Record Spring Chinook Run Continues Through May 15

A record run of spring chinook salmon in the Umpqua River has continued through May 15, tabulations at the Winchester counting station reveal.

The count shows the largest number of chinook salmon as of that date since records were started in 1946. It shows 3,102 chinooks through May 15, with 2,026 for the first two weeks of the month.

If the migration is normal, less than one-half of the final total has been tallied.

6 County 'B' Trackmen, 5 'B' Runners In Finals

Phil Blomquist's winning 11-3 pole vault performance in the Class B division of the state track meet, Friday, highlighted first day action among the Douglas County contingent participating at Corvallis.

The Class B pole vault and the high jump were the only two events concluded Friday. In the high jump, Canyonville's George Allen picked up valuable points for the Tigers with a five-way third place tie finish. The winning height was 5-8.

Blomquist's winning vault failed to reach the 11-9 record, but the Yoncalla flash also qualified for further action in tomorrow's finals of the high hurdles after a second place preliminary finish Friday.

Of two Class A preliminary participants, Roseburg's Gene Lane in the discus and Dral'n's Bill Henderson in the javelin, only Henderson qualified for the finals.

The Warrior thrower picked up a fourth place in the prelims with a 164-1/2 toss, behind the first place throw of 185-3/4 by Salem's Ray Taylor.

The distance of Lane's best throw was not announced but he failed to equal the sixth place mark of North Bend's Willard Reeve which went 137-1/4. Lane in the prelims was Bob Abble of Albany with a 156-1/4 throw, six inches short of the state record.

Roseburg's three other contestants in the class A field, Dave Arkhurst in the 880 and Sam Morgan and Mark Robbins in the mile, automatically qualified for the finals in their events which will be run off Saturday.

Four other Class B qualifiers from the county in Friday's action were Bob Babb of Days Creek in the javelin and the discus, Darrell Sweeney of Yoncalla in the javelin, Henry Hurlburt of Glendale in the broad jump and Brent Strickland of Douglas in the low hurdles.

Blomquist failed to qualify in the low hurdles when he was nosed out for third place and T. J. Moore of the defending champion Eagles suffered the same fate in the 440-yard dash.

Babb was second in the javelin with a 162-2/4 toss, inches behind the first place throw of 165-9/16 by Jack Bowman of Jacksonville. Sweeney placed fifth in the event with a throw of 149-3/4.

Babb's 131-4 discus throw was good for a place behind the record-breaking 144-5/8 by Roger Powers of Enterprise. The old mark was beaten by better than six feet.

Strickland placed second in his heat of the low hurdles which was won in the time of 21.9, slowest of the day.

Hurlburt's broad jump of 19-7/8 was good for fourth place. Stan Reed of St. Mary's (Medford) was first with a leap of 20-8/4.

The county's only B automatic qualifiers for Saturday's finals are Glide's Brent McCormick in the 880 and Canyonville's Charles Falconer in the same event and the mile run.

Eliminated in Friday's high jump and pole vault competition were Jack Marsh and Bob McKinney of Canyonville.

Others who failed to qualify for Saturday's finals in their respective events were Phil Benner, Concalla, shot put; Jack Couch, Days Creek, high hurdles; Allen, Canyonville and Hurlburt, Glide, discus throw; Douglas' team of George Brosi, Brent Strickland, Johnny Roberts and Dave Winslip in the 880-yard relay.
