vised hearings into the McCarthy-Army row that Cohn "blew his top" and declared, "This is it, this is war with the Army." The officer also quoted Cohn as saying, "We'll investigate the heck out of you." Cohn said that he would not dispute Belieu's testimony that he was angry, but he testified that he thought the colonel was correct in some of the words he attributed to him and incorrect about others. Jenkins, who had led Cohn through a full day of direct testimony Thursday, changed his examination manner when he began cross-examination early in Friday's session. In his story of the Ft. Monmouth incident, Cohn flatly denied that he had, as Belieu testified, said, "I have access to FBI files I want them."

Cohn said he did not and could not have made that statement because, since he has been with the subcommittee, "I have not had access to FBI files and I have never seen FBI files." Cohn said "the whole day (at Monmouth) was filled with a lot of ridiculous things." One of these things, Cohn said, came outside the laboratory from which he was barred. He said the party was told it was about to see something no one had ever seen before — they were "making a big thing of it."

Cohn said an officer whispered to him that a Russian military mission already had been in it. He said he passed this information on to McCarthy, and the senator asked about it out loud. After some discussion, Cohn related, it developed that a Russian mission some time before had been cleared by the State Department and was shown around Ft. Monmouth. Cohn's differences with the Army version of his efforts to get a commission for Schine chiefly concerned the intensity of the effort.

Special Serial Levy Will Be Voted On Separately

The current excess levy will have to care for the school needs of an estimated 320 increase in the school population next year. Deller said that expenditures of \$375 per pupil is generally regarded as minimum. The figure was divided by a citizens' advisory committee here. The local expenditure per pupil is below that sum, Deller said. The serial levy also will be voted on June 21, and three new school board members will be elected on that date. Youths Admit Burglaries At Two Local Churches

Two boys, 13 and 16, arrested by city police in connection with burglary of two Roseburg churches last weekend, have been arraigned in court. One boy, who appeared in district court, was placed on one-year probation. Judge Elmer G. Baldwin released him without a sentence on condition he stay out of more trouble. The other youth has been sent to MacLaren School for Boys at Woodburn following his appearance in juvenile court. He was on probation at the time of the alleged crime. He admitted the burglaries, another of several offenses he had committed over a two-year period.

One of the youths was apprehended by a city officer while in the act of taking money from a third church. About \$1.50 was taken from both the First Christian Church and the Church of the Open Bible.

North Part Of County Is Searched For Pilot

A comprehensive search of the northern part of the county will be made Saturday for James Frank of Empire, a student pilot who disappeared Tuesday afternoon on a flight from North Bend to Eugene. Ira Byrd of the Civil Air Patrol and Sheriff's Aero Squadron said planes from Roseburg, Coos Bay and Springfield combed the region Thursday but sighted no wreckage. Besides Byrd, Jack West, Holden McTaggart, Don Starmer and Cecil Bever were the Roseburg flyers on the search. The pilot of the missing craft has logged only 25 hours flying time before he took off on the Tuesday flight. An aircraft similar to his was seen in the Scottsburg and Elkton areas that afternoon.

Americans Gas Up Cars For Weekend Holidays

CHICAGO (AP)—Millions of Americans gassed up their automobiles Friday for the first long weekend of the vacation and touring season. By tradition the Memorial Day holiday is the accepted date for the opening of summer cottages at lake resorts, for the start of the picnicking season and of pilgrimages to national and state parks or other points of interest. The National Safety Council estimated that with good weather more than 35 million automobiles will be on the highways during the three-day holiday—Saturday, Sunday and Monday. The safety council estimated that the heavy travel may take the lives of 340 Americans between sundown Friday and midnight Monday.

china. The cabinet spokesman did not give any indication that the cabinet had discussed changing the 1950 law. This law bans the sending of French draftees to combat zones overseas in peace time. Legally, the Indochina conflict is not considered a war, but a police action. What constitutes a combat zone has never been clearly defined. The manpower situation in the Red River delta is desperate and replacements are urgently needed, with the Communist-led Vietminh battalions closing in. By its action Friday the cabinet hoped to free volunteers for duty in Indochina, and still meet commitments to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.
