Present Farm Price Supports Likely To Hold

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) said today there is a "possibility" that Congress will deadlock over farm legislation and thus let flexible price supports go into effect under existing law.

Knowland, the Senate Republican leader, said he doesn't know what is going to happen in the controversy which has found many Democrats and some Republicans lined up behind proposals to continue price supports on major field crops at 90 percent of parity.

But he said "it certainly is a possibility" that the two houses of Congress will fail to agree on a farm bill.

President Eisenhower has urged abandonment of the present system of mandatory price supports on basic field crops at 90 percent of parity and its replacement by a system of flexible price supports ranging from 75 to 90 percent of parity. Parity is a standard for measuring farm prices said by law to give farmers a fair return in relation to prices they pay for things they buy.

Eisenhower recommended that, to ease the impact of a change to flexible supports, up to 2½ billion dollars worth of crops the government now holds be "frozen" and ignored in figuring support levels. This provision is not included in the original 1948-49 legislation.

Despite the uncertainty over the farm issue, Knowland said he believes Congress will come up with a program of accomplishments that will convince the voter they ought to keep the GOP in control of Congress.

He blamed Democrats for defeat of two of Eisenhower's proposals: revision of the Taft-Hartley Act and a proposed constitutional amendment to give the vote to 18-year-olds. Both died in the Senate.

Knowland predicted that the GOP will go to the voters with a program that includes tax reductions, social security expansion, a year's extension of reciprocal trade with some customs simplification, revision of the Atomic Energy Act, highway construction, continuation of the housing program and approval of the St. Lawrence seaway.

Blood Donated Via Red Cross Bank Program Saves Mother

Mary Lee Walker is alive today because she has received 14 pints of whole blood through the Red Cross Blood bank program in the last year.

Mrs. Walker, the mother of two sons in the service, a son 11 years old, and a daughter, has suffered from an ailment which causes the loss of great amounts of blood by vomiting. When such attacks occur, the blood must be replaced by transfusion. Five pints of blood have been administered to her since September.

The Red Cross has made no charge for the blood given, and Mrs. Walker has not been required to replace it. However, friends and relatives, grateful for the effort made to save her life, have donated blood in the amount she has used.

Mrs. Walker pointed out that she had received five similar transfusions in a St. Louis, Mo., hospital and the blood cost \$40 a pint there because no Red Cross blood bank program was in force. The only charge made in such cases in Douglas County is the medical lab fee, to determine type of blood.

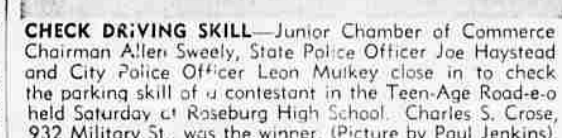
Tuesday and Wednesday residents of this area will again have the opportunity of swelling the Douglas County quota when the Bloodmobile pays its first visit in eight weeks. The quota, which is the same as the previous visit, is 4½ pints. The last Bloodmobile visit saw the greatest number of donors turn out in two years, when 502 donors were processed in the two days. A total of 438 pints were accepted, others being rejected for various reasons.

Mrs. Walter Brittell, Red Cross blood recruitment chairman, states that donors who visited the unit last time may give blood again, since eight weeks is ample time for replacement of blood by the body.

Sen. Morse Raps McCarthy Probe

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon Sunday blasted the Army-McCarthy hearings as "disgraceful" and "disgusting" and said the sessions sow the seeds for endangering civil liberties.

Morse, in a speech before the Jewish Federation of Southern Illinois, also condemned the administration's failure to support Israel against the Arabs.

The Oregon senator, in a speech on freedoms, said the right of a fair trial also implies a fair hearing.

Morse said Congress should have adopted a mandatory code of fair procedure. "I am waiting for one Republican senator to stand up and say why we don't want it," he said.

The senator, terming Israel a "beheaded of freedom" said "I am not going to trade the freedom of Israel for the oil of Arabia. Our foreign policy must be hitched to the free way of life."

He said the public is responsible to a great extent for the degeneration of United States foreign policy because the average American is thinking of his present time and has no historic interest or perspective in international affairs.

"We must stop supporting totalitarian countries around the world," he said, "and lend our aid to the beachhead of freedom. We are exporting talk, symbols and generalities; you can't do that when people's stomachs are empty."

Turning to the subject of wire tapping, Morse said:

"We have gone so far in this country as to have an attorney general who would destroy the privacy of the home by legalizing wire tapping."

He said "you can't be selective in wire tapping. When you tap one, you wire tap all."
