

French Claim Victory In Minor Siege Battle

SAIGON, Indochina — The French High Command claimed victory Monday in a midsize battle of the Dien Bien Phu type at Nam Tha, in northern Laos.

The French-Laoan garrison vanquished an attacking force of about 400 of the Communist-led Vietnamese after being harassed for six days by continual mortar, machine gun and light arms fire, a spokesman said.

The rebels, outnumbering the defenders 3-2, were reported to have lost 55 men, while the garrison's casualties were "very light."

French Nurse Will Be Freed Today

HANOI, Indochina — Lt. Genevieve de Galarde Terraube, the heroic nurse of Dien Bien Phu, arrived by plane Monday and said she was in good health.

She flew into beleaguered Dien Bien Phu on March 27 to aid the wounded and was unable to leave because of rebel advances. She remained, tending her hundreds of charges, until the fortress was overrun on May 7, the only woman in the post.

Although a prisoner, she was permitted to remain at Dien Bien Phu to do her work until freed Monday. More than 400 of the wounded men in the fort have been flown out ahead of her.

She told newsmen at Bachmai airport here she was taken by helicopter from Dien Bien Phu to Luang Prabang, the Laotian capital, and then brought here by plane.

The attractive young French air force nurse posed for press and television photographers.

"I have nothing to say and I've made up my mind about that," she told reporters.

The fortress commander, Brig. Gen. Christian de Castries, awarded Genevieve two decorations in the week just before the fortress fell. She was made a Knight of the Legion of Honor and presented the French Military Medal. De Castries remains in the hands of the Vietnamese, along with 8,000 or more of his men.

McCarthy-Army Fuss Public Reaction Noted

Americans once again are clustering around TV screens to watch the Army-McCarthy hearings.

One thing seems certain: the hearings have stirred up a tremendous reaction among newspaper readers, TV viewers and radio listeners.

As many as 4,000 protests have descended on a TV station that dropped live telecasts.

Thousands of letters have piled into newspaper offices to commend or condemn Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

The Associated Press checked 61 representative newspapers from coast to coast and North to South to see how sentiment was running in letters to the editors.

Twenty-five of the newspapers said the majority of the letters they received on the topic favored McCarthy; 19 said the majority was anti-McCarthy; and 17 said there was about an even split.
