondest vote of thanks.

Coos Bay Woman Is Shot By Husband

COOS BAY — A woman was shot at least three times early Saturday and Police Chief Glen Kolkhorst said her estranged husband admitted the shooting.

Mrs. Helen Stanziano, 36, was in fair condition in a hospital here with five wounds, two in the legs, two in the chest and one on the chin.

Kolkhorst quoted the husband, Frank Stanziano, 48, a tavern owner, as saying his wife was "stepping out" with other men. She had recently filed suit for divorce.

Patterson Well Pleased With Election Results

Gov. Paul Patterson, winner of the Republican gubernatorial nomination, said Friday night he was "tremendously pleased with the vote."

"It indicated the people like a program of teamwork and cooperation and I shall do my best to continue it," the governor said.

Secretary of State Earl Newbury, who was defeated by Patterson, said he was surprised at the small vote.

"I have no regrets about having entered the contest and am grateful for the support I have received throughout the state," he said.

"I will be happy to continue in my present office for the rest of my term and I will continue my interest in my party and will be very active in politics," Newbury added.

Stable Of Horses Burns In Big Detroit Fire

DETROIT — A disastrous fire late last night destroyed 40 to 45 horses stabled in a wooden barn at the Detroit Race Course track in suburban Livonia.

The fire, of undetermined origin, raged through the 250-foot-long 60 stall barn located on the western side of the track.

Five stables and groom's quarters suffered minor burns when they attempted to lead the horses to safety. Only two horses were seen to leave the barn before it fell to the flames.

The dead horses included "Just Made It" and "Foot Specialist" owned by Dr. Harry Lindy, of Detroit, president of the Michigan Thoroughbred Owners Assn.

Patterson, a 53-year-old lawyer from Hillsboro, became governor when he succeeded Douglas McKay on the state's elevation to the President's cabinet. He didn't comment on the hot power issue.

Returns from 2,016 of the state's 2,419 precincts gave Patterson a 119,065 to 40,885 lead over Newbury. Carson was unopposed for the Democratic nomination.

McCall held a lead of 19,909 to 14,022 in 591 of the district's 815 precincts. A. W. Lafferty, 78, who served in Congress from 1911 to 1915, had only 1,604 votes.

The winner in the Democratic contest for Angell's seat is Mrs. Edith Green, Portland housewife and former school teacher, who showed her two opponents under. She had 18,504 votes, to 7,007 for C. S. Johnston, and 2,935 for H. H. Stallard.

This district consists of Multnomah County.

In the only other major contest, State Sen. S. Eugene Allen, Portland, won the Republican nomination for labor commissioner. He was ahead of Herbert E. Barker, Salem labor leader, 66,667 to 48,816.

Barker showed surprising strength outside of Multnomah County, holding Allen on almost even terms in the other 35 counties. But Allen rolled up a tremendous majority in Multnomah County, where he lives.

Administrators Named For Plane Crash Victims

Administrators and appraisers for the estates of two Brain people killed in an airplane accident May 9 have been appointed, county clerk's records show.

Herbert W. Lombard will administer the estate of Bernard F. Asker, 32, who left personal property in excess of \$5,000.

Asker's wife, Joy and Orvall C. Mattoon, 29, were also killed in the crash. Sylvia Mattoon will administer the estate of her son, who left personal property with a probable value of \$8,000.

Appraisers of the Asker estate will be Leo P. Regan, A. A. Samalin and Ernest Seaton. Regan, Lewis Lakey and Ray Bogan will appraise the Mattoon estate.

Massive Flying Tanker Becomes Crippled Bird

SEATTLE — The Boeing Airplane Company's 15-million dollar test tanker-transport plane was crippled bird Saturday, resting on two engine nacelles, its left landing gear crumpled and the wing flap torn and bent.

The landing gear buckled under Friday evening as the 95-ton ship was being runway-tested at the Renton Airport southeast of Seattle.

The craft came to a quick halt as it tilted over on its left wing engines and the landing gear rammed up through the flap. Seven fire engines roared up but not a drop of fuel was spilled and the danger was over in seconds.

3 Killed, 26 Injured In Crash Of Airliner

AUCKLAND — Three children were killed and 26 other persons received minor injuries today in the flaming crash of a New Zealand National Airways airliner.

The big plane, arriving from Christchurch, limped in a few feet over the sea in obvious trouble. The DC3 sideswiped a house, then burst into flames.

Problems even extend to North Roseburg, where the Chamber of Commerce and the Regional Safety Council foresee a need for an overpass spanning the Southern Pacific right-of-way on Garden Valley Road. They reported last week that they are taking that question up with the state public utilities commissioner, Charles H. Heitzel. A traffic interchange at Garden Valley Road will feed Pacific Highway traffic into industrial and residential North Roseburg.

The county, city and state all enter into possible financing of any improvements. The county owns the Oak Street Bridge, and the city refuses title to it. Garden Valley Road is a county road. The state would be left responsible for any hitches in traffic, for they have put the new highway through.

The three governmental units are cooperatively paying for the traffic survey, which cost \$4,800. Meanwhile, the Highway Dept. expects the new highway to take up to 40 per cent of the traffic load off crowded Stephens Street and expectations are that for the time being, conditions will be eased.

It would take a lot to ease them, for more than 12,000 vehicles in a single day have been counted at one point on Stephens near Lane.
