

Umpqua Resident Dies Wednesday

Leonard Hill Liles, 70, lifelong resident of Umpqua, died suddenly at his home Wednesday.

He was born April 1, 1884, at Albany, and came to Douglas County in 1925. He resided near Umpqua where he was a farmer. He was married to Olga Broszio at Roseburg Jan. 25, 1926.

Surviving beside the wife are two sons, Mari J., address unknown, and Leonard K., Umpqua, and one granddaughter.

The body has been removed to Long & Orr Mortuary and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Coroner L. L. Powers said the cause of death was a heart condition.

to keep the pair in sight, but he said they disappeared when about 300 yards out.

The Coast Guard cutter Bonham and a plane from North Bend searched the area through the afternoon, but both returned at night. The two youths were presumed drowned.

District 116 School Supt. William Bromley said the biology field trip was taken to collect marine specimens. Three supervisors were in charge. They were Tom Ragsdale and E. O. Nickerson, a bus driver.

Both Bromley and Douglas High Principal David R. Potter were called immediately and rushed to the scene. They sent the rest of the students back. Bromley and Potter stayed until the search was discontinued at dark. They said it continued again at daybreak.

Mr. and Mrs. Harold Morgan, parents of the Morgan boy, also rushed to the coast. But Mrs. Francis Collins, mother of young Collins, was not able to go. Instead her sister and brother-in-law from Lakeside took up the vigil at the coast.

This is the second time in a little over a year that tragedy has struck the Collins household. In March of last year, the father was killed in the airplane crash in the Rice Creek area that snuffed out four lives.

There are two other children in the Collins family, a girl, Perley, who attended Lindgren grade school, and Andrew, a pre-schooler.

Three other brothers and sisters survive in the Morgan family. They are: David, a freshman at Douglas High; Julie, a first grader at Lookingglass school where Mrs. Morgan teaches; and Jack, a pre-schooler.

ments to buildings and grounds and curtailment of the adult education program.

The decrease in the adult program will come in the general classes, where an attempt will be made to de-emphasize such subjects as shop, art, business and commerce.

The plan is to make it self-supporting. Tuition is being boosted from 25 cents to 30 cents a class hour for residents and to 36 cents an hour for non-residents.

Remaining in the adult program will be apprentice-related instruction, a requirement.

The capital outlay was reduced by knocking down amounts asked for school improvements, repair and expansion. A typical item left out was money for landscaping at Joseph Lane Junior High School and development of the athletic field. A \$7,778 item for floodlighting the high school football field was eliminated.

The outlay for instruction was left as it was, though money for teaching supplies was reduced. Teachers in the district still would receive increments figured in the earlier budget.

Budget Board Chairman John Todd commented: "Accepting the vote of May 18 as the mandate to reduce the school tax burden, the budget committee has again studied the budget in detail and made a substantial reduction. It was not possible to make these reductions without serious modifications on the program of instruction and drastic curtailment of the maintenance, capital outlay and expansion plans."

"We feel that these cuts will reflect in the reduction of a properly operated school system. The budget board is comprised of school board and other taxpayers who not only have the interest of schools, but their own interests as taxpayers in mind. We sincerely feel that we have done all that can be done without permanently damaging either the school program or the school property."

The date of the election, June 21, coincides with the annual school meeting. Three new board of education directors will be elected at that time, also.

Two Nominated For Commissioner Of Umpqua Port

The names of Harold T. Lewis and Norman Weatherly will go on both Democrat and Republican ballots in the November election as candidates for two positions on the Port of Umpqua Commission.

This was determined in the primary election when the men received the highest number of votes from each party.

Balloting on the offices was announced Wednesday by County Clerk Charles Doerner after official canvassing had been completed.

Howard Hinsdale of Reedport actually topped the Democratic voting with 18 votes, but he is already a commissioner and his office is not in contest.

Lewis and Weatherly, both on the GOP ballot, polled 344 and 378 votes, respectively. On the Democrat ballot, where votes were written in, each received 13.

Other write-ins on the Democrat ballot were Leonard Tolman 5, Oscar Anderson 4, Everett Abbott 3 and Nelson Hogan 2.

Crowd Gathers, But No Parade

Roseburg did its part—but where was the circus?

A "circus" parade attracted several hundred people Wednesday to Jackson street. They were entertained by a whole of a marching performance by the Roseburg High School band and the Knights of Pythias girls' Drum and Bugle Corps.

The bands, pride of the city, and the Douglas County Sheriff's posse were the only entrants, though.

The scheduled appearance of animals, clowns, and other acts of the Clyde Beatty Circus failed to come off after scores of parents scurried their offspring downtown to see the parade.

Schools were recessed early before noon to give the youngsters a chance to see the circus acts. School kids, too, enjoyed the band music.

Don Hagedorn, president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, said that it was 11:30 Wednesday when Charles Cox, circus parade director, said plans for bringing a "big-top" representation downtown had been called off.

The circus will be remembered as the one whose bleachers collapsed here about three years ago.

Performances in the afternoon and evening drew an estimated 3,500.

A hardy little band of circus-lovers also turned out at 6:30 Wednesday morning to watch the unloading, but the train didn't arrive until hours later. It was reported, the circus was not loaded at Grants Pass until far past the departure time, so the arrival was late.

Mayor Percy Croft came to the aid of the Junior Chamber of Commerce in clearing them of any blame. He said: "We shouldn't be too critical of the Jaycees. It would be unfair since they were sincere in their efforts to promote the circus."

He concluded that they could not help the late arrival of the train and the decision of the circus not to stage the parade.

have grown outdoors, and owned by the exhibitor.

6. Exhibitors are requested to bring specimens in clean pop bottles. Furnish own wide mouth bottle for class of three of a kind.

7. All exhibits must be labeled with rose variety only (wooden labels).

8. Arrangements must be work exhibits. Material may be secured anywhere.

9. Each exhibitor, accompanied by monitor, will be allowed to place his own arrangement in designated place.

10. Show committee is not responsible for containers, etc. All things of great care will be taken in handling properties.

11. Judges and clerks only will be allowed on floor during the time the show is being judged.

RULES FOR JUDGING

1. In rose shows judging is based on a comparison of the approach to perfection of the individual variety.

2. Specimen exhibition blooms must have been grown disbudded. Side buds disqualify the bloom. Evidence of very recent disbudding will be penalized.

3. At time of judging the rose should be half to three parts open and have a well-formed center. Buds will not qualify as blooms.

4. Roses should have at least a 12-inch stem. Foliage washed, and in good condition, but not oiled.

5. All exhibits must be named.

6. The decision of the judges will be final.

Cohn Testifies Adams Tried To Stop Hearings

this, partly because a "thoroughly alarming" security situation at secret radar laboratories at Monmouth had existed for a long time and the Army had done nothing about it despite repeated FBI warnings over a period of years.

Cohn related that at a luncheon in New York Oct. 13 both Stevens and Adams raised the question of "whether or not we had to have hearings," and asked if there wasn't some way to stop the hearings and let them "do this themselves."

Stevens and Adams both insisted when they were witnesses earlier in the McCarthy-Army hearings that they never tried to halt the senator's investigation.

Stevens said he was concerned about the "type" of hearings and what he termed the way the Army was being "hammered." He said he felt an unfair picture of the situation was being given by the McCarthy subcommittee.

Cohn was asked whether Stevens and Adams complained at the luncheon about distortion of the facts.

They didn't, Cohn replied. Earlier, Cohn had claimed full credit for the McCarthy subcommittee for suspension of 35 suspected security risks at Ft. Monmouth—a claim previously denied by Adams and Stevens, who insisted the subcommittee supplied only minor information which the Army didn't already have.

Cohn testified it looked to him like the situation at Monmouth was such that action was being taken only because of the subcommittee investigation, and if the investigation were dropped "the action might very well stop."

Relating his story chronologically, Cohn had come only to October and the beginnings of the controversy with the Army when a luncheon recess was taken.

Glide District Lets Contracts At Board Meet

Contracts on three projects in the Glide school district were let at a school board meeting at Glide High School last night.

The major job was construction of four classrooms, offices and restrooms at the Glide High School grounds. The contract was awarded to Industrial Building Co., Eugene, for \$66,719. Construction is expected to start June 1. The tentative completion date is Sept. 15.

Other bidders on the job were: Todd Construction Co., S. Ferche and E. A. Shannon, all of Roseburg, and Thompson and Dore, North Bend. Correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby.

Supt. Byron Evans of the district reported that the classrooms will be used for the eighth grade high school music and drawing classes. Evans will move into the new offices, and Principal David White will occupy Evans' present office. White's present office will be used as a faculty room.

The second job is the concrete work in constructing approximately 400 feet of sidewalks and curbs at the Glide High School and elementary school and construction of a small dam at Deer Creek. This contract went to Ivan Edwards, Roseburg, for \$1,586.50. Work will start June 1.

The last job is the clearing and grading of five acres of newly-acquired property adjoining Glide High. Lee Mortenson, Roseburg, was successful bidder for \$1,457. The property will be cleared for future additions to the school. Work will start on this project also on June 1.
